The Philistine looked unbeatable from the way he did the opening mile but Cox nailed him in the second heat, only to be beaten in turn by the local horse.

#### COLORADA E. MADE NEW RECORD FOR 3-YEAR-OLD TROTTERS

Reduced His Mark From 2.06 1-2 to 2.05 3-4—Gus Macey Drove Great Race.

Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 21.—Racing in the trotting division of the Kentucky stock farm futurity, stake at today's grand circuit meet produced a world's record made by Colorado E. owned by George Estabrook, of Denver. This colt, holder of the world's record for three year old trotters, reduced his mark from 2:06 1/2 to 2:05 3/4. No declaration of Gus Macey's intention, was made public. The first heat of the race on which there was no betting, because of the added superiority of Colorado E. was easy for him in 2:08 1/2. Finding conditions suitable, the colt's driver treated an expectant crowd to a championship mile the second time out.

Like the first quarter of the initial mile, the opening quarter of the record one, was trotted in 30 1/2 seconds. Four lengths ahead of Emily Ellen, Colorado E. made the half in 1:02 1/2 and the three quarters in 1:33 1/2. That rate of speed made a new record probable. Macey did not hurry his champion home from the last turn, but a last quarter in 32 seconds completed the 2:05 3/4 mile.

In the pacing division of the same futurity, backers of first choices were dismayed when Nell Green, owned and driven by Chas. Cameron won in straight heats, and in ordinary time from Baroness Evelyn. In the 2:17 trot, Peter Dorsey, was beaten by Major Wellington the third choice. The favorite won the first heat.

Rudolph is a Bronx product, and has a strong following. Rudolph will probably be tried out against one of the stronger teams that have still to play at the Polo Grounds.

According to St. Louis scribes, Frank Darrell is angling for Bobby Wallace, the brilliant third-sacker of the Browns. Darrell is convinced that all he needs for a winning combination next year is a hard-hitting third baseman, and he thinks that Wallace would fill the bill nicely. Farrell is said to have asked owner Hughes to state his figure, and if cash is not required he would be willing to enter into a trade for Wallace.

Fielder Jones, who piloted the Chicago White Sox to the world's championship in 1906, will be seen in a Chicago uniform again next year. Jones has received an offer from Owner Comiskey which the great centre-fielder could hardly refuse. The White Sox's poor showing this year led Comiskey to offer Jones the tremendous salary of \$20,000 and also 10 per cent. of the club's profits to become playing manager. This, the fielder figures, will net him the round sum of \$35,000. This is probably the biggest price ever offered to a playing manager.

Bill Bradley once the peer of third basemen, who was recently given his unconditional release by Cleveland is offered the managerial reins of the Grand Rapids Club of the Central League.
