NORTH ADAMS, MASS. IN THE DRY COLUMN

North Adams, Mass., Dec. 21.—After many years in the license column, with twenty-one saloons and several clubs, having the privilege of liquor selling, North Adams, at the annual city election today, swung over into the no-license ranks by a majority of one vote. The result was a surprise on every side, for the city had so long had a "yes" majority that even the temperance workers looked upon

their cause as hopeless. The vote today was: Yes, 1,478; no, 1,479. Last year there was a majority of 258 for license, the vote being, yes, 1,654 and no 1,396. There will probably be a recount.

Chas. L. Frink, Republican, was elected mayor today in a three-cornered fight. He led his nearest opponent, Dr. Wallace E. Brown, who styled himself an Independent Republican, by 394 votes, while Earl D. Getman ran third. The city government remains Republican as in the past.

OXFORD CANADIANS AFTER EUROPEAN HOCKEY TITLE

Rupert M. Rive Formerly of St. Joseph's College Playing on Team—Won Last Year.

As will be remembered, the Oxford University Canadian Hockey Club made a tour of Europe last year, and virtually won the European championship, but were not allowed to officially sport it, because they were an unattached club.

Last summer the club affiliated with the Canadian Amateur body, and they will play under its auspices this year.

Matches have been arranged in the following cities:

Brussels, Berlin, Leipzig, Dresden, Munich, Prague, St. Moritz, Samaden, Davos Platz, Les Avants, Chamouix, Paris.

In Bohemia (Prague), and in Switzerland, the team will have to play "bandy" instead of hockey. This game is very similar to hockey, but it is played with a ball instead of a puck, and a short stick resembling that used in the English game of field hockey. There are nine men a side. The tour will last from three weeks to a month, and starts on December 28th.

This club is composed exclusively of Canadians and Newfoundlanders in residence at Oxford, and has the distinction of being the champion ice hockey team of Europe "hors concours." By defeating the Prince's, (London) ice hockey team in London, on December 26th last, they successfully defended their title to the championship of England. The score was 8 to 5.

Rupert M. Rive, of Caraquet, who is playing with the Oxford Canadians, is well-known in Fredericton. He was formerly a student at St. Joseph's College and played here with the St. Joseph's football team. Mr. Rive also played football at Dalhousie University.

BLACK'S ALLEY TEAM BEAT FREDERICTON BY FIFTY-FIVE PINS

The Fredericton bowlers went down to defeat last night before the Black's alley team from St. John. The St. John men had a margin of 55 pins and the game well illustrated the uncertainties of bowling.

FREDERICTON HOCKEY CLUB ORGANIZED LAST NIGHT

Archie Sterling Will Represent New Organization at League Meeting at St. John—Prospects for Good Team are Bright—Club Will Complete Organization Friday.

It was decided to enter a Fredericton team in the New Brunswick Amateur Hockey League at a meeting held at the Arctic Rink last night. Archie Sterling was appointed a delegate to represent the club at the meeting to be held in St. John tonight. The meeting was not largely attended local hockey having been dead for some time past. There was enough enthusiasm however, to make a start and it is expected that the game will go. Arrangements were made with Manager Bruce Dixon of the Arctic Rink concerning concessions to players, practice hours, etc. The club will complete organization Friday night.

Among those present were, A. R. Babbitt, Archie Sterling, Jack L. Feeney, Herb. Endall, Sergt-Major Duncan, John Dolan, Wardlaw Kilburn, Fred McLean, C. W. Clark, George Clynick and G. Bruce Dixon. After some preliminary discussion A. R. Babbitt was appointed chairman of the meeting and C. W. Clark secretary.

On the motion of J. L. Feeney it was decided that the organization should be known as the Fredericton Hockey Club.

On the motion of J. L. Feeney it was accepted the conditions offered by Manager Dixon with regard to division of receipts and the financing of the club. The expense of sending a delegate to St. John will be borne by the rink management.

WHAT FREDERICTON WANTS

Archie Sterling was elected delegate to represent the club at the league meeting. Others were mentioned but all with the exception of Mr. Sterling found it impossible to go to St. John.

The Fredericton team will ask for a schedule giving the local team the first game on its home ice. He will this year.

It is expected that a schedule will be drawn up at the meeting tonight and that the series will be opened immediately after the new year.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
