## THE CHURCH AND AMUSEMENTS

(St. John Telegraph)

We are all opposed to bad plays and degraded theatres; but few of us are opposed to an enlightened drama and decent theatres. The stage is hammered by reformers, we assume is the stage that exalts impurpose of the box office. Therefore, in giving reign to denunciation it is well to discriminate, to keep the shaft on the centre of the target, and to leave, definitely that which we are shooting at. "General Inevitable," as Viscount Morley said pointedly once upon a time, has its humorous features.

The shrill protests that come from Dr. Torrey are rather in striking contrast in the days news which says "Leading ministers in New York city have joined in the chorus of approval voiced by press and public for Klaw and Erlanger's production of Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm, at the Republic Theatre. Kate Douglas Wiggin the author gave an invitation matinee for the clergy and educators which was a remarkable gathering." In view of those things the average man will be likely to ask: "Where are we at?" If we are to take the evangelist seriously, the view is really pathetic. It is as if a kettle of broth were cooking quietly on the fire when some one should come in and add a great paill of raw meats and spices—a rich combination possibly but one likely to require much boiling. Many who have been in the habit of enjoying the theatre occasionally, who might have been inclined to say with Lord Clive: "Gad, sir at this moment I stand amazed at my own moderation," will be surprised to hear that their course is altogether victorious. Under these conditions, values threaten to become topsy-turvy and moral leadership increasingly difficult.

We have not yet worked our way through to just discrimination on the subject. Our appeals are, hopelessly unceremonial and without authority. Every one knows that church discipline has broken down completely in the large cities as far as dramatic entertainments are concerned. Some churches have attempted to meet the need for impersonations of character and life by giving shows of their own—frequently awkward, cheap miserable failures. On this subject we have nothing consistent to say to youth. The one thing that is certain is tunculation without discrimination overshoots the mark, reacts upon the speaker and robs him of moral influence. A serious economist like Jevons says with careful emphasis: "Among the means toward a higher civilization, I unhesitatingly assert that the cultivation of public amusement is a principal one." Play is a spiritual activity and the plays of children are the germinal leaves of all later life.

The influence of a true religion does not issue in asceticism, but in abundant life. Bread will not gratify the desire for music. Piety does not remove the need for recreation, for song or for pictures. There is a time for everything. Healthy religion flows into all the interests of life and sanctifies them. Lowell brings out this idea when he laid bare with just severity the helpless, futile and irrational mode of dealing with degraded men by merely negative means. He says: "They would hold their peace about the body of Sufee dancing to music of a cartwhip, provided only they could have the soul of Sambo alive by presenting him a pamphlet, which he could not read on the depravity of the double shuffle." By chastising with scorpions the pleasant vices of a people and uttering curses, bitter as quinine, against their recreations, we are apt to place religion in a false perspective, seeing peccadillos as crimes and crimes as peccadillos. The men who make merchandise of the law, pollute the wells of knowledge, who foil the plain public, intent, who make justice a mockery must be delighted to find the church exalt personal habits above social welfare.

We have never quite forgiven Shakespeare, the greatest soul who has lived since the prophets, for being an

## SOME FACTS CONCERNING THE TORY NATIONALIST ALLIANCE

(Toronto Globe)

When the results of the Drummond-Arthabaska election was announced Mr. George Taylor, M. P., who for a quarter of a century has been one of the leading Conservative members in the House of Commons, telegraphed to Mr. F. D. Monk, the former Tory leader in Quebec, who had joined forces with Mr. Bourassa: "Accept heartiest congratulations on your great fight and success." It was supposed that Mr. Borden, the leader of the Opposition, would plainly indicate that he was opposed to Mr. Monk's policy, and would dissociate himself from the congratulatory message of Mr. Taylor. Not a word, however, has come from Mr. Borden indicating that he disagrees with Mr. Taylor. It must be supposed, therefore, that the result in Drummond-Arthabaska is a subject for rejoicing among the Conservative leaders, whatever it may be among the rank and file of the party who still have some regard for principle.

