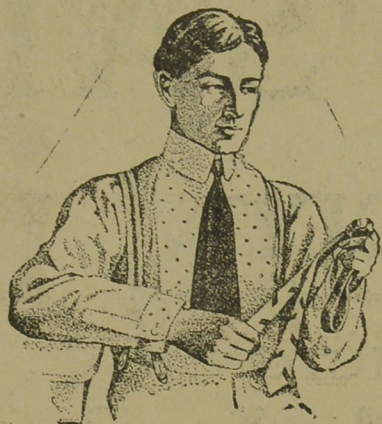

SUFFRAGETTE SPEAKS IN ONTARIO HOUSE

Toronto, March 20.—Miss Olivia Smith, of London (Eng.), created a scene at the close of the legislature Saturday morning by leaning from the speaker's gallery before the Lieutenant Governor had finished his speech and demanding votes for women.

"There is one thing that I wish to draw your attention to," she said in a quiet, mild voice. "It is something you have forgotten in your deliberations. You have done nothing for the cause of women. I hope that in your future meetings you will do something to do justice to women."

The little speech was heard in breathless silence and while it was going on the Lieutenant Governor left the chamber. As soon as he had withdrawn there was a general stampede. By the time the people arrived the woman had made good her escape.

No one seemed to know who she was as she did not happen to be any of the leaders of the movement in Toronto. She is a well known English suffragette, and served terms in the old country for her devotion to the cause.

DRESSMAKER HEIR TO FORTUNE

Brattleboro, Vt., March 19.—Mrs. Harriet B. Howard, a dressmaker, has been notified that she became heiress to \$1,000,000 by the death in Dublin, Ireland, of her grandmother, Margaret Savage who left \$12,000,000.

FINANCIAL

New York, March 21.—Dealings in stocks ran down near the point of idleness as the hour approached for the assembling of the supreme court at Washington. Doubts whether the American Tobacco decision would be handed down restricted operations. Fears were expressed that the Western Railroad firemen would strike. The terms of the subscription to New York bonds to be opened at two p. m., were awaited. The special strength of the coal-carriers seemed to be due to hopeful feeling of a labor adjustment with coal miners. Hocking Valley certificates rose 3, Reading 1½, and Southern Pacific, the Wabashes, Brooklyn Transit, Interboro-Metropolitan, pfd., Virginia, Carolina Chemical and Pressed Steel car about a point.

The tone was strong at noon. Bonds were heavy. New York City bond issues sold off at low record figures, and making a bad impression for the success of the new issue. The new 4½'s, when issued, sold down to 101½ in the outside market, the lowest price yet quoted.

Other features were Toronto 125, Shawinigan, 103½, Steel 70, pfd., 107½, Lake of the Woods, 146, Scotia, 88, Coal, 82, Twin City, 114, Quebec, 36, Textile 73½.

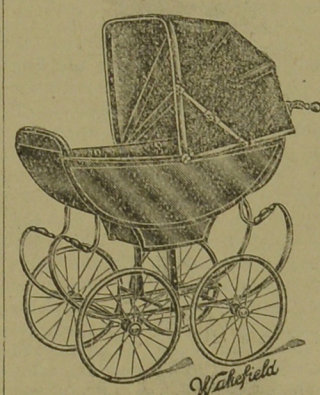
