HEARS PROMISES TO  
SUPPORT ROOSEVELT

New York, N. Y., Sept. 8.—Republi-  
can leaders and members of the "Old  
Guard" at the Republican State Com-  
mittee were not inclined to discuss to-  
day the cabled statement of William  
Theodore Hearst from Paris, urging  
Theodore Roosevelt to fight the  
"Bosses" in this state and the in-  
timation that the independence league  
would help him. Mr. Hearst's declar-  
ation was deemed of much importance  
in the present situation and until to-  
day no light had been shed on what  
position Mr. Hearst and the Inde-  
pendence League would take in the ap-  
proaching state campaign. Follow-  
ing a long statement of Mr. Hearst  
in which he scores the "Bosses" of  
both parties and at the same time  
finds certain faults with Col. Roose-  
velt. Mr. Hearst concludes:

"Come to New York, Mr. Roosevelt  
and honestly take the warpath  
against the bosses.

"We Independents are whetting our  
tomahawks for the fray. There is no  
jealousy in our ranks. We do not  
care who leads, if only he leads  
aright."

"We don't care who gains the glory  
as long as the people gain the vic-  
tory. Drive the Republican bosses  
out of the Republican party, Mr.  
Roosevelt, and if any one of them  
deserts to the Democratic party, fifty  
thousand Independents will take his  
place."

If Barnes, Woodruff, Aldridge, all  
three of them desert to the Demo-  
cracy, one hundred and fifty thousand  
Independents will take their places.

"We cast that many votes at the  
last election, Mr. Roosevelt. We can  
cast them again this time and  
more."
