U.N.B. ENGINEERS ARE IN CAMP AT ZEALAND ON KESWICK STREAM

Under Prof. Stone are Engaged on Preliminary Survey—About Twenty-Five Will Attend Next Week.

The twenty-one engineering students of the University of New Brunswick who have been in camp at Zealand for the past few days, have had very poor weather and were unable to begin work until Thursday, although camp opened on Tuesday. The number of students at camp this year is smaller than usual but is expected to be increased to about twenty-five next week by the arrival of other students.

The U. N. B. engineers are under the direction of Prof. E. A. Stone, dean of the Engineering School, and are engaged in surveying for a line of railway along the Keswick River on the bank opposite to that on which the Gibson Branch of the C. P. R. runs. The students are now engaged on a preliminary survey but later will do location work. Two parties are out each day, working in opposite directions from the camp. The total length of the line to be surveyed will be about seven or eight miles.

TAKEN VERY SERIOUSLY.

The inhabitants of the country in the neighborhood of Zealand hardly know now to take the survey. Some jokers among the college boys have told that the party is making a survey for a railway which the Hazen Government is going to build up the Keswick and some of the people have swallowed the yarn. The college boys so far have avoided any trouble with the farmers in the vicinity. On one occasion, however, they were ordered out of a field.

The camp will continue until the 25th inst., and during that time the embryonic engineers will obtain practical experience in large quantities. Upon the freshman devolves the duty of keeping axes and bush-hook in a state of readiness and that makes exercise with the grind-stone necessary. The seniors take turns at being chiefs of the parties, each holding the position for two days at a time. The survey has hardly got properly under way but it is expected that by next week the parties will be making fairly rapid progress.

BOARD OF TRADE MEETING POSTPONED UNTIL NEXT WEEK

The meeting called by President Hodge of the Board of Trade, for last evening for the purpose of ascertaining public opinion concerning the request of the John Palmer Co. for financial assistance from the city has been postponed and will in all probability be held on Thursday night. DEAN WILLIAMS AND CANON McNAB WILL PREACH TOMORROW

Bishop of Newfoundland will Not be Heard—Bishop Taylor-Smith Will Leave Monday Night.

Arrangements for the concluding service in the Bi-centenary celebration of the establishment of the Church of England in Canada have been completed. This service will be held at Christ-Church Cathedral at p. m. Monday. The Rt. Hon. and Rt. Rev. Lord Bishop of London will preach at that service.

Some changes have been made with regard to Sunday services at Christ Church Cathedral and the Parish Church. The preachers will be the Very Rev. Dean Williams of Quebec and Rev. Canon McNab of Toronto. Canon McNab will preach at the Parish Church in the morning and at Christ Church Cathedral in the afternoon. Dean Williams will preach at the Cathedral in the morning and at the Parish Church in the evening. While in Fredericton Dean Williams will be the guest of the Dean and Mrs. Schofield, Canon McNab and Mrs. McNab are visiting at the Rectory.

Monday night's service will be fully choral. The Fredericton Brass Band will assist. Mr. Farrar, the organist and many voices from the various choirs of the city will be added to the Cathedral choir for the occasion.

The offering will be in aid of the new Cathedral in Halifax.
