SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, the applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

KING ALFONZO WILL NOT ARBITRATE

London, Nov. 28.—The Madrid correspondent of the Times says today that King Alfonso renounced his position as arbitrator in the frontier dispute between Peru and Ecuador on learning that Ecuador did not desire to arbitrate.

The Diario Universal of Madrid of October 21 announced that King Alfonso would decline to assume plenary powers in the settlement of the dispute, considering that a binding decision would be likely to precipitate a collision between Ecuador and Peru and that he would propose that the parties concerned invest him with the faculties only of a friendly arbitrator.

DREXEL MAKES NEW ALTITUDE RECORD

Philadelphia, Nov. 24.—J. Armstrong Drexel broke all aeroplane altitude records here today, when he climbed above the city until his Blériot monoplane was unable to make further progress in the rarefied atmosphere. The ink in the needle of his barograph ran out at 9,970 feet, which was accepted as a new world's record tonight by Clifford B. Harmon, chairman of the National Council Associated Aero Clubs of America, and James King Duffy, the secretary of that body.

The instrument is the same one which Johnstone carried when he made the former record of 9,714 feet at Belmont Park on Oct. 31. It was brought to this city today under the seal of Mr. Duffy, in order that the record would be official.

Mr. Drexel left the aviation field at Point Breze in the extreme southern part of this city at 3.23. He landed in Oreland about twenty miles north of the spot where he had started about 4.46.

In his climb he had travelled at least thirty miles to the northward when he started to descend, after trying for 15 minutes to force the machine higher. He glided down for a distance which he estimated tonight at six miles.

So swiftly did the monoplane descend that the aviator nauseated. However he reached the open field and brought his machine to the ground without injury.

He at once notified the officials at the aviation field of his landing.

Clifford Harmon and Grahame White left at once for Oreland in an automobile, and brought the aviator and barograph to this city.

Mr. Drexel announced tonight that he is going to fly the machine to the aviation field tomorrow. He was greatly disappointed when he found the barograph had failed to record an even 10,000 feet. "The air was so light it was impossible to make the machine ascend another foot," he said. "The engine would not carry it any further, and I was up at the extreme altitude for more than fifteen minutes, jumping the machine in an effort to secure a greater height."

Mr. Drexel said tonight that while it was very cold, he did not suffer as he had done when he made his previous records of 6,750 feet at Lanark, Scotland, and 8,370 at Belmont Park because he was more warmly clad. He wore a specially constructed can.

vas suit over lamb's wool underwear and three sweaters. His hands were encased in fur-lined gloves and he wore a woolen cap and a mask with goggles.

When Drexel began his flight there was a light breeze scarcely more than a zephyr, blowing from the south. As the aeroplane rose the aviator pointed its nose towards the north and in less than five minutes the monoplane was only a speck in the heavy sky.

When the monoplane finally disappeared from view the curiosity of the crowd was at fever pitch for more than an hour. When word reached the track that the aviator had landed safely at Oreland a mighty shout went up, and later when it was announced that a new world's altitude record had probably been made the cheering was renewed.

Harmon and Grahame White at once leaped into an automobile and made a wild dash for Oreland. In less than two hours the three aviators were on their way back to the city.

Secretary Duffy and President Athol, of the Aero Club of Pennsylvania, were awaiting to make the official examination of the barograph which Mr. Drexel carried still under seal. After the announcement that Mr. Drexel had broken all aviation records for altitude the aviator expressed regret that he had not ascended higher.

"Had it not been for the rarefied atmosphere," said Mr. Drexel, "there is no telling how high I should have gone. The barograph shows how I worked to send the monoplane to a greater altitude, but it was impossible to do so."

Grahame White the British aviator characterized Drexel as the greatest altitude flyer in the world. He said: "Drexel is the fastest climber in the world. He can rise a yard when another man would only climb a foot. Ralph Johnstone took two hours and thirty minutes to establish his record of 9,714 feet while Drexel went even higher in less than one and one half hours."

Drexel's flight was made without any further incentive than to give the city of his birth a mark in the records of aviation. No prize had been offered for altitude flights, and the young aviator simply desired to show his friends in the city what he could do.

SOME EXAMPLES OF SOUND TORY DOCTRINE

(Halifax Recorder)

"We remained true and faithful to our King, our country and our party and to what he believes are the principles of the Liberal-Conservative party." It was thus that Mr. Blondin Tory member for Champlain, spoke Wednesday in the House of Commons about the late by-election campaign in Drummond-Arthursville.

Mr. Monk on the day previous declared that the speeches of the anti-Laurier campaigners in that constituency "contained sound Conservative doctrine." Now it might not be out of place to inquire just what the nature of some of these "principles of the Liberal-Conservative party" these "sound Conservative doctrines."

