### JACK LEON UNDER ARRESTED FOR KILLING BILLY DUNNING

Surviving Principal of Fatal Bout at Presque Isle Arrested at Eastport Monday.

Bangor, Me., Nov. 30.—Jack Leon, "the Russian Lion," who delivered the knockout blow in the fifth round of the boxing bout at Presque Isle last Thursday afternoon, with Billy Dunning, the death of the latter occurring nearly twenty-four hours later is in custody in Houlton, having been arrested at Eastport Monday on a charge of manslaughter. A hearing in the case will be held before Justice Thornton in Houlton at 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

The arrest of Leon came as a surprise to many, who have been watching the unfortunate affair at Presque Isle. Following Dunning's death, on Friday afternoon, an autopsy was held and the coroner's jury on Saturday returned a verdict that he came to his death by participating in a boxing contest for which he was physically unfit. No attempt was made to fix the responsibility.

Leon who had an engagement at Eastport, went to that city Saturday, and was put under surveillance by Sheriff Swett, at the request of the Aroostook authorities. His formal arrest was made Monday.

### NEAL BALL SOLD BY CLEVELAND TO PORTLAND

Cleveland, Nov. 29.—The Cleveland club owners today sold Neal Ball of triple play fame to the Portland Club of the Pacific Coast league. This is part of the deal by which Cleveland gets the pick of the Portland team, including a star pitcher, Gregg.

### A CONSERVATIVE M. P. CRITICIZES BORDEN

The Toronto World is a Conservative Journal which cannot follow leader Borden in his many changes of policy with regard to the navy.

"The Conservatives at Ottawa have had two cracks at defining their position in regard to the duty of Canada to herself and to the mother country in connection with naval defence. First of all they joined with the ruling Liberals in a unanimous declaration for a Canadian navy. This was at the opening of last session. Before the end of the session they withdrew from this position and substantially declared for an immediate vote for battleships and a reference of the question of a navy to the people. They are now declaring that nothing be done in the way of a navy until an appeal to the country has been made. This switching of position and this declaration to do nothing but consult the people is an instance of misguided policy. Political parties must keep their faith as individuals must \* \* \*. For a party that has the reputation of being conservative and pro-British and that assumed the responsibility of establishing a militia service for this country to say that it has not a

## THE CONSERVATIVE LEADERS' ALTERNATIVE PLANK

Boiled down, Mr. Borden's alternative plan comes to this. He would, if in office:

(1) Ascertain from the British Cabinet whether Great Britain is really in danger of attack and in want of money to repel it. In that case he would raise money in England on the credit of Canada and give it to the British government to send.

(2) He would, before proceeding further, re-organize the British Empire. Canada's humble status does not afford him sufficient scope. He is unwilling to proceed on the basis of Canada's hoeing her own row, wants to defend the whole British Empire or nothing, will do nothing unless Canada gets a "voice" in the councils of the empire which make decisions about peace or war.

(3) When he got the empire reorganized to suit him, and the precise share or proportion of control Canada should have definitely attached to her, he would ask Great Britain and the other nations and Canada to work out a scheme, and whatever they all, which means a majority of them, decided upon for Canada's share, he would have Canada adopt. What would happen if Canada declined to adopt it he does not foretell.

There is his policy as laid down and explained by himself. Nothing, except at the demand of the British Cabinet in extremis, and then money, borrowed money. Nothing until the Empire has been re-organized, as in all human probability it never will be, for Great Britain is not going to surrender her status of predominant partner in respect to any question involving the issue of life and death to herself, and neither are the self-governing Dominions going to part with their protection of equality in the attributes of nationhood. Nothing, in the third place, until a scheme has been submitted to and approved by the other nations to the Empire as embodying the part Canada ought to play in a general scheme.

How does this compare, in point of common manfulness, with the Laurier position? If we are guided by Laurier Canada will act now. Under him, Canada will envisage the future as a nation, study her responsibilities, take account of her limitations, act by herself, on the advice of her own ministers, reviewed by her own Parliament. How any Canadian can have any doubt as to which policy he should favor it is very hard to see.

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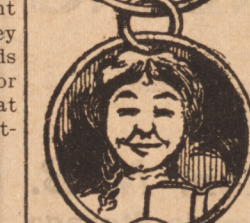
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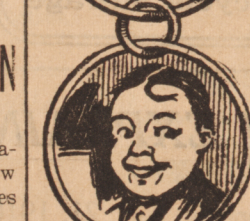
