LUMBERMEN ARE BEGINNING TO WISH FOR SNOWFALL

Little Snow in Woods—Ice Formed all Along River But Steamers Still Run.

The lumbermen are beginning to wish for snow to help them in their operations. Reports from various sections of the province are to the effect that snow has been very light in most parts and lacking altogether in others. There have been exceptions to this rule, however. In the southern part of Queens County a short time ago there was a fall of several inches.

This morning snow began to fall and the fall is reported to have been general in the central part of the province. It ceased this afternoon, however, and the weather turned soft. Those who are weather-wise predict snow in considerable quantities before the end of the month, however.

ICE IN RIVER.

The drop in temperature of the last few days has caused rivermen to turn their attention to the close of navigation. Last year steamers ran on the river until November 29th, but frequently the river has closed earlier than this date. Last night ice formed all along the river. Telephone reports received today from McGowan's by the local agent of the Star Line S. S. Company, were to the effect that ice had formed there during the night but had been broken up during the day. The ice in the neighborhood of the city was about an inch and a half in thickness.

STEAMERS STILL RUNNING

The Senate of the University of New Brunswick met in annual session at the Education office this morning and after passing accounts hearing of the report of the Chancellor of the University and attending to routine business adjourned to meet at three o'clock this afternoon in the Arts Building of the University. At that hour the members of the Senate heard the reports of the University faculty.

FIVE SCHOLARSHIPS PROMISED SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE

Council of Board of Trade Will Give That Number--Hoped to Secure at Least Thirty.

The Council of the Board of Trade met last night and decided to give five scholarships of twenty dollars each to the Summer School of Science which will meet here in July and August of 1911. It is the aim of those promoting the school to have at least thirty scholarships to offer to teachers attending the school. Dr. S. A. Starr of Massachusetts, president of the school has guaranteed five scholarships from outside this province and it is thought that that number may be doubled. An attempt will be made to get at least twenty scholarships in New Brunswick. Mr. T. B. Kidner is local secretary for the Summer School of Science and is meeting with success in obtaining scholarships. It is probable that the Eastern Steamship Company which runs steamers between Boston and St. John may take steps to attract American teachers to the school to be held here next summer. The statement published to the effect that Yarmouth was attempting to get the Summer School of Science was incorrect.

The meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade last night was not largely attended and on that account the matter of the petition of the residents of Tracy for the appointment of a station-agent and of the establishment of an all-day electric light and power service in Fredericton was not taken up. In all probability the Council will discuss these questions at a later date.

The all-day electric service will be a fact during the winter months but it is understood to be an uncertainty whether it will be made permanent.

MOOSEHEADS ARRIVING.
