U. N. B. HAS SEVEN OF 1909 XV. AVAILABLE THIS YEAR

Several Members of Old Rugby Team will Not be at College this Year--Some Promising New Material in Sight--Dave McCann of Ottawa Sure For Half-Line.

The U.N.B. engineers are in camp at Zealand on the C.P.R. Gibson Branch and the football men who are there have been getting in some practise during the last two or three days and within a few weeks the whole of the Red and Black squad will be at work on college field under the direction of Capt. Kinghorn. U.N.B. lost many of her football players by graduation last spring, and the number which was expected to return to college this year has been unexpectedly decreased as several of last year's team will not be at college at all this year or will not be back until January.

Of the regular players of season 1909 those who are sure to be again available are, Kinghorn the captain, Kuhring who played both half and quarter last year but who is likely to play quarter, Jennings who played quarter, "Cap" Deedes, McNair Lynch and Rigby who are forwards.

The players who have been lost by graduation are, Jones, fullback, Bab bitt and Spicer, halves; McKeen and Graham, quarters; Alexander, Brooks and Armstrong forwards. Willis who played half last year is out on a survey and will stay out until January. Bruce Dixon one of the forwards is on a survey in Saskatchewan and will not be available this season. Jack Connolly another forward may be back but nothing certain is known about him. John Dolan who played half in 1909 has taken the plunge into professionalism and would not be available even if his college career had not been cut short.

1910 MATERIAL

Kinghorn is left with seven possibly eight of last year's team from which to build the XV of 1910. It is thought however that there is sufficient material among incoming students and those who were at the university last year to fill the gaps in the team. First and foremost is Dave McCann of the Ottawa team, the famous Rough Riders. McCann is generally acknowledged to be one of the best half-backs in the Dominion. He has been used to Inter-Provincial Rugby Rules but the difference between them and English Rugby Rules are not very great. McCann was in Fredericton in the winter of 1909 with the Ottawa Y.M.C.A. basketball team which made a rather disastrous tour of Maritime Provinces at that time. He is a solid built fellow weighing about 155 pounds and is expected to be the swiftest thing that ever ran down a football field in these parts. Jimmie Duke, Johnson and Dugan who were at college last year are expected to be in the fight for positions on the forward line. Melrose of St. John. Joe Alexander who was at Normal School a few years ago and Jewett of Fredericton are also mentioned as possibilities for the scrum. They are all new students. Jack McKay who was a sub-

stitutethalf last year will be out for a permanent position this year. Frank McGibbon who is going to U.N.B. after several years' training in football at Fredericton High School which has given U.N.B. many of her best players, is thought to be practically certain of getting a position on the half-line or at full-back. Binney the star sprinter of the 1910 U.N.B. track team will be out after a place on the half line. Sterne and Otty, two fresh men coming from Rothsay College are also halves and may be heard from before the season is over. Then there is always the chance of unknown men turning up. Altogether things don't look too bad for the Red and Black XV but you never can tell. U.N.B. in previous years has looked good at the first of the season but landed at the bottom just the same.

OTHER TEAMS

Little is known of Acadia's chances. The Garnet and Blue has a hard grip on the King-Richardson Cup however and if they win that emblem of Intercollegiate Rugby supremacy again it is doubtful if the grip will ever be broken. Eric McDonald of this city will enter as a freshman at Acadia this year and is practically certain of getting a place on the half line. Mt. Allison is said to have the best chance of winning the intercollegiate championship that she has had in some years and will bear watching.

WALSH GOES TO ST. F. X.

U.N.B. lost a good man when Walsh of St. John High School decided to go to St. Francis Xavier. Walsh is a football player but is also a track athlete and has ambitions of breaking the Maritime record for the mile run a figure which he has approached closely on several occasions.

AFTER DOMINION CHAMPIONSHIP

U.N.B. is after the Dominion basketball championship and it is practically settled that the basketball team will tour Ontario and Quebec next winter and play McGill, Ottawa, Toronto and other fast teams. Of last year's team Stephenson, Kinghorn and Rigby will be available as well as McKnight of the 1909 team. Both McKnight and Stephenson will be at college for post graduate courses this year.

BAD EYE PUTS TY COBB OUT OF GAME

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 9.—The oculist list to whom Ty Cobb, the ball player, submitted his inflamed eye for examination, has issued an official statement, in which he says:

"Ty Cobb is being treated for elyctis of the right eye. The condition is serious as it is an inflammation of one of the most important structures of the eye. The binocular vision is seriously affected.

"The treatment demanded in his case necessitates the relaxation of the focussing apparatus of the eye. I have advised him to remain out of the game for several days at least. I feel sure that no permanent injury of his sight will result from this inflammation, provided that he takes a stitch in time by way of complete rest."
