## ANOTHER FINE BUILDING ADDED TO RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT

Residence of Mr. Wardlow Kilburn Practically Completed—Description of New House.

Contractor Moses Mitchell has practically completed the handsome residence built at the corner of Smythe and Brunswick Streets for Mr. Wardlow Kilburn, and has added another to the number of beautiful buildings in Fredericton's residential district. Mr. Kilburn's new home is fitted with all the latest conveniences and is most handsomely furnished both within and without.

This residence is magnificently situated, its position affording a fine view of the river. It is in the Modern Colonial style, with six large pillars flanking the entrance and supporting the balcony, which extends along the entire front of the house. This balcony and the verandah beneath it are very spacious, the dimensions being 45x12 feet. Besides the six large pillars with carved capitals there are ten smaller ones supporting the balcony.

## INTERIOR ARRANGEMENT.

The principal entrance to the house is reached by a concrete walk from Smythe Street. The doors are fitted with windows of bevelled plate glass of fancy design set in copper. A large hall divides the main house equally and from the upper stories are reached by a stairway. The library is on the left of the hall with the drawing-room on the right. Both rooms have open fire-places and their main windows of plate glass. Sliding double-doors separate them from the hall. The dining-room is immediately in the rear of the library. It has a beautiful ceiling and paneled walls, with mahogany finish. A fancy buffet is one of the features of the dining-room. This is fitted with miter-cut bevelled plate glass doors. The room is lighted from the south by a window of plate glass, above which is a light fitted with stained glass. The butler's pantry, splendidly equipped, is behind the dining-room, and through it communication is had with the kitchen, which is furnished with most modern appliances. A second pantry is connected with the kitchen. The "den" is at the rear of the drawing-room and, like that room, has an open fire place. Small coat rooms open off both hall and "den."

## SECOND STORY.

The second story contains four bedrooms, a dressing-room and a bath-room. Access to it is had by means of a stairway leading from the lower hall. A striking feature of the landing of this stairway is an exceedingly beautiful window of stained and opalescent glass. The front and rear halls of the second story are divided from one another by a fine arch. The front hall corresponds to that of the lower story and affords access to the bedrooms and the balcony. The latter is partly roofed and from it a magnificent view can be obtained. The third story contains a billiard-room, servants' quarters and store-rooms.

## BASEMENT.

The foundation of the building is of hammer-faced stone, laid in courses. The basement is large and extends beneath the verandas as well as the body of the house, the verandas being on the sides as well as the front of the building. In the basement are the store-room and coal-room, separated from the others by brick walls, the laundry equipped with set-tubs and the steam-heating apparatus. The floor is of cement and the ceiling is plastered.

The entire building is so equipped that it can be lighted by either gas or electricity. A system of electric bells and house-telephones extends throughout. All the flooring is of hardwood.

Ald. Mitchell was both architect and builder of the new house. The plumbing was done by D. J. Shea, who also installed the heating apparatus. The electric wiring was done by W. A. Staples, the gas fitting by the Monitor Manufacturing Company and the painting and decorating by Wm. Sutherland.

The grounds attached to Mr. Kilburn's residence are quite extensive, and provide for a lawn on the north and east sides and a tennis court on the south.

## MARKSMEN RETURN.

Capt. F. A. Good and Mr. S. L. C. Coleman of this city, and Mr. F. M. Merritt of Marysville, returned from Sussex last evening after participating in the P. R. A. meet. All report the meet an excellent one and the attendance the largest in the history of the P. R. A. In spite of lack of practice, Messrs. Coleman and Merritt did well. The former won fifteen dollars altogether and the other thirteen. Mr. Coleman got fourth place in the Ladies' match, 14th in the Prince of Wales, 36th in the Association, 9th in the Special Extra Series, 19th in the McAvity and tied with Langstroth and Campbell, of St. John, for 20th place in the grand aggregate. Capt. Good, who was range officer, shot in the revolver competition and did well.

## THE HUNTING SEASON IN NEW BRUNSWICK WILL SOON BE HERE

Duck and Woodcock Season Opens on Sept. 1st.—Partridges and Big Game on Sept. 15.

Local sportsmen are already making preparations for the opening of the hunting season next month, and are looking forward to it with pleasant anticipation. Some changes in the game laws of special interest to bird shooters were made during the last session of the Legislature, but the law as it effects big game hunters has not been materially changed for several years. Last year the open season for all game birds commenced on Sept. 15th. This year ducks and woodcock, wild geese, brant, etc. may be hunted after Sept. 1st, but the partridge season, does not open until Sept. 15th, as in other years.

The following extracts from a summary of the game laws, recently issued by the Crown Land Department is of interest to sportsmen at the present time:

## PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK SUMMARY OF GAME LAW IN FORCE 1910.

Moose, Caribou, and Deer: Open Season, September 15th to November 30th.

Cow Moose and Cow Caribou of any age, and Calf Moose or Calf Caribou under the age of three (3) years, shooting of prohibited at all seasons.

No person shall kill or take more than one Bull Moose, one Bull Caribou and two Deer during any one Open Season.

Mink, Otter, Fisher and Sable: Open Season, November 1st to March 31st.

Partridge: Open Season, September 15th to November 30th. The sale of Partridges is prohibited.

Wild Geese, Brant, Teal, Wood Duck, Dusky Duck, commonly called Black Duck: Open Season, September 1st to December 1st.

Woodcock and Snipe: Open Season, September 1st to December 1st. Shooting any game on Sunday, or in any park, or pleasure resort, is prohibited.

Licenses: Guides and camp help must take a License for that business, costing One Dollar, and are prohibited from shooting big game when acting as such. Only bona fide residents of the province can obtain Licenses as guides or camp help.

Non-resident hunters prohibited from hunting unless accompanied by a licensed guide.

## TEACHERS' COURSE AT NO. 3 REGIMENTAL DEPOT ENDS ON 20TH

Capt. A. H. Borden, R.C.R., superintendent of physical instruction in the Maritime Provinces is expected to be here on Thursday and Friday next to examine the teachers in that branch of the work. The examination in drill and the purely military part of the course will be conducted by the officers of the local depot.

Recently the teachers have been undergoing instruction in company drill and this morning Q. M. S. Instructor Hobkirk was putting them through battalion drill.
