ROSS K. WON AT DETROIT IN FASTEST TIME OF THE YEAR

Detroit, Aug. 2.—The defeat of Walter W., 2.03½, by Ross K., in 2:02½, 2:03 was the saving feature of the grand circuit races here yesterday afternoon. The clouds hung low from early morning, but the downpour luckily held off until the crowd which had braved the threatening weather, was bound to the city.

The Horseman and Spirit of the Times futurity, which was counted on as being the star number of the opening day's program, was very much of a disappointment. Emily Ellen, a daughter of Todd and Morning Bells, from Lou McDonald's stable, won off-hand, having to show something worthy of the rich prize only in the final heat, when the Massachusetts youngster, Chatty Direct, had Ellen under a drive in 2:10½.

Followers of the Murphy stable were severely bumped in the \$3000 2.11 trot as the handsome Alice Roosevelt was not up to beating Major Strong in 2:08½, 2:09½, 2:08½. The talent overlooked the white-legged winner of Kalamazoo and made the aged mare favorite at 5 to 40. She finished on a run in the first heat and was fortunate to be given the place over Melva J., who after that all but took second money from her.

The pacing division of the Horseman stake was just a nice comfortable race for Twinkling Dan, the fine looking son of Dan Patch, 1:55½, and Twinkle, 2:05½, bed and owned by Gen. C. C. Watts, of Charlestown, W. Va. The first heat was stepped in 2:10½, the fastest mile of the year by a 3-year-old pacer.

The defeat of the heretofore unbeaten Walter W. was not unexpected. Ross K. showed McMahan a mile in 2:02 at Kalamazoo last week, and he went to the post better than a year beating the Memphis gelding, and it took a remarkably last horse to turn the trick.

The miles in 2:02½, 2:03 this afternoon give the son of Constano the honor of winning the fastest race of the year, and at the finish of each he had something left.

SENATORS' PITCHER HAS INFANTILE PARALYSIS

Washington, Aug. 2.—Bill Heinrich, the Senators' pitcher, who has been confined in the George Washington Hospital for five days, has developed a case of infantile paralysis, a disease which rarely attacks adults, in his right arm.

Heinrich is 21 years old and hails from the Pacific coast. He is a protégé of Walter Johnson, the mainstay of the Senator corps. Little was known of his record except that he had pitched phenomenal ball for a high school team on the coast.

Heinrich reported about the first of June and his first game was not a success, although it was hoped that he would round into shape.

AMAZING GROWTH OF THE DOMINION

United States Consul at Owen Sound Sends
Figures to Washington

New York, Aug. 2.—The Herald's Washington correspondent wires: Mr. A. G. Seyfert, United States Consul at Owen Sound has compiled statistics which show the wonderful growth of the Dominion of Canada. His report on this subject was made public today by the Bureau of Manufacturers of the Department of Commerce and Labor. He says:

"The clearing houses of fourteen leading cities of the Dominion for 1909 showed a total transaction of more than \$5,000,000,000. The banks have a total paid up capital of \$1,000,000,000, a reserve fund of nearly \$80,000,000, notes in circulation \$82,000,000, deposits aggregating nearly \$900,000,000 and assets of more than \$1,000,000,000.

EXPORTS OF WHEAT

"In less than fifteen years the exports of wheat from Canada to the British Empire have grown from 9,000,000 bushels to 46,000,000, and the exports of other countries in the same time from 9,000,000 to 50,000,000 bushels.

"The total agricultural development for the year 1909 was 30,000,000 acres of land, yielding crops valued at \$532,000,000. This was an increase of more than \$100,000,000 over the previous year.

"During 1909 Canada imported goods to the value of \$300,000,000, two-thirds of which came from the United States. The exports reached \$244,000,000, of which Great Britain took \$127,000,000, and the United States \$85,000,000. The silver production of 1908 was \$11,000,000 and that of copper, nickel and cobalt \$25,000,000.

ELECTRIC RAILWAYS

"During the same year the electric railroads transported 300,000,000 people and 730,000 tons of freight on 11,000 miles of track. The electric roads showed earnings of \$14,000,000 and working expenses of \$8,000,000 on a capital of \$88,000,000. The steam railroads with 23,000 miles of track, carried 34,000,000 passengers and 63,000,000 tons of freight, at an earning of \$147,000,000 on a capitalization of \$1,250,000,000.

"During 1909 the number of declared settlers who arrived in Canada was 152,071. Of this number 72,349 came from the United States, 47,580 from the United Kingdom and the rest from other countries."

Shadeland Fausetta was bred by Powell Brothers of Shadeland, Pa., and is standard bred and registered. She is one of the best-bred animals in this vicinity, being by Wilkes Nutwood, (8000), dam Fausta by Sidney, (4770), grand-dam by Crown Point (1990). See Fausta Vol. XVII.

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SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter-section available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made in any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.
