

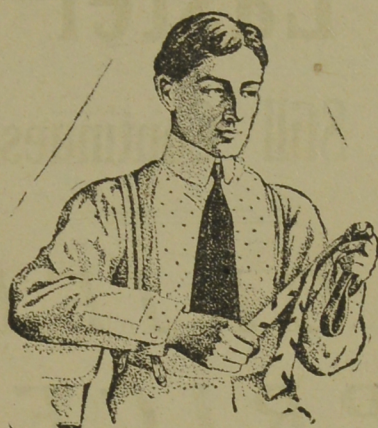

QUIET ELECTION

AT MARYSVILLE

One Old Alderman Reelected--Some
Surprises--Regular Meeting of
Chosen Friends.

Marysville, April 5--Civic election passed off quietly at the polling booths and it was not until the defeated and elected met at the Town Hall after the election that excitement became high. There were speeches by both parties.

In Ward No. 1, there was a great surprise as it has been thought that M. Merritt was certain of his election. In Ward No. 2, the only old Alderman, John Sloat was elected, with S. Pond, following closely.

In Ward No. 3, Haxlewood and Gilbert were elected. Two other candidates were in the field but on nomination day they retired. Yesterday they bobbed up serenely and came in for a few votes. The defeated men were, H. Nields and B. Pond.

In the Ward No. 4, Thos. Morrison lead with Duncan Robinson a good second. It is a lamentable fact that Horace Pugh was left but as he was a good man and not afraid to express an opinion. The vote was as follows:

WARD, NO 1--Wm. Harris 38, Daniel Pickard 36, F. M. Merritt, 35.

WARD NO. 2--John Sloat 46, S. Pond 38, W. Walker 32.

WARD NO. 3--Hazelwood 58, F. Gilbert 40, B. Pond 20, H. Wields 15.

WARD NO. 4--Thos. Morrison 83, D. Robinson 80, H. Pugh 32.

Last evening the regular meeting of the Marysville branch of the chosen friends was held. Two lady candidates were initiated. The organizer, Mr. Giberson was present. A large number were in attendance and a very satisfactory meeting was held. Mr. and Mrs. Chilion Hervey and son arrived here yesterday and are the guests of Mrs. Jas. Gibson. HIGGINS' SHOE FACTORY IN YARMOUTH BURNED

Yarmouth, N. S., April 4.--Only the shell of the Higgins shoe factory is left standing tonight, the contents having been destroyed by a fire that started at five o'clock this afternoon and was not got under control until four hours later.

The large number of employees were panic-stricken, but all managed to find their way to the lower story and escaped through the windows to the street, except two men who were surrounded by the flames in the fourth story and could be heard through the dense smoke calling for help. Ladders were placed within their reach, and they escaped with a few burns.

A third man had both arms badly burned and received internal injuries. The machinery and stock in the building are ruined. Mr. Higgins will not rebuild. The insurance is about \$29,500, and the loss about \$75,000. Some of the insurance is on an adjoining building, the stock in which escaped.

The fire started by the upsetting of a can of gasoline, which came in contact with a small oil stove which was burning and sitting on the same table.

TROUBLE OVER ANGLO AMERICAN INS. CO.

Toronto, April 4--Justice Sutherland has reserved judgment on the application of William McComb for an injunction restraining H. H. Beck, general manager of the Anglo-American Insurance Company, from transferring to Percy Thomson, of St. John, for \$60,000, shares of the company's stock to the number of 3,612. McComb alleges that for this controlling interest he was to pay Beck \$25,000 and \$6,000 for his own stock. McComb says Manager Beck refused to give him the terms of his agreement with Thomson. He thinks that there is a plan to upset his own agreement.

F. E. Dodgins, for the defendant, declared that Beck had tried to get the stock of his fellow directors to enable him to carry out the agreement and had not succeeded. He had done all he could.

MORE THAN A MILLION FOR N. S. EDUCATION

Halifax, N. S., April 4--According to a report in the house of assembly brought down today by Premier Murray, public education in Nova Scotia last year cost \$1,229,834. The technical college cost \$116,000, exclusive of equipment.

The mileage of highway in this province, according to the report of the road commissioner, is 18,000 miles and cost to the province for upkeep was \$247,500.

ROOSEVELT GUEST

OF KING OF ITALY

Rome, April 4--Twice today Theodore Roosevelt was the guest of King Victor Emmanuel. The king received the ex-president at an early hour at the Quirinal with particular warmth, and they talked for nearly an hour. This evening there was a grand dinner at the palace given by the king and queen in honor of Colonel Roosevelt and his family. The queen, herself, directed all the arrangements for this event.

The ex-president and his party arrived at the Quirinal palace at 8 p.m. After a short conversation all the guests, who included the American ambassador and Mrs. Leishman and the staff of the embassy, adjourned to the private dining room of the king in a spacious hall hung with modern tapestry and decorated with immense plants and flowers. The dinner was enlivened by the military band in the gardens below.

After the luncheon Mr. Roosevelt received Dr. Carlos Manuel Cespedes, the Cuban minister, who presented a message and greetings from the Cuban government. He also received Dr. Walling Clark, head of the Methodist organization in Rome.

A number of Italian journalists called on the ex-president this afternoon, but Mr. Roosevelt declined to discuss the Vatican incident. To a Swiss correspondent, he expressed regret that he would be unable to stop at Berne to see President Comtesse.

Richmond, Va., April 5--Joe Turner of Washington, defeated Carre Achmed, the Turkish champion in a wrestling match here last night taking two out of three rounds.

St. Louis, April 5--George Edward Waddell, pitcher for the St. Louis Americans and Miss Madge Maguire, of Hattsburg Miss., were married last night. Waddell recently obtained a divorce from his first wife, a Boston woman.

New York, April 5--Charles F. Conklin of the Chicago A. A., a former National champion, won the opening game of the tenth annual tournament of the National Association of amateur billiard players at the Hamilton Club, Brooklyn last night. His opponent was Dr. Walter E. Ufenheimer of Philadelphia and final score Ras 400 to 240. The game was 400 points up 18.2 Balke line, anchor barred and each man reached his 52nd inning the game was decided.
