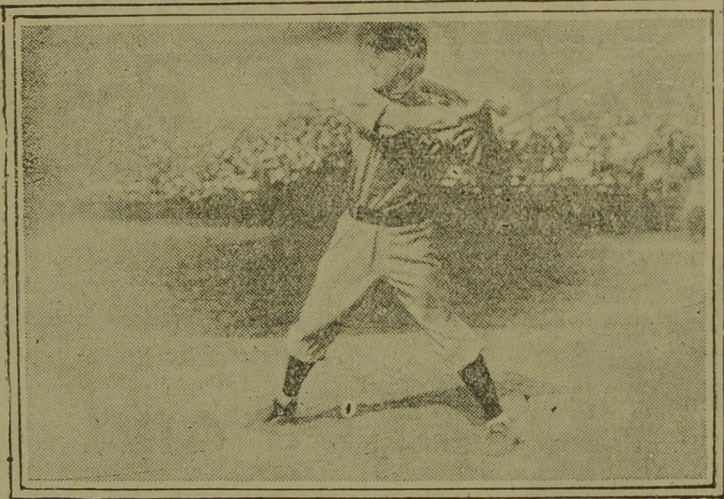

SHRUBB TO APPEAR IN VAUDEVILLE

Long Distance Runner Will Exhibit Running Machine, His Own Invention, on Stage.

Toronto, March 21.—Alfred Shrubbs The great little runner has turned his thoughts to things theatrical, and is awaiting final arrangements to appear in vaudeville during the spring season. He has invented a running machine, on which he will run, doing different stunts to show the public how a man ought to train, and how the strides differ in sprints and long distance races. About twelve months ago Alfie thought of the plan to construct a running machine, and the perfected model now stands over in the Royal Alexandra Theatre, where he has a try out every day to become accustomed to it.

The machine, which Alfie has had patented in three countries, the United States, Canada and England, is twenty feet long, while the cotton belt is three feet wide. Unlike all the home trainers constructed so far, there is no sag in the endless belt, while the top surface is perfectly level the belt sliding over a sheet iron bar which is composed of four sections. On the ends there are large hollow drums, which can be extended outwards to tighten the belt. The machine is driven by a three horse power motor, with a controller to regulate

late the speed. With the motor now attached a speed of twenty-five miles an hour can be attained, which means that a runner would have to go at about the rate of a mile in three minutes. Of course he could not keep this up long. By regulating the speed, Alfie Shrubbs intends to show the stride of sprinters compared to Marathoners, while he can also show the proper position to hold the hands and also the proper action of the legs.

TOMMY BURNS IS SICK

Sydney, N. S. W., March 20.—"Tommy Burns," the Canadian pugilist, is suffering from gastritis and his fight with "Bill" Lang for the heavyweight championship of Australia, which was scheduled for March 28, has been postponed until April 20.

London, March 19.—Victory perched on the banners of Old England today in the first of the three great football contests of the season, when the Scotland rugby team went down before the English fifteen 14 points to 5. Cheering thousands saw the champions score the winning goal and the result was never in doubt. This ends the rugby season with England undisputed champions. On Saturday next the semi-finals for the association championship will be played. As the result of the draw, Swindon will play Newcastle United and Barnsley will clash with Everton. The final between the two winners will be played on Saturday, April 23rd.

TOMMY RYAN COACHES

JOHNSON FOR REVENGE

Tommy Ryan, once given newspaper credit for being champion middleweight of the world, one of the cleverest, and certainly one of the most unpopular fighters who ever climbed through the ropes, will not gain in the esteem of the sporting world by training Jack Johnson for his coming fight with Jim Jeffries. Training Johnson naturally implies, that he will be the negro champion's chief adviser in the ring at Emeryville, July 4.

It isn't so much that Ryan will second a black man against a white man in a championship battle. That would be passed up by the sports as one of Ryan's little vagaries. He has had a good many of them. But it is so certain that Ryan has hooked up with Johnson merely to spite Jeffries that the sports won't relish his appearance in the negro's corner.

There is no doubt that Ryan is responsible for Jeffries winning the world's championship from Fitzsimmons and defending it against so clever a boxer as Corbett. Ryan went down to Allenhurst, N.J., where Jeffries was training for his first fight with Bob Fitzsimmons in 1899 and taught the giant Californian how to box. Ryan cut Jeffries to pieces giving these boxing lessons, but it was the only way to teach the big boilermaker how to fight.

Several years later Ryan and Jeffries had a serious falling out over money matters and have been at swords' points ever since. From pouring out personal abuse in torrents, they got so that they didn't speak as they passed by, and they have been bitter enemies ever since.

Ryan expressed a willingness several months ago to patch up the quarrel and assist Jeff in his training but he was turned down cold.

Ryan is now out for revenge. It is a business proposition with him and he doesn't care a boot for the criticism. Ryan some weeks ago expressed the opinion that in a long fight Jeffries cannot stand the wear and tear because of his long absence from the ring. It is likely that he will coach Johnson in tactics to prolong the battle. And when Jeffries sees Ryan in the negro's corner he will be doubtfully anxious to win in jig time.

According to Monte Cross, manager of the Scranton team, the Montreal Club has offered him \$1,000 for the release of Martel, the former Philadelphia National League catcher who objects to going to the New York State Leagues.

ABOUT THE BOXERS.

Porky Flynn has accepted an offer from Tom O'Rourke of New York to box Sailor Burke or Jim Savage on April 4.

Curley Watson, one of England's best welterweights, died in his dressing room after a bout with a colored boxer in London the other night.

Eddie Murphy and Young Donahue of Roxbury will meet again tonight at Brockton. It is good betting this bout will not end in a draw.

Frank Picato of California, who defeated Dave Deshler in New Orleans, arrived in Boston Thursday with his manager, Rawhide Kelly. Picato is ready to meet any of the light weights.

Old Prof. Joe Robinson boxed in a 12-round draw with Bobby Dobbs, who is about as old as himself, in Hull, England, the other night. The following night in the same city, Dobbs made Harry Rowe quit in 13 rounds.

Joey Bowker, the ex-bantam champion of England, who was a big failure on this side last year, showed in the ring at London the other night and made Andouy, the featherweight champion of France, quit in eight rounds.

Umpire Tommy Connolly of the American league has been ordered to report at Philadelphia April 1, for the series between the Athletics and Philadelphia Nationals.

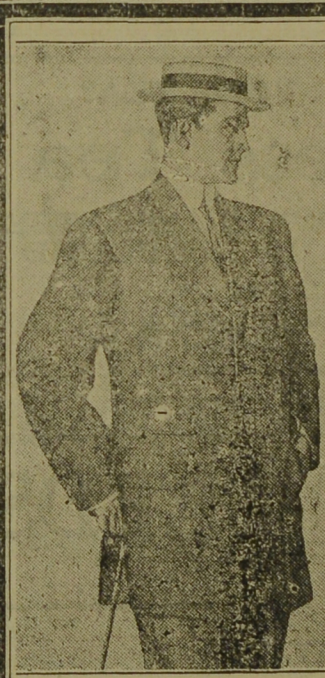
The Doves will play their first championship game at the Huntington-av grounds four weeks from Friday.
