## Notice to Plumbers, &c.

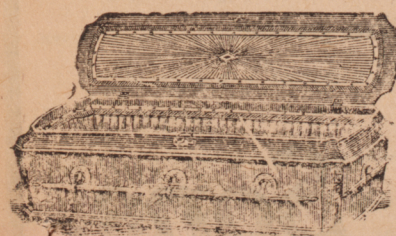

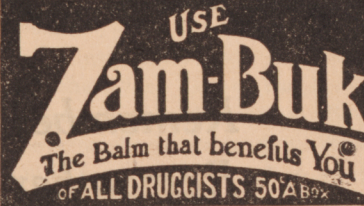

## SCALE OF PAYMENT IN CANADIAN NAVY

Engineer-Commanders Get More Than Captains  
—Pay Higher than in British Service

Ottawa, July 30—An Order-in-Council has been passed fixing the rates of pay for the officers and men of the Naval Service of Canada. The main figures were made public during the last session of Parliament but the present order gives them in much greater detail for all ranks of the service. The pay allowances and gratuities are based upon the rates in the Imperial navy, taking into consideration the increased cost of living in Canada. On the whole the rates vary from twenty-five to over fifty per cent more than the British rates.

Captains on promotion will receive \$8.20 per day, after four years' service, \$9, after eight years' service \$9.60. Command money will be \$3 per day on promotion with \$4 after four years' service and \$4.50 after eight years' service. Commanders will receive \$6 per day on promotion and lieutenants \$4 per day with corresponding increases as above for length of service.

Engineer captains will receive \$13.50 per day thus being considerably higher salaried than the man in command of the ship. Other figures include the following: Chief warrant officer on promotion, \$3.50; gunners, boatswain and carpenters \$2.50; able seamen, 70 cents; ordinary seamen, 50 cents. The allowances for up-keep of kits, gratuities etc., are similar to the regulations of the British Admiralty.

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## DO YOU WANT TO KEEP COOL? WELL, HERE'S HOW TO DO IT

Some Practical Rules for Avoiding Discomfort in Hot Weather—Diet, Exercise and Clothing

Some practical rules for avoiding discomfort in hot weather are given in Good Health (Battle Creek, Mich., July) by W. J. Crombie, instructor in gymnastics in the University of Pennsylvania. In the first place, says Mr. Crombie, we should be careful to avoid over-eating, a fault to which those engaged in sedentary occupations are specially prone. It is true that the sedentary man needs food as much as the laborer, but owing to muscular inactivity he is not as capable of converting his food into assimilable materials. If he eats two or three times the amount the system requires, says Mr. Crombie, it will not be properly digested, and will cause fermentation, and if this be allowed to continue for some time, it poisons the system and eventually causes indigestion, nervousness and sleeplessness. It is while in this condition that one suffers from extreme heat. Therefore:

"In warm weather, meats, oils and fats should be reduced to a minimum or omitted entirely, and fruits, vegetables, and cereals should be substituted. The first and best way to keep cool is to avoid heavy and stimulating foods, and to reduce the amount of other articles of diet to that merely required for the sustenance of the body. Refrain from intoxicants and decrease or avoid tea, coffee and condiments.

"A large percentage of the deaths is caused by infantile diseases, many of which could be prevented if precautionary measures were adopted. Feeding with many mothers, is the panacea for all ills. When a child cries from the effects of having been overfed this surfeiting process is repeated—very often with disastrous results. A noted doctor has said that more babies are drowned in milk than sailors in salt water. While this is probably a radical statement, still the best baby-food milk, can be given to excess, and prove injurious. It is positively criminal to feed babies on meats and unripe fruits, especially in the summer."

### WHAT TO WEAR

Next the author takes up the subject of clothing, which he says should be light both in material and color during hot weather, although when one becomes overheated, heavy clothing, such as an overgarment or a sweater, should be put on to prevent catching cold. He goes on:

"In occupations where one is subject to severe trials of strength, such as the army, farming and boating, heavy clothing should be worn even in the summer. It is a very dangerous practice when one is overheated to ride in an open trolley or sit near an electric fan to cool off.

"Linen underclothing gives a pleasant feeling of coolness to the skin, and the perspiration evaporates more quickly. Under clothing should be well aired at night if one does not make a daily change. Too much clothing worn by day or night has a tendency to enervate and make one more susceptible to sudden changes in temperature.

