STORK HAS BEEN BUSY WITH CHICAGO STRIKERS

Chicago, Dec. 12.—Since the beginning of the strike of 40,000 garment workers a month ago 500, babies have been born among the strikers, according to the records kept by the relief committee. The committee now furnishes a supply of milk daily to 7500 babies whose parents are on strike. Every day there are 9,500 loaves of bread and 35 pounds of pan cake flour distributed to the hungry idle. Because of the different nationalities of the strikers the rationals at the various relief stations differ according to their location.

The Italians must be supplied with tomatoes, spaghetti and macaroni while the Poles desire barley lentils and codfish.

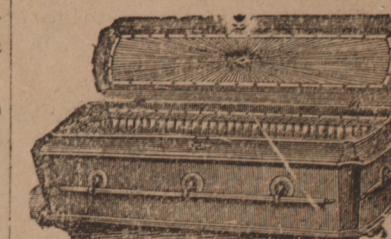
