DR. BAILEY LECTURED ON  
HISTORY OF THE ROCKS

The Fredericton Natural History Society was addressed last evening by Dr. L. W. Bailey, on the subject of "What the Rocks Have to Tell Us." The lecturer gave a striking outline of the marvellous history of the earth as revealed by the rocks. The antiquarian could surely find nothing more interesting than the records of the rocks, for they went back millions of years—even life on the planet had a record, it was estimated, of thousands of millions of years. Some of the records from which this estimate of age was made were the limestone formations, the coral reefs, the coal deposits, and the denudation which had taken place on such a colossal scale. The earth's history had no meaning if creation had been instantaneous. The leaves in the book of rocks had written upon climatic changes which must register aeons of time. Dr. Bailey likened the development of animal life on the earth to a tree, having one kind of life for the beginning and which kept branching, until we find the great variety of animals today. He also referred to the geographies the rocks revealed, and had drawn on the black-board the outline of the continent at different stages of geological change. Reference was also made to the magnitude and direction of the mighty forces which have been at work in producing these geographical changes. In all this great work there had been an orderly plan, the purpose of which seemed to be the preparation of the earth for the advent of man.

SEVERAL LOCAL  
PEOPLE IN STORM  
SWEEP WEST INDIES

Messrs Frank Sherman, Fred Dever, Jasper A. Winslow and Others--Tampa Man Here.

The telegraphic reports of the tremendous storm or series of cyclones which has swept over the West Indies doing great damage particularly in Cuba, has caused some anxiety on the part of the friends and relatives of persons from this city and vicinity who are living in the West Indies. Mr. Frank Sherman, son of Mrs. L. W. Sherman of this city, who is manager of the West Indian branches of the Royal Bank of Canada, makes Havana his headquarters. Mr. Fred Dever, eldest son of Mrs. Margaret Dever of Milwaukee, formerly of this city is manager of the Sagua branch of the Royal Bank of Canada. Mr. Jasper A. Winslow, brother of Messrs. F. E. Winslow and J. J. P. Winslow of this city is in a brokerage office in Havana. Mr. A. H. Rowley, son of Mr. Alfred Rowley of Marysville, is located in Kingston, Jamaica, where he is manager of a branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia.

## NO WORD FROM THEM

Reports received this morning were to the effect that owing to a break in the sea-wall a large portion of the city of Havana had been inundated. No word has been received from the Fredericton people in that city or elsewhere on the island, and as all telegraphic communication with Cuba has been broken off, it is not likely that any news from them will come through for some time. They are no doubt suffering much discomfort.

The last advices from Mr. Frank Sherman were to the effect that he had left Cuba for Port of Spain, Trinidad, so it is possible that he is not in the zone of the most violent portion of the storm. Jamaica, however, as well as Cuba, has been storm swept.

INDIANA LADY  
SHOT BIG MOOSE  
ON MIRAMICHI

Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Sipe Return From Successful Trip to Sisters Lakes--Florida Man Had Good Luck.

Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Sipe, of Indianapolis, Indiana, are at the Queen today en route home after a successful hunting trip to the Sister Lakes, on the Miramichi. They had Uncle Ben Norrad of Bloomfield Ridge for guide, and each succeeded in getting a nice moose.

Mrs. Sipe shot a moose at a range of one hundred yards. It was a particularly good specimen and had an antler spread of forty-nine inches. The moose shot by Mr. Sipe had a horn measurement of forty-seven and one-half inches. He says that the animal was feeding on the shore of the lake, six hundred yards away, when he opened fire. As Mr. Sipe is an experienced sportsman, and unaccustomed to drawing the long bow his statement may be accepted without any mental reservation.

Mr. Sipe visited New Brunswick for the first time last year and shot a moose. This is Mrs. Sipe's first hunting trip to the east and the moose which she shot was her first.

Mr. and Mrs. Sipe arranged with their guide to drive a domestic cow into camp, and as a result of this precaution they were well supplied with fresh milk and cream during their sojourn in the woods.

Mr. and Mrs. Sipe will leave for home by this evening's train. Mr. J. C. Beckwith, a veteran sportsman of Tampa, Fla., is at the Barker today en route home from a hunting trip to Cain's River. He had Mr. William Russell of Doaktown, for guide, and secured a moose and caribou, both good specimens.

## TAMPA MAN HERE

This morning the southern portion of Florida was suffering from the effects of the storm and another cyclone was expected. Tampa, which is in the southern part of the state, suffered severely from the storm. Mr. W. H. Beckwith, who reached the city today returning from a hunting trip to the Miramichi, is a resident of Tampa.
