WEST INDIAN TRADE PROSPECTS ARE GOOD

Hon. Wm. Paterson Refuses to Confirm Report that Commission's Findings are Discouraging. Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 2.—Hon. William Paterson, Minister of Customs, has returned to Ottawa after an absence of two months in Great Britain where he had been attending the meetings of the Imperial Commission on Trade between Canada and the West Indies. Hon. Mr. Paterson said the report had been prepared, but as it was for the British Government, he was not at liberty to disclose the nature. He would not, however, confirm the report that the commission had been unable to discover any prospect for the development of greater trade between Canada and the West Indies. On the contrary, he was of the opinion that there was every prospect for improving this commerce. Hon. Mr. Paterson will remain at his department until the opening of parliament for the coming season.