"Sun and air-baths are esteemed of great value by the Germans in their nature-cure system. The sun has a very beneficial effect on the skin and it is found that its rays are far superior to the use of cosmetics. Many persons in exposing their body to the rays of the sun take too much at one time and thus experience extreme annoyance. Air, and sun-baths when taken intelligently harden one's system and consequently enable one to withstand with more ease the hot days of summer.

### SYSTEMATIC EXERCISE

"Daily, systematic exercise should not be omitted because the weather is warm. A little taken in the early morning followed by a cool bath will tend to make one cooler for the rest of the day. Muscular work is to the body what friction is to metal. The metal will rest if not used; the body will become diseased if not exercised. A master mind in a weak body is like a good blade in a poor knife-handle. Therefore, one who deems it inconvenient on account of time or location to take a little daily exercise will eventually have to take a long and arduous path to recuperation.

"Proper dieting, sufficient exercise, rest and sleep, daily bathing and intelligent exposure to the air and sunlight, the avoidance of stimulants and a cheerful frame of mind, will insure one a strong resisting-power so that he need have no fear of the extremes of either heat or cold."

## CATS BY THE THOUSAND

The Animals are Raised for Their Fur—Washington Dealers Grow Felines to Provide the Inexpensive Muffs and Furs—Farm on an Island in Puget Sound.

There is an island in Puget Sound of about fifteen acres extent, the centre of which is a dense forest of fir, hemlock and cedar. Undergrowth has entwined around the trunks of the larger trees until the whole seems as impassable as a tropical jungle. The shore line is a mixture of rocks and sandy stretches of beach. On the whole no man, would attempt to live on the ungainly-looking island, but, nevertheless, it is the means of earning a good income for six men who are prominent in the fur trade in Seattle, Tacoma and San Francisco.

The island has been utilized as a cat farm. The island is to thickly populated with cat that the rocks appear to be covered with black, spotted and variously colored toms, pussies and kittens. Passengers on passing steamers marvel at the countless number of both large and small cats leaping, rolling and playing on the rocks, beach and fallen logs. There are many thousands of these feline quadrupeds that are kept on this lonely and desolate looking island for the purpose of providing society women with beautiful muffs and men land on the south shore of the island. They unload an enormous seine over a quarter of a mile long, fasten one end to the rocky shore and with the other end in the boat they make a great circle with a radius of a quarter of a mile long.

When the boat reaches shore further west it can be observed that the great seine is being dragged toward shore as if it were heavy. When the great arc of net has been pulled in to shore there are dumped hundreds and hundreds of pounds of many kinds of fish on the sandy beach. The men wash out the seine, load it into the boat and pull away for their homes.

The next morning every fish has disappeared. The cats have eaten them. There is a growing market for inexpensive fur to supply the medium-priced muffs and furs, and the fished cats have proved a source of great profit not only on this island, but on other islands and in many places along the mainland, where, of course fences must be devised to confine the prison for the cats, and the fish they

## PHENOMENAL TIPS

Ship Servants Looking for Cool Spots to Recover From Surprise on Receiving Small Fortunes.

On the last arrival in port of the 'Laurentic,' the weather was extremely oppressive, and the crew found they could get better air by lounging in their off time, along the always cool alley-ways of the ship. The temperature yesterday when the ship again arrived in Montreal, was much more bearable, however, and one or two of the stewards, after the heat and burden of carrying down the belongings of departing passengers, were able to take a quiet stroll along the harbor front, in the endeavor to recover somewhat from the shocks experienced by individual cases of unexpected generosity on the part of passengers, which had almost paralyzed them.

One of the causes of shock to the nervous system was a medical case, and the doctor, whose action caused the attack, really ought, as a medical man, to have been more careful. His generosity, however, triumphed over his professional caution. He left two shillings as a gift for the table steward who had waited upon him and his wife and two children at every meal during the week's trip. Two shillings, in England, is worth 48 cents. In Canada it is taken as 40 cents. This worked out as ten cents per person for seven days' service. At a late hour last night the steward was happily on the high road to recovery, and is now thinking of investing the money in local real estate in the Annex.

Another steward, who was also specially favored by fortune, is likewise making satisfactory progress towards convalescence, although the shock was rather more severe.
