It is only recently that the importance of the scratching shed has been fully recognized. Domestic fowls have a rooted objection to using their sleeping-quarters during the daytime so the two must be kept separate, although the shed may very well be built as a continuation of the roost house. It should be wire netted in front, and the floor must be hard, smooth and dry.

TWO PLAIN AND ATTRACTIVE SHIRTWAISTS.
Paris Patterns Nos. 3296, 3305
All Seams Allowed.

Plain shirtwaists are always the ones most needed. Not only are they necessary for wear with separate skirts, but they are the style best adapted to tailor-made suits and no style is more worn. Pongee is now recognized as an economical wash material, and it can be made with a strip of Byzantine embroidery down the front, where the waist is closed, and at the collar and cuffs. Such other wash materials as linen, chambray and percale or madras may all be trimmed with the embroideries, which can be bought by the yard in white and colors, or they may be made perfectly plain, as preferred. The waist which we illustrate is one of the workaday styles. The front has two tucks at the shoulders in front and a band for the closing. In the back there is a small shoulder yoke, which may be omitted in making if preferred. The sleeves are of the plain shirt sleeve variety and are finished with cuffs which are intended to be worn with link buttons. The neck of the waist may be finished with a band, and with it one of the pretty embroidered collars may be worn. The pattern (3296) is cut in 7 sizes, 32 to 44 inches bust measure. To make the waist in the medium size will require 2 1/2 yards of material 36 inches wide.

This waist is built along the simplest lines, but has a certain charm about it that will appeal to all. The perfectly plain front suggests itself for embroidery, and this form of decoration is very dainty and pretty. The neck is in Dutch style as here shown, but may be made with high neck if preferred. It will make up well in lawn, poplin, percale, linen or any of the pretty summer silks. The pattern (3305) is in 7 sizes, 32 to 44. Size 36 requires 2 1/2 yards of 27-inch material. NO EVIDENCE OF CAR SHORTAGE THIS FALL

Railways are Making Ample Preparations to Meet Traffic of the West.

Fort William, Ont., July 30—The annual car shortage bugaboo has not materialized this year. An inquiry among railway officials of the Canadian Pacific, Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Northern at the western lake terminals has elicited the information that there will be more than an ample number of cars on hand to bring forward the 1910 crop and send back all the coal and other provisions required to tide over the population between Lake Superior and the Rocky Mountains until spring.

Not only have western roads made substantial additions to their equipments of rolling stock, but there have been made countless other improvements, such as the installation of additional sidings and considerable double-tracking, according to divisional superintendents and traffic managers.

Officials are free to assert that while they have every reason to believe that the yield of grain in the West this fall will not come up to the average, despite the fact that the acreage under cultivation is considerably greater than ever before, the lines tapping the wheat belt will be at the commencement of harvest, in a position to handle 25 per cent. more grain than was ever produced in the West in a single year.

But the nabobs of the steel highways have by no means reconciled themselves to an unusually dull fall. Preparations for a healthy movement in traffic in all lines have been started, and will be continued until the rush season is well advanced. Officers cite the fact that in years past they have taken for granted that there would be a light yield only to be caught napping.

That coal shipments to the West will be greater than during any previous year is already assured.
