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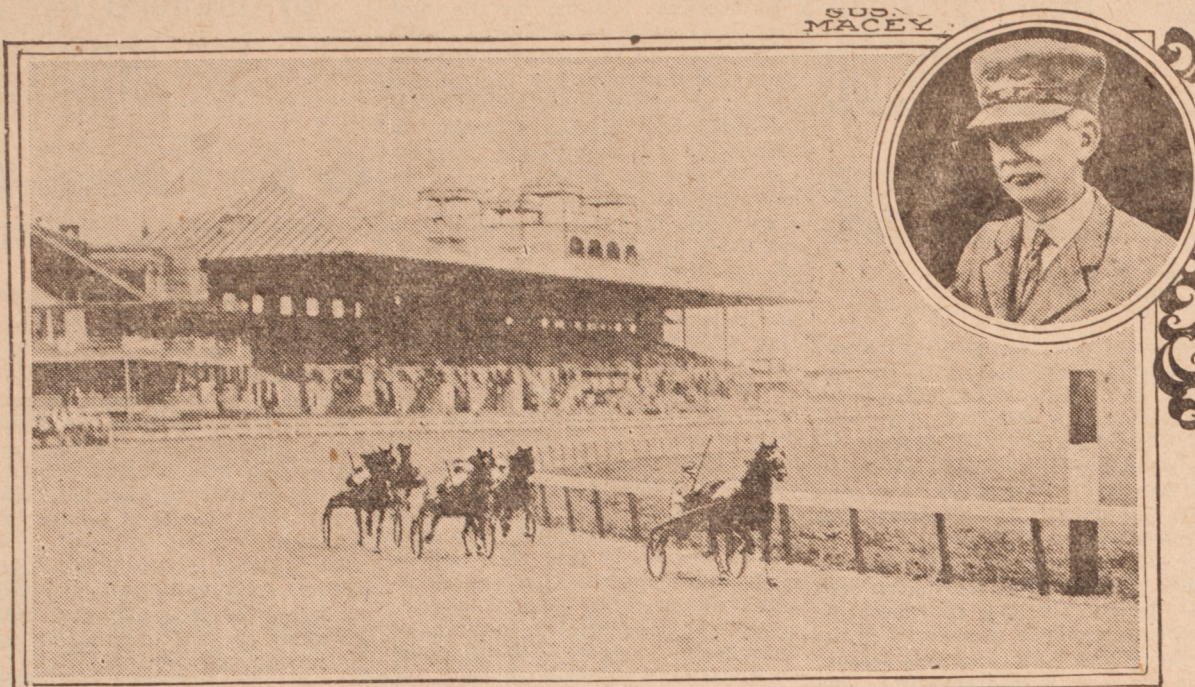

THE TROTTERS AT THE POLE. MATRON STAKES - COLORADO E. LEADING - 1ST HEAT.

New York, September 3.—In the fastest race ever trotted by three-year-olds the Western colt, Colorado E., owned by George H. Estabrook, of Denver, and driven by "Gus" Macey, made a show of five of the best young trotters in training at the opening of the New York Grand Circuit meeting, at Empire City Park, winning the \$15,000 Matron Futurity Stakes in 2:07½ and 2:07½, eased up at the finish of each heat. Seven thousand persons cheered the great colt with the enthusiasm of a baseball crowd as she crossed the finish line in the final round.

Starting for the first time as a three-year-old, Native Belle, 2:07½, holder of the world's record for two-year-old trotters, was wholly unable to go the clip with Colorado E. at any spot or place, and after making a break on the first turn in second heat the hitherto unbeaten filly fell back to fourth at the finish losing second money in the big stake to David M. Looh's Emily Ellen a black filly that was raised within sight of the course.

The wonderful speed of the Western colt stirred old horsemen to a high pitch, and all agreed that if Macey had not taken him back in the stretch each time he could have beaten the world's record for three-year-old trotters, now held by General Watts.

MARITIME CHAMPIONSHIPS.

In the Maritime Championships the holders of New Brunswick titles will play against the title holders from Nova Scotia. Mrs. H. R. Babbitt of Fredericton, will play in the Ladies' Singles and will play with Miss H. Babbitt in the Ladies' Doubles. Mr. A. R. Babbitt and Miss H. Babbitt play in the Mixed Doubles.

ALL-CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS.

The same players will play in the All-Canadian Championships next week. In addition to them, Messrs. John Stevens and P. Gregory will play in the Men's Singles and in the Men's Doubles. Mr. A. R. Babbitt will play with Mr. W. T. Wood, of Sackville, in the Men's Doubles. Mrs. H. R. Babbitt and Mr. W. R. Campbell of Rothesay, and Mr. P. Gregory and Miss M. Robertson of Rothesay, will play in the Mixed Doubles.

It is expected that the local players will certainly land some of the Maritime Championships and that their chances for the Canadian Championships are fairly good.

Ten years back Fredericton held the championship of the Maritime Provinces but since that time football has steadily gone back until the High School XV is the only city team in the game. Senior football has been kept alive here only by the U. N. B.

VETERANS WILLING

Last year a scratch team was got together which was able to give a very good account of itself against U. N. B. There is still good material in Fredericton and with a little practice it could be got into shape for hard play. B. team is at Fredericton Junction and would be available. There are also several High School boys heavy and fast enough for senior company.

EARLY START NECESSARY

She then swam back to the Fredericton shore, and leaped in the Court House slip. Shadeland Fausetta is now back in her stable and will not see St. John for some time.

FRANK HAYDEN WON TWO FIRSTS AND SECOND ON THURSDAY

Two Bad Mixups Marred Racing at
Waterville—Hayden Set Back For
Old Tricks.

Waterville, Me., Sept. 2.—Racing at the Central Maine fair yesterday was marred by two mixups, in which, although no one was seriously hurt, several drivers were bruised and shaken up.

In the third heat of the 2:40 trot as the horses were turning into the stretch on the first time round, there was a collision and drivers Richardson, Burrill and Willard were thrown to the ground. Willard narrowly escaped serious injury, a horse's hoof just grazing his head, inflicting a slight wound.

Richardson's horse was ruled out because of the driver's interference which, the judges decided, caused the accident.

2:18 CLASS, PACING.

In the first heat of the 2:29 class, in which there were 11 starters, a mixup occurred in almost the same spot as the first one. Five of the 11 drivers were thrown, and R. W. Burrill and Sprague were shaken up, although able to continue the race. The accident was caused by one of the horses falling.
