A. R. DEWITT WAS BEFORE
POLICE MAGISTRATE TODAYCase Adjourned Until Next Week—Thomas M. Rowan with Whom Dewitt Collided is Improving
—Was Thought to be Dangerously Hurt.

Mr. Thomas Rowan who was seriously injured yesterday afternoon in a collision with a motor-cycle is very much improved today and his recovery is expected.

As was reported in the Mail yesterday Mr. Rowan was riding his bicycle on Queen Street just above Regent at about 3.15 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The motor-cycle driven by Mr. A. R. Dewitt of Hoyt Station was going east on Queen in the direction opposite to that taken by Mr. Rowan. The latter passed a wagon, which was in front of him, on the right side. The motor-cyclist who had been coming down the street keeping to the right changed to his proper side of the street. The result was that the two bicycles met head on.

The motor-cycle was travelling at a high rate of speed and the force of the collision was such that Mr. Rowan was thrown several feet through the air and struck the Hassan pavement on his head. Bystanders picked him up and carried him into Hunt & MacDonald's drug store and medical aid was obtained. Mr. Rowan was unconscious for some time and was finally removed to his home in a semi-conscious condition, in which he remained practically until this morning. His face was severely bruised.

DEWITT ARRESTED.

Mr. Dewitt, whose motor-cycle struck Mr. Rowan, had come from Newcastle yesterday. He was arrested by Police Sergeant Foss shortly after the accident and taken to the police station. He was afterward let go on a deposit of twenty dollars to appear in the police court today.

Mr. Rowan, who was injured in the accident, is in the employ of the St. John River Log Driving Company.

CONSIDERED AN ACCIDENT.

Police Magistrate Marsh stated today that the collision, as far as he could ascertain, was entirely accidental. Dewitt, however, would have to answer to a charge of exceeding the speed-limit set for motor-vehicles.

DEWITT BEFORE COURT

Mr. Dewitt who left the city last returned to the city at noon today and appeared before Police Magistrate Marsh at two o'clock this afternoon. The case was adjourned until Friday of next week so that the extent of the injuries of Mr. Rowan may be learned. The charge of exceeding the speed limit will then be taken up.
