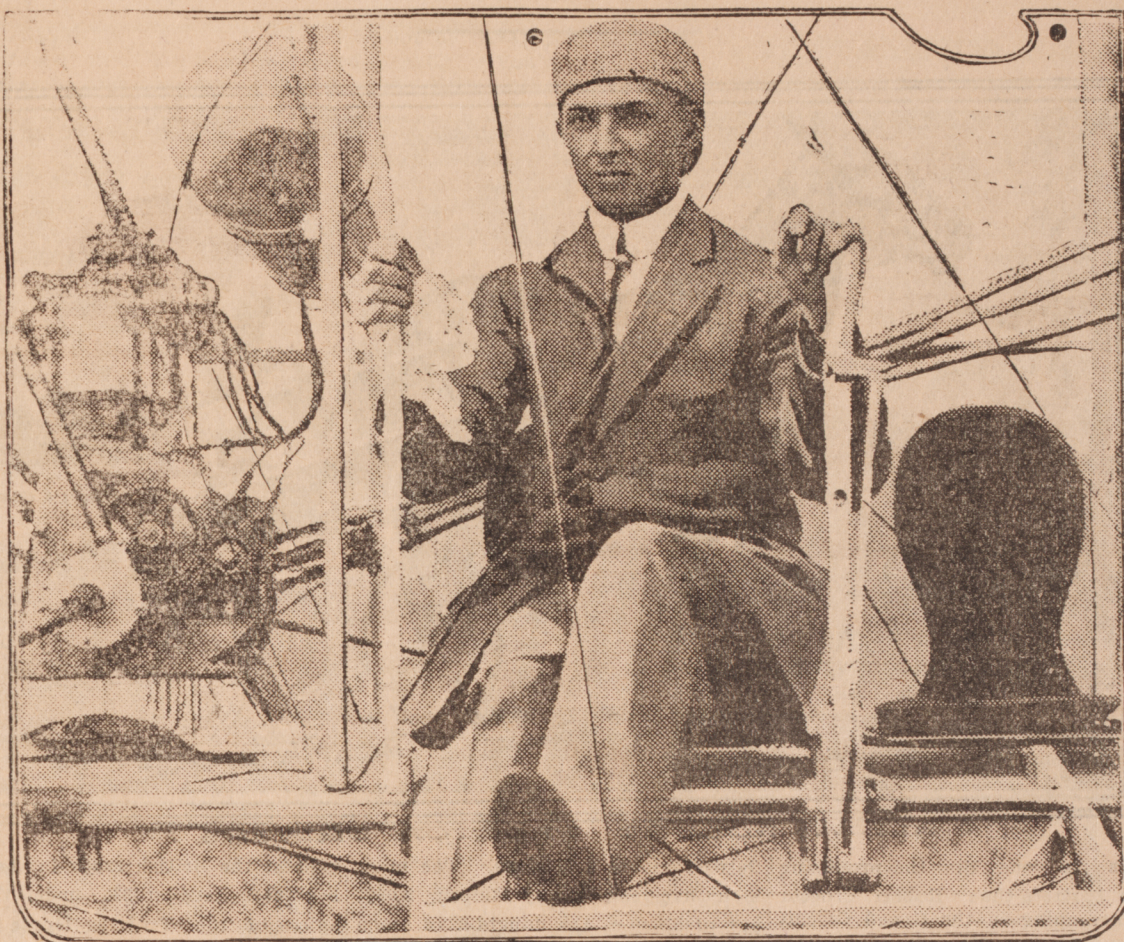

Walter Brookins Was Dashed to the Ground



Daring Aviator, Who Took Part in Toronto Meet was Seriously Injured While Trying to Avoid Contact with Spectators--German Also Meets with Accident.

Ashbury Park, Aug. 10—A serious mishap to Walter Brookins, in which the daring Wright aviator was painfully but not dangerously hurt, marred the opening day of the aviation meet here. Brookins was dashed to earth when his machine suddenly turned turtle after he had been for-

he had been fatally injured. An examination showed that his nose was broken, and that he had been badly bruised and shaken up, but not seriously hurt.

Brookins, who it will be remembered took part in the aviation meets at the Trethewey Farm, Weston, Ont., and Montreal last month created a world's record for high flying on July 9 at Atlantic City, N. J. where he reached an elevation of 6,175 feet in a Wright biplane. For this feat he received a \$5,000 prize offered by the Atlantic City Aero Club. Brookins created other records for high flying at Indianapolis.

GEORGE HAMMOND, MERCHANT AND POET DEAD AT KINGSCLEAR

Had Reached the Advanced Age of Ninety-Two Years--Was Successful Business Man and Rifle Scholar--A Devoted Member of the Baptist Church.

