Chicago, Sept. 2.—Following a conference between committees of the Illinois Coal operators association and the Illinois body of the United Workers of America yesterday, it was announced that the end of the strike of forty thousand coal miners is in sight and that today will probably see the end of the dispute which began April 1. Miners and operators have practically come to an agreement and all that remains for the two committees is the arrangement of details in connection with the settlement.

WEST INDIAN TRADE PROSPECTS ARE GOOD

Hon. Wm. Paterson Refuses to Confirm Report that Commission's Findings are Discouraging.

Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 2.—Hon. William Paterson, Minister of Customs, has returned to Ottawa after an absence of two months in Great Britain where he had been attending the meetings of the Imperial Commission on Trade between Canada and the West Indies.

Hon. Mr. Paterson said the report had been prepared, but as it was for the British Government, he was not at liberty to disclose the nature. He would not, however, confirm the report that the commission had been unable to discover any prospect for the development of greater trade between Canada and the West Indies.

On the contrary, he was of the opinion that there was every prospect for improving this commerce. Hon. Mr. Paterson will remain at his department until the opening of parliament for the coming season.

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
