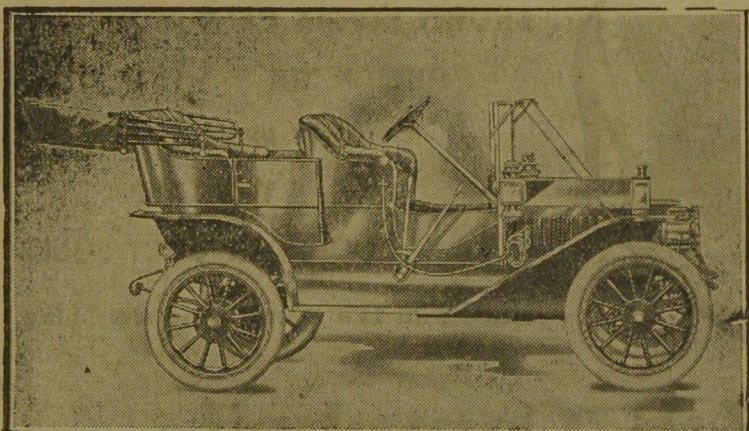

U. N. B. TRACK TEAM IN TRIAL MEET TODAY

Athletes will be Tried Out at College Field—Track Being Improved—Other Teams.

The U. N. B. track team will have a trial meet at the College Field today to get a line on what the men may do at the Intercollegiate Track Meet to be held in St. Stephen on May 27th.

This year the U. N. B. men have said little concerning the prospects of the team, but have been putting in some pretty hard work. The team is known to be weak in sprinters, but even in this department may spring some surprises. In the other departments the team is fairly strong and is looking for some points.

At Windsor the other night several athletes who will in all probability figure on the Acadia team competed. The Acadia men did nothing remarkable, but that can hardly be taken as an indication of what the Garnet and Blue will do at St. Stephen. Very little is known of the Mt. Allison team.

The track at College Field has had a lot of work done upon it this year. The track has been relaid with cinders and rolled. The horse roller belonging to the city has been used, but is hardly heavy enough. It is the intention to get Contractor R. S. Low's steam roller, which is to be used at Scully's Grove to put the field in shape for the Cricket Club.

REFEREE DIFFICULTY STILL UNSETTLED

San Francisco, Calif., May 13.—Although Promoter Tex Rickard is plainly apprehensive that the opposing fight factions may not be able to agree on a referee at Monday's conference, both Johnson and his manager, George Little, profess confidence in the settlement of the problem on the appointed date. Johnson said last night that he was certain to put one of his own choice in the much mooted place, intimating that Jeffries would give in, but reports from Ben Lomond fall short of bearing out the negro champion's expectations. Jeffries apparently is as firmly resolved to stand by his own selections as Johnson is by his, and unless the situation clears surprisingly in the interval, a deadlock is likely. Sam Berger is expected here today and Rickards is planning to bring about a preliminary conference between Jeffries' manager and Johnson in the hope of adjusting the difficulty.

"I believe," said Rickard, "that if I can get these two together before Monday they will come to an agreement. There is no reason why they should not decide on a Californian. Californians have refereed most of the championship fights for the last ten years and I am strong for having one of them this time."

WHAT IS ON THE NEW GLASGOW TRACK

TIM O'ROURKE SAYS CAMERON IS A WONDER

Amherst Man Through with Marathon Runs—Style Faultless and Reserve Power Plentiful.

Tim O'Rourke, who took Jim Corkery to Amherst, N. S., for his races with Fred Cameron, the Boston Marathon winner, returned last night. The daddy of the Irish Canadians is enthusiastic in his praises of the Blue-nose runner.

"Cameron is one great boy," says Mr. O'Rourke. "His successes have set the people crazy down there and they enthuse over him like the whole of Canada did over Tom Longboat when the Indian was at his best. The Amherst lad has wonderful speed and no matter how fast he is called upon to run always appears to have something in reserve. His style is faultless, he is a fine judge of pace and knows what he is doing every foot of a race. Corkery was only beaten a few inches in his second race with Cameron. The Toronto runner lost ground on every turn, but made it up on the stretches. I honestly think that Jim can beat the Nova Scotian over a quarter mile track. Cameron told me that he had done with Marathons, as there are only one or two good ones in a man, and they are a strain on the heart. I think he is right, too. He is a quiet, good living fellow, who takes his successes with becoming modesty."

Jim Corkery will remain in the east for a couple of weeks. He will run at St. John on May 17 and may enter some of the Victoria Day meets on the coast. Cameron is considering the advisability of coming to Toronto for the Eaton meet in June.

MAY DEFEND WIFE FROM INSULT, EVEN BY KILLING

Atlanta, May 13.—That a man has a right to forcibly defend his wife from insult and use all the force necessary was the opinion of the Court of Appeals handed down today in reversing the lower court in the case of Frank Rossi of Rome, who was found guilty of voluntary manslaughter for the death of Edward Harris.

In this case the Judge in the lower court charged the jury "that a mere indecent proposal to the wife of a man was not sufficient provocation to justify killing the man who made the proposal." The Appellate Court holds that the trial Judge went out of his province in so charging the jury, and that if the defendant killed the deceased on the spot when he made an indecent or insulting proposal to the wife of the former it was a question to be left entirely to the jury as to whether or not it was justifiable killing.
