BRAZILIAN MUTINEERS BOMBARD RIO JANEIRO

Two Hundred of the Rebels were Killed or Wounded in Fierce Battle on Saturday --- Govenment Warship Finally Silenced the Fortress.

Brazilian mutineers Rio Janeiro Dec. 11—The government troops are again in control of the garrison on Cobra Island, and the second mutiny of the naval forces has ended with a heavy casualty list, but in a way that will probably prevent further rising for some time to come.

The mutineers in the garrison who composed a battalion of the marine corps numbered about 600 men. Of these 200 were either killed or wounded. The others were taken prisoners by the destroyers while attempting to escape from the island during the night.

Two hundred citizens were either killed or wounded while watching the bombardment from the streets of the city or along the water front. Many government buildings were damaged including the treasury, the foreign office and the apartments of public works and telegraphs, all handsome structures.

Two land batteries, two warships and several destroyers took part in the bombardment of the island yesterday and twice during the engagement, an armistice was allowed for the removal of the dead and wounded. Firing ceased late in the evening but no actual surrender by the rebels took place, the commanders of the government's forces deeming it the wiser course to await the coming of day.

CAUGHT FLEEING MUTINEERS

The destroyers however were sta-

tioned within easy range of the island so as to prevent any attempt on the part of the mutineers to escape. Toward night several boats put out and men could be seen swimming evidently with the intention of reaching the mainland. The destroyers bore down upon them, and made them prisoners.

Martial law has been declared for thirty days in the federal district and Nictitery. The chamber of deputies met today to discuss the subject of a special session. The government believes it has the situation well in hand as outside of a few malcontents the army and navy are loyal. A strict censorship is being maintained but conditions within the city today were normal.

The scout ship Rio Grande Ro Sul, fired the first shot in the revolt turning its guns on the town. The heavy bombardment from both land batteries and warships caused a fearful panic in Rio Janeiro during the early hours of yesterday and frightened and wounded people fled in all directions.

According to the newspapers the causes leading to the second revolt are trivial, most of the demands made by the men in the last mutiny having been granted by the government.

The revolt broke out Friday night when the mutinous marines quartered in the fortress of Cobra Island captured their officers and sent them to the mainland. The scout ship Rio Grande Ro Sul joined in the uprising.

FOUR TRAINMEN KILLED ON I. C. R. TRAIN WRECK

St. Hyacinthe, Que., Dec. 10—A head-on collision between an Intercolonial train and a light Grand Trunk engine occurred a quarter mile west of here just after five this evening, which resulted in the immediate killing of four train hands, the serious injury of another, and minor injuries to half a dozen passengers on the Intercolonial train.

The fireman on the light engine, McMillan, had a miraculous escape from death, although his legs were badly crushed.

The road is double-tracked at the point and the collision was caused by the light engine taking the wrong track after leaving St. Hyacinthe. How the mistake occurred may be hard to determine, as both engineer and conductor on the engine were dead.

Both train and light engine were proceeding at about twenty-five miles an hour when they met, and the impact was terrific, the locomotives being almost smashed to pieces. Only the lightness of the engine prevented serious injuries to the passengers, the heavy train literally hurling the other locomotive out of the way.

A number of passengers had minor injuries to their limbs from being thrown out of their seats, but only one suffered a broken bone, J. Champoux, of Nicolet, having his collarbone fractured.

A wrecking train was sent with doctors from Montreal and the injured were taken care of, it not being necessary to send any to hospitals. The track was badly torn up and traffic was soon restored.

SURGEON EXPIRES AFTER PERFORMING OPERATION

Chicago, Dec. 10—Dr. J. Mequebour, a prominent surgeon dropped dead in St. Joseph's Hospital just after he had successfully performed a delicate operation. "I'm not feeling well," he said as he entered the operating room, "but this work must be done immediately if this man is to live." For three hours the surgeon worked on the man who lay on the operating table.

"It's over, he will live," announced the surgeon when the work had been finished. "But I am feeling badly. I must lie down," he added in a moment.

On his way to a rest room, the surgeon gave a gasp, threw up his hands and fell dead to the floor. Heart disease was given as the cause of his death.
