CANADA TO CONTROL ITS COPYRIGHT LAW

Ottawa, Oct. 14.—The Hon. Sydney Fisher is now drafting a bill for presentation at the coming session of Parliament, which will give Canada its long-desired control over its own copyright law. When the Imperial Parliament reassembles, the Right Hon. Sidney Buxton will put through a bill under which this important concession to Canada will operate. It will amend and consolidate the law relating to copyright, and will treat the question from an Imperial as well as an international point of view.

Hon. Sydney Fisher, whose department administers copyright, and who was in England this summer in this connection, confirms the above announcements. "It is, he said, 'a complete emancipation for Canada, whose right to legislate on this subject has hitherto been denied, in spite of our strong and vigorous protests ever since the Mackenzie act was disallowed in Downing Street. It is more than I expected. I was surprised at the completeness of what I got. People in England were at first startled at the position I took but they proved to be amenable to reason. The conference that was held this summer was presided over by Mr. Buxton, President of the Board of Trade. There were present representatives of the Foreign, Colonial and other offices. Lord Tennyson represented Australia, Sir Richard Solomon South Africa, Sir William Hall Jones New Zealand, and Sir Edward Morris Newfoundland. The Society of Authors has always been a stumbling-block. I learned that it is now defunct."

"Has the British Government agreed to surrender its position on this matter in regard to Canada?" your correspondent asked Mr. Fisher. "Yes," he said, "the Government has pledged itself, and British legislation will remove from us the disability to legislate for ourselves on foreign copyright. It repeals the Imperial act of 1842 and adheres to the Berlin convention of two years ago, then agreed to subject to the ratification of Parliament. The British bill will adhere to that convention with a proviso that Canada and each part of the Empire may adhere or not as they like."

"Do you propose that the Dominion Parliament shall pass an act concurrently with the Imperial Parliament?"

"Yes, I am now preparing a bill to be introduced in the House of Commons this forthcoming session. It will assume full control. That is

a thing for which we have been fighting for many years, particularly the last twenty, and the victory is very important. I will propose to form our new copyright law as much as possible to the Berlin convention. In the United Kingdom the duration of copyright is life and seven years, of 42 years, which ever is the longer. The new act will extend this period to life and fifty years. It is likely that Canada will adopt that."

"How about our relations with the United States, against which Canadian publishers, bookbinders and printers so strongly protest?"

"This," said Mr. Fisher, "will dispense with giving the Canadian market to United States publishers in virtue of British copyright. Hereafter such copyright will not run in Canada. Hitherto it has, because a British copyright obtained by a United States author or under which United States publishers acquired the United States territory was also in force in Canada and the Canadian field went with it. I regard this as extremely important. The Berlin convention does away with formalities, that is to say, what would be in Canada registration and printing in Canada. I am not prepared to say that I will agree with that part of the convention, and in adhering to the Berlin convention, I would do so in a modified form. Before leaving for England, Mr. Morang came to see me, and although I was possessed of his views I obtained them afresh."

"This Canadian bill will also be of an Imperial character. I think we ought to recognize British copyright by British authors, and as the British Government has agreed to recognize Canadian copyright, we hope to get absolute reciprocity within the Empire. The British author would simply be required to register here. The bill now being prepared in this department adopts the principle of international copyright as far as it applies to our own people."

Mr. Fisher did not go particularly into the whole question pending the presentation of this bill to Parliament, nor say anything as to copyright in music and pictures, but the bill will deal with those from the point of view of Canadian interests. The Minister of agriculture added:

"I expect that the bill will arouse some controversy, but I feel sure that when it is understood, it will meet with general acceptance."

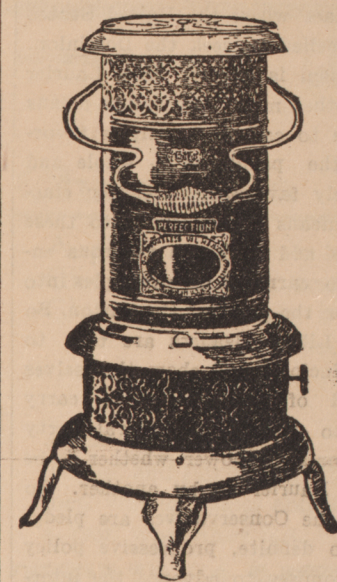
AVIATORS TRYING TO WIN \$35,000 PRIZE