Mr. Blondin himself at one of the Arthursville meetings, said: "We owe nothing to Great Britain. England did not take Canada for love, or to plant the cross of religion, as the French did, but in order to plant their trading posts and make money. The only liberties we have are those we won by force, and today England tries to dominate its colonies as imperial Rome once did. This is 'sound Conservative doctrine.'"

At another gathering Mr. Bourassa thus delivered himself: "After having resisted for twelve years Sir Wilfrid has finally yielded under the pressure brought to bear by England and Earl Grey. The Prime Minister has consented to the construction of a navy which would be Canadian in time of peace and Imperial in time of war. He would urge the electors of the country to vote for Mr. Gilbert. If the Nationalist candidate were elected, several other counties in the province would follow this example. The Government would then have to so amend the bill as that the fleet would only serve in the defence of Canada."

This also, is doubtless true to the principles of the Conservative party. Again it was Mr. Blondin, Tory M. P. for Champlain, who voiced the following sentiments during the campaign.

You (the Liberals) are attempting to intimidate the electorate by shaking the English flag before it and by saying that we ought to contribute to the defence, in all places and

against all, of this protector of our constitutional liberties but we cannot be made to forget that in 1837 it was necessary to put holes in this flag with bullets to breathe the air of liberty.

Another soul-satisfying sample of "sound Conservative doctrine."

Mr. Alfred Levison was also ready with some more "doctrines" of the same sort. He is a Tory known and avowed, and these be his sentiments as spoken from the hustings in Drummond:

The navy is a conspiracy to down the Canadians. Laurier has consented after having betrayed us as regards our language, to man all the ships of war which we shall build or buy with French-Canadians. This will take fifty or sixty thousand men, all fathers of families or young men on the point of so becoming, who will have to go to Japan, China or Oceania, under the command of English officers, who wish to make our race disappear, and will see to it that these ships go to the bottom of the sea. Laurier has sold us to the English in return for the honors he has received and in twenty-five years there will be no French-Canadians left.

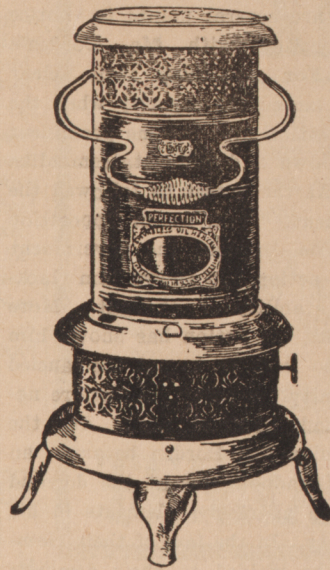
"Sound Conservative doctrine every word."

At another meeting the same gentleman said:

The Laurier Cabinet is a cabinet of imperialists who want to sacrifice Canada's interests to plunge us into wars with which we have nothing to do. The bill is an attempt by Ontario and the provinces of the west to coerce Quebec and enslave our people forever. What has England ever done for you? She has no need your help. She is strong enough to defend herself. Laurier's ideal is to make you the vassals of the majority of the west who have by a treaty robbed us of our rights in the past. You must protest by your votes against this slave traffic. You must protest against helping England in her wars; unless you do conscription will come next.

Mr. Tancred Marcell helped the cause of Imperialism and racial good feeling by this gentle reminder: "I come from the village of St. Eustache where the church still

WESTERN CATHOLICS HAVE RACE PROBLEM

Winnipeg, Man. Nov. 26.—Judging from the letters which are appearing in the Western press, the English-speaking Catholics are chafing somewhat at the Dominion of the French element in the Catholic Church. A bitter controversy has been carried on recently, which has been accentuated by the present clash of the various nationalities over the appointment of a new bishop for the diocese of Regina.

One of the most vigorous upholders of the English-speaking side of the question is an anonymous writer of Prince Albert, Sask., who has been writing voluminous letters to the Winnipeg press and signs himself Paddy. The letters have been widely quoted and have created a great deal of comment, and also, have called forth equally vigorous answers from defenders of Archbishop Langevin of St. Boniface.

Paddy in his latest letters takes exception to the figures which appear in Les Cloches de St. Boniface, as to the number of French and other Catholics in the West.

"All the hierarchy are French," says Paddy, "although according to their own figures the French Catholics are hopelessly in the minority. And the French clericals are not satisfied with having a French archbishop, three French bishops and a vicar-apostolic; they want another, a French bishop at Regina. The boldness of the game they are now playing to misrepresent the other Catholic nationalities in the West is only exceeded by the shallowness of their efforts."

Paddy proceeds to analyze the western immigration figures and claims that there are in the prairie provinces 171,913 English-speaking Catholics with only a bare half dozen priests to minister to them.

His summing up is as follows: "First—Bi-lingualism and French aggression have forced English-speaking Catholic students across the line. Although not in so many words they were very plainly given to understand that their room was more acceptable than their company. Hence our lack of priests."
