SIR WILFRID LAURIER  
AS SEEN BY A CANNY SCOT

"Imagine a man of medium height slight in build, with white hair, well-groomed and brushed back, clear-cut features, sharp, keen eyes, of most dignified appearance, and withal, in irreproachable attire—and such is the Premier of Canada."

Alexander Cross, of The Glasgow Evening Citizen, received this impression of Sir Wilfrid Laurier when interviewing Premier at Ottawa—and in The Citizen Mr. Cross tells an interesting story of his meeting with Canada's famous son, as follows:

Sir Wilfrid Laurier is alone, seated at his desk, in a handsome room, with a large window opening on a broad prospect. His individuality and his charm of manner impressed me at once. The refinement in the lines of his face and figure, peculiar to the Latin race, bespeak his origin from the best blood of the old French-Canadian stock. Responsibility has made him slow and careful in his speech, but he is singularly quick in thought and apprehension. He is an accomplished public speaker; in this great art he holds the palm; he is said to be one of the really fine public speakers that Canadian public life has produced.

## POPULAR.

Probably at this moment he is the most popular man in Canada, and a lease of power may be predicted for the Liberal party there, so long as his personality is spared to lead its destinies.

He is a sort of personal power, like that exercised by Sir John Macdonald, the late great Canadiana Conservative leader, who enjoyed high office for so long, and inspired such confidence among his followers, both in Parliament and in the country. In many Canadian homes I have seen engravings of his portrait hung in the place of honor. I was greatly struck with the remarkable resemblance that portrait exhibits to the late Lord Beaconsfield. Once or twice I mistook it, even after a second look.

## TOPICS OF INTEREST.

Sir Wilfrid was as willing to talk about the old country, as I was anxious to hear about the new. The great wealth of every country, he reminded me, with its people, and Canada was growing—growing quickly! Its population was increasing over 2,000 every day. This was quick progress. And it was carrying prosperity all over the Dominion, industrially and agriculturally.

## PROBLEMS.

There were political and social problems to be faced, of course. There always would be problems for statesmen in every country. One of those in Canada just now was the high cost of living. The same causes were producing this evil in Canada as were at work in the States, with the same results. I spoke of the figures as I had heard them. I had been told from responsible quarters that the advance in the cost of the necessities of life might be put at 20 per cent. for the last eighteen months—at 12 per cent. during the last year, and at as much as 7 1/2 per

cent. during even the past four months. In spite of the general prosperity, this was a very serious factor. It was producing injustice to many classes; it was constantly requiring new adjustment between incomes and expenditures. At every turn it was compelling an extravagant scale of charges for every sort of service, and extreme rates of profits in all trades—wages and salaries which were ample two years ago were becoming inadequate. Therefore, there was some dissatisfaction among workmen and laborers; farmers were grumbling loudly; many classes alleged they were seriously and unfairly affected. To some people these increased costs meant longer hours of work, or shortened rations; to many others loss of income and profit; to some, even disaster.

The Premier said some remedy would have to be devised. The subject was anxiously before the Government.

## TARIFF REFORM AND PROTECTION.

Then another vital topic came up, namely the subject of "what is called Tariff Reform in England," said Sir Wilfrid, "and Protection over here." He did not believe that England could ever disregard economic principles—her interests would be so vitally affected by a blunder. "As for Canada," he said, "Tariff Reformers chose to misunderstand the Canadian policy. Duties were not levied having solely in view protective purposes. In Canada they had to raise a revenue, which could not be done by stamps or income tax. Such methods were suitable for old countries like England, but impossible here. Therefore revenue must be got from Customs for a while. The Canadian manufacturers, however, could never seize the ropes and sail the ship for their own private gain, as manipulations had enabled the manufacturing interest to accomplish in the States. The Canadian farmers would keep such in check."

## INTELLIGENT FAUMERS.

"In Canada," he said, "there was an intelligent and educated farming population, and a more sound public sentiment. Besides, in Canada that class was homogeneous. They were coherent, and well able to act together to defeat abuse, and protect their interests." I had discovered how true this was, and I knew that it had not been possible, up till now, in the States. But the Government of Canada was well informed, it was clear, of how things were developing, and information spreading even in the States, on this important subject.

## "ON THE MAKE."

At parting, Sir Wilfrid observed reflectively that Canada was a most interesting country just at present. Friends from our side, however, must not expect to find a country like their own. "Don't forget that here you see a country on the 'make.' England is a country finished long ago. Yes," he said, "and in England you have put away the tools!"

G. P. R. WILL PAY ITS  
DIVIDENDS QUARTERLY

Montreal, Oct. 5.—The annual meeting of the shareholders of the C. P. R. Company, was held at noon today at the company's headquarters and the tone of the evening was of a thoroughly optimistic character. Sir Thos. Shaughnessy, president and chairman of the board of directors, presided and in the course of his remarks reviewed the work of the company for the past year, pointing out that the earnings and development of the property of the shareholders was fully up to and even in excess of expectations.

The most important announcement made was that the company's plans for the placing of larger and faster boats on the Atlantic service were practically completed, and the directors are expected to be able to complete arrangements within a few weeks.

It was also announced that in future dividends will be paid quarterly instead of half yearly, and Sir Thomas hinted that shareholders would have their profits increased shortly, though there would be no melon cutting.

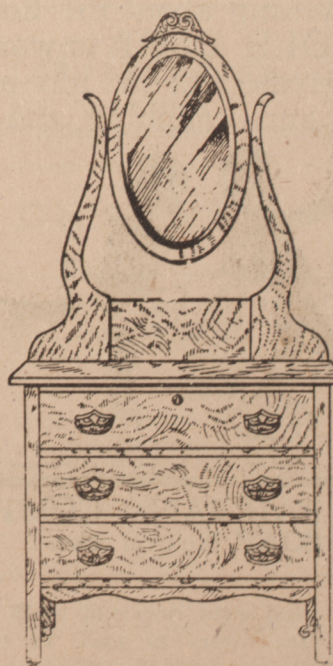