On what was the victory of the Nationalist-Tory combination in the recent election founded? Let the records in Mr. Bourassa's own paper, Le Devoir, answer. Mr. Blondin, a Conservative member of the House of Commons, speaking at St. Louis de Blandford, as reported in Le Devoir of October 26, said: "You are intimidating the people in waving the English flag, and adding that we must contribute always and everywhere to the defence of that tormentor of our constitutional liberties, but we will not be made to forget that in 1837 it was necessary to bore holes in it in order to breathe the atmosphere of liberty." The English have never done anything for the French-Canadians. We do not owe them anything French-Canadians have nothing to care about the opinion of the other Provinces upon this naval question. They can and must settle the questions which concern them without consulting others. Those very ones who disembowelled our forefathers on the Plains of Abraham ask of you today to be slaughtered for their sake."

Four days later at Victoriaville this Conservative member, whose efforts received a "well done" in Mr. Taylor's telegram, said: "England has gone so far as to grind down (pressure) the colonies as did Imperial Rome of old. The only liberties which we enjoy have been snatched. England has not conquered Canada for love or to plant the cross of Christ as did France, but to establish trading posts and make money. She has sowed the world with hatred, quarrels, and wars. We have had enough of England and the English."

These are not the absurdities of some inexperienced young Nationalist orator. They are the words of a Conservative member of Parliament uttered in cold blood during a campaign in which Mr. Monk, the titular leader of the Quebec Conservatives, supported the Nationalist candidate, receiving afterwards the blessing of Mr. Taylor. Now, no one supposes that Mr. Taylor has the least sympathy with any man who declares that "England grinds down the colonies as did Imperial Rome of old." He would be indignant were he to be denounced as a renegade Briton. Yes, he is pleased when Mr. Monk and his allies snatch a victory by such despicable tactics as those of Mr. Blondin and Mr. Bourassa. What do the Conservatives of Ontario and the most think of the unholy alliance between patriotic Conservatives represented by Mr. Taylor and the anti-British Blues of Quebec represented by Monk and Mr. Blondin? It is all very well to say that the Liberals must deal with Mr. Gilbert, who is still nominally of the Rouge stripe, but Mr. Borden will have a very lively

time when he tries to weld the anti-British Blues and the Conservatives of English-speaking Canada into a harmonious party. He will discover that whatever the party leaders at Ottawa think, the English-speaking people of this country will have no dealings with men who hold up their motherland to scorn as the oppressor of the weak and the promoter of hatreds and wars.

## THE POOR COW MUST GO

From the records in the office of the Dairy Commissioner, Ottawa, received from members of Cow Testing Association, it appears that in the month of August the average yield of 3,000 cows recorded in Ontario was 776 pounds of milk, 3.4 test, and 26 pounds of fat.

On dividing these cows into two groups, those yielding below that average and those above, it is found that 1,430 cows give an average of only 658 pounds of milk and 23 pounds of fat.

Thus, had their yield been equal to only the average of all the 3,000 cows they would each have given 118 pounds of milk more, or a total yield of an extra 168,740 pounds of milk. What a pity they did not!

The second group, those yielding above the average, includes the remaining 1,570 cows which produced 383 pounds of milk, or 107 pounds above the average of the 3,000 cows and actually 225 pounds of milk above the average of the 1,430 poor cows.

The earnings of the good cows amounted to the huge sum of \$4,439 more, in the one month, than the earnings of the poor cows.

This begins to open our eyes to the tremendous possibilities of increased revenue from keeping better cows. Why should we remain content with only "average" cows? The poor cow must go.

Toronto, Nov. 20.—Four men belonging to Sault Ste Marie, Ontario, were drowned in St. Mary's river this morning, when a small boat in which they were making a trip from the United States side to Canada was swamped by a wave.

Fred Parker, aged twenty-four; Cecil Brown, seventeen; Reginald Levi, eighteen, and John Sherwood, boatman, aged forty-five, were the victims.

Sherwood was in the habit of ferrying people across the Soo during the night, and although frequently warned of the danger, continued the practice. His boat was overloaded this time, and the night was rough and stormy. Clifford Dilks, Forman Tragenza and Alex. Biron, who were with the party, clung to the upturned boat and were rescued.
