GENERAL H. WON \$5,500 AT HARTFORD YESTERDAY

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 8.—Spirited horse racing, sensational aeroplane flights, and other lesser attractions made Governor's day at the Connecticut State Fair the biggest and best of the week. The blue ribbon event of the Grand Circuit races, the \$10,000 2:09 trot, was a one-sided race for General H., driven by G. Haag, who took all three heats, winning \$5,500 of the purse.

There were eleven starters in this event, but only nine survived the first heat, Aquin and Silence being distanced, and Grey Gem was withdrawn as the gelding was sick. Only a few feet separated the winner and Binvolo as they approached the wire in the first heat, but the General nosed in out. Gamar was a good third and the remainder of the field was bunched close behind. In the second heat Gamar, who earlier in the day was picked to win, made a brave fight of it on the stretch, with General H. but the latter had too much reserve and with but slight urging swept under the wire, winning by half a length.

The third and final heat, General H. led all the way, his only serious competitor at the finish being Soprano. It was a fine race throughout, although there was little doubt of the outcome after the first heat. The purse was divided as follows: General H., \$5,500; Gamar, \$1,500; Alice Roosevelt, \$1,200; Soprano and Binvolo, \$750 each; and Teasel, \$300. The track record for this event of 2:04 1/2, held by Hamburg Belle, was not in danger at any time. The best time was 2:08. All of the four races on today's card were won in straight heats. The 2:20 trot went to Captain Cute easily; the 2:11 was taken by Startle without much trouble, while Earl Jr. won the 2:05 pace. The latter event furnished one of the most exciting finishes of the afternoon, the four starters being almost abreast as they came under the wire in the first heat.

Tomorrow the free-for-all, with The Harvester, will be the big event. Uhlman will also attempt to break the track record driven to wagon.