One of the oldest, best-known and most highly esteemed residents of York County, passed away at his home in Upper Kingsclear last evening in the person of Mr. George Arthur Hammond, merchant and man of letters. He had been in the enjoyment of his usual good health up to Saturday last, when he was seized with a severe attack of illness. Since that time, although everything possible was done to save his life, he continued to grow weaker and the news of his death created no surprise.

The late Mr. Hammond was born at Kingsclear on October 30th, 1817, and was therefore in his ninety-third year. All his life he resided in the parish and was actively identified with its affairs. Upwards of sixty years ago he established a general store at Hammondville, a village at the upper end of the Parish, which takes its name from him. He was appointed postmaster soon afterwards and held the office continuously for upwards of forty years. Upon his retirement in 1898 he received a letter from the then postmaster general, expressing appreciation of the long and valuable service he had rendered to the country.

About ten years ago Mr. Hammond wishing to be relieved of some of the cares and worries of active business, admitted to partnership his nephew, Mr. Herbert Smith. The business has since been carried on under the firm name of Hammond & Smith. Mr. Hammond continued to have an active interest in the work about the store up to the time of his death.

A MAN OF LETTERS.

Mr. Hammond was in many respects a most remarkable man. In appearance he bore a striking resemblance to Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, America's greatest poet. He was a man of refined literary taste and was a poet of more than ordinary ability. In his spare moments he wrote poems and he afterwards, with his own hands, set up the type and printed them in book form from a small wooden press of his own manufacture which he called the "Lahstok Rural Press." Although his poems possessed genuine merit, he never made any real effort to circulate them, being content to hide his light under a bushel, so to speak.

Many years ago Mr. Martin Butler of this city, was in the employ of Mr. Hammond, and acquired a knowledge of the art of printing from him

Mr. Hammond's last poems included "The Stork Flying Eastward," "Three Volumes in Miniature," "Queen Victoria's Olive Tree," and "On The Strand."

The following extracts from two of his poems will give a fair idea of the style of verse produced by his pen:

How solemn the sleep of the dead!
How deep the repose of the tomb!
This conscious existence is fled,
And the tree now no longer may bloom

But tho' here we commit to the dust
The soul's fallen mansion of clay,
Earth only receives it in trust,
It shall rise at the great judgment day.

Rest, brother, rest, thy toils are done
They ended with the setting sun,
Never again to be begun
Rest, brother, rest!

Mr. Hammond devoted a great deal of his spare time to study and his fund of knowledge was greater than that of the average college graduate. Quite recently he took up the study of Hebrew language and seemed to be greatly interested in it.

In religion Mr. Hammond was a devout Baptist and a regular attendant at worship in the second Baptist Church at Kingsclear. He gave liberally of his means in support of the church and its various organizations.

His business affairs were characterized by the strictest honesty and integrity, and he was looked upon as one of the most successful merchants in the County of York. He lived in a very quiet and unostentatious manner, dividing his time between the store and his home. He was not much given to travel, and it is a well-known fact that for twenty years his visits to the city did not average more than one a year.

The deceased is survived by a widow, formerly a Miss Smith, an aunt of Mr. Roy Smith of this city, but no children. Mr. Charles Hammond, of Van Buren, Me., is a nephew. The funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon.

firearms in a moose or caribou country between November 30th and September 15th in the year following, without a permit from the Surveyor-General, is prohibited.

License to kill one Bull Moose and one Bull Caribou and two Deer to a bona fide resident of the Province, Two Dollars. To a non-resident of the Province, Fifty Dollars. To be obtained from the Crown Land Department, Fredericton, or from an authorized vendor of licenses; each license shall be in force for one Open Season. A License to hunt and kill two Deer may be obtained by a non-resident of the Province for Ten Dollars, in localities at discretion of Surveyor-General.

Non-Residents must take out a License to trap fur-bearing animals; License fee, \$25. A "Non-Resident" means any person who is not a bona fide resident of the Province and actually domiciled therein.

No game can be kept in cold storage nor sold more than 15 days after the termination of the Open Season.

Transportation of Game: All game must be "tagged" for transportation and no game can be taken out of the Province without a special permit from the Surveyor-General.

Heads and carcasses of game will be seized unless properly "tagged," and unless the coupon "Return" Tag issued with the License is returned to the Crown Land Office.

Not more than two moose and two caribou are permitted to be killed by persons working or staying at any one lumber camp.

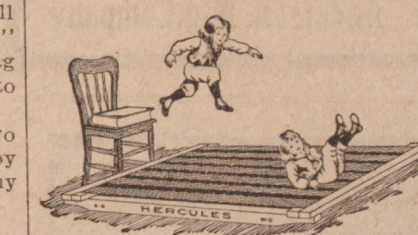
