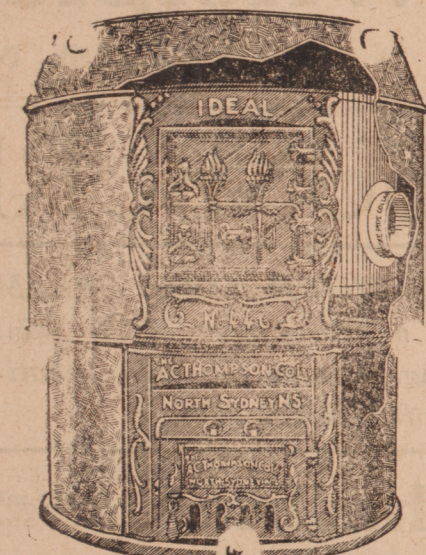

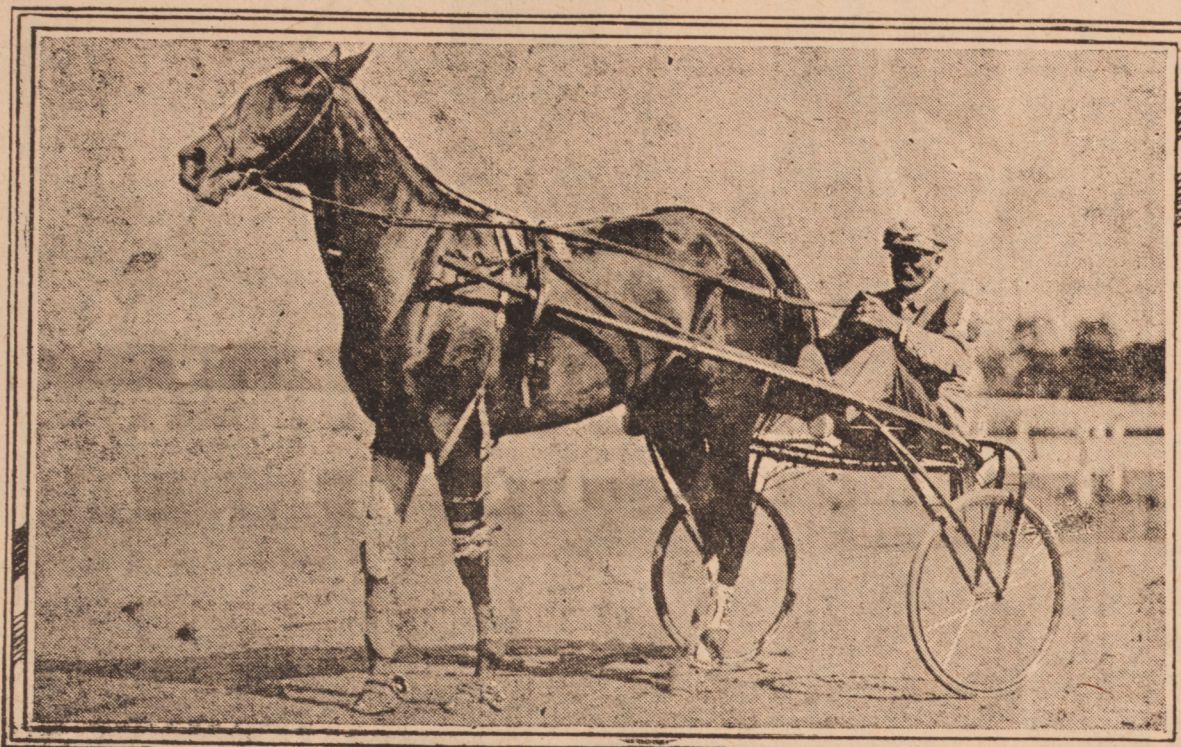

## MILES McLEOD JIM CORBETT'S NEW CHAMPION

How the Giant Missourian Compares with Jack Johnson—Has Many Advantages.

Miles McLeod, the Gentry County, Mo., young giant, who is one of the pugilistic aspirants that Jim Corbett has picked to train to meet Jack Johnson, is of Scotch descent. McLeod has lived a perfect life in that he has no handicaps such as prize fighters now on the shelf blame for their retirement.

There is no taint of narcotic or alcoholic poison in his system. He can boast that perfect manhood that results from the eating of good food without the dangerous embellishments so common to city life. Tobacco and strong drink he knows not. Fresh air and plenty of hard work have been his only tonics.

He was born on the present McLeod homestead, near Albany, in Gentry County, Mo., some 50 miles from St. Joseph, the northwest metropolis of the "Show Me" state, on July 13, 1882. His 28 years have been spent as a farmer boy, working as do other boys and having the sports and pastimes common to rural life as his recreation. He is not a college bred man and does not claim to be an athlete in the generally accepted sense of the term.

It must not be understood from this that he is entirely "green" but rather that he has little of the ring generalship or tricks of the squared circle. Upon "Gentleman Jim," it devolves to instill these crafty and clever actions that will protect him against the negro's onslaught until he has worn down the black or sparring for the opening that will permit him to send home that "steer-killing" blow of which his friends so proudly boast.

In comparison with Johnson, McLeod shows more of the perfect man. He is 5 1/2 inches taller, has the advantage of 3 1/2 inches in reach and is broader across the shoulders and deeper of chest. Johnson is bulkier than the Missourian in arms and limbs. The following figures show where McLeod has the advantage over the negro:

Maine Aggregation Was Shut Out Yesterday at Woodstock—Tanker Hughes Got Two-Baggers.

Woodstock, N. B., Aug. 12.—After the disastrous defeat of yesterday in Houlton by the Boston-Pittsburg-Waterville team, playing under the name of Waterville, the telephone was got busy and two weak spots in the local team were filled this afternoon by Malloy of Fredericton and Chapdelaine, secured from the Connecticut League by St. Stephen. With this strengthened team, aided by Eddie Ramsay of St. John in Cornell Park Waterville, the finest ball team ever seen on a Woodstock diamond, was shut out the score being 5 to 0.

Divinal, a left hander, heaved for Waterville. He struck out six men and ten hits were made off him by the delivery, Millmore, Hughes and Ramsey each getting two baggers.

Joe Neptune never pitched better ball than he did this afternoon. While he struck out only three men but five scratch hits were made off him by the picked team from Maine and Massachusetts. Chapdelaine, as well as Baker, put up great ball behind the bat. Neptune walked only two men. The playing of Divinal, Ramsay and Malloy was much appreciated. The attendance was 1000 which is fairly good for a town of 4000 inhabitants. Neptune who has only pitched three games this season and has three shut outs to his credit was carried on the shoulders of the fans from the grounds. He is only nineteen years of age. ## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter-section available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.
