THE CONSERVATIVE LEADER THE CHAMPION ACROBAT

If ever the saying of Shakespeare were true and in the more questionable sense, that "one man in his time plays many parts" it is true of Mr. Borden. And his acrobatic stunts seem in a manner to agree with him, for the more cartwheels he turns the more vigorous and enthusiastic he becomes, so that the last speech delivered by him on the Navy was, comparatively speaking, a stunner. He has all of a sudden become very anxious about two things—first, the necessity of finding out exactly what the needs of the Empire are in regard to Imperial defence, and secondly to go to the country either in the form of a plebiscite or a direct electoral appeal in order to find out just what the people will do. The question might be asked, why all this anxiety at this late date? Less than two years ago, Mr. Borden required no further information to persuade him that the one thing needful in connection with the fulfilment of our duty in the defence of the Empire was the construction of a Canadian navy at the earliest possible moment. This was the duty of Canada, and there was little need either for extended discussion or to appeal to the electorate. The whole matter was as clear as a pikestaff. A few months later, Mr. Borden changed face and declared that "the needs of the Empire, the honor of Canada, expediency

economy, commonsense, common decency demanded the gift of money to the British Admiralty sufficient to build two Dreadnoughts. This was manifest to all. It needed no further proof, no further illustration. Delays were dangerous, and if we did not hasten, the "Armageddon" might be fought and lost in the North Sea. An appeal to the people would be an insult to their intelligence and a waste of time." Such in substance were the arguments used by Mr. Borden and his associates after the "Winnipeg delegation" came down to teach the leaders the catechism of the true faith. There was no fear of what the people thought. Popular opinion was declared without doubt to be on the side of the direct contribution, those opposed to this policy being classed as traitors or fools. After the debates in the House and the votes on the various amendments were taken, the whole opposition voted in favor of no action at all. But—"Oh, what a revolution!" as Burke exclaimed. Mr. Borden now asks that steps be taken to find out exactly what is needed in connection with Imperial defence, and the people then asked what they are going to do about it. Why this over-zealous caution at this time? What has become of Mr. Borden's certainty of less than two years ago that a Canadian navy was exactly what all the people wanted? Cambridge, Mass., Dec. 1—Before Mrs. Glover was cross examined, assistant district attorney asked her a few direct questions. She admitted that she was familiar with fire arms and that Hattie LeBlanc was with her husband and herself in an automobile at football in the afternoon before the shooting. Mrs. Glover said that in past years she has sent money and clothing to Hattie's family at West Arichat and had aided two of Hattie's sisters to come to the United States. The witness and Mr. Johnson gazed steadily at each other when the leading counsel for the defence rose to conduct the cross-examination. Mr. Johnson began by asking Mrs. Glover her name.

"Lillian Marc Leblanc Glover," was the reply.

"Did you ever have any other name?"

"No."

"Did you not receive letters from Maud Halliday Glover under the name of Minnie Everett Clark?"

"Yes."

By further questioning, Mr. Johnson brought out the fact that Mrs. Glover was introduced to her husband by Arthur Glover, his brother, and that both men used the name of Gardner.

UNCLE SAM OFFERING LAND TO SETTLERS

New York, Dec. 1—Arrived: Steam-er Regina D'Italia, Naples.

Washington, Dec. 1—American citizens desirous of engaging in farming may obtain an irrigated farm ranging in size from 20 to 80 acres free from Uncle Sam. About four hundred farms are now open to entry along the several irrigation projects controlled by the government, the chief expense incurred in obtaining one of these tracts, being the payment of the cost of water rights which amounts to from \$30 to \$60 an acre of irrigable land.

"The crop season of 1910 in the west, emphasized the value of irrigation as a sure crop producer," says a bulletin issued by the reclamation service. "It was the best year the farmers have known on the big projects of the government and many phenomenal crop yields are reported."
