SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion lanu in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta the applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties-... 3.50 Must reside upon the homestead

3.00 pre-emption six months in each of six 2.00 years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty A homesteader who has exhausted

Lessee and Manager. his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties-Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00. W. W. CORY
