

RUSSIAN STUDENTS ENTER A PROTEST

St. Petersburg, Dec. 17.—The students of nearly all the high schools here are on strike in protest against cruelties which it is alleged are being inflicted upon political prisoners in various parts of the empire.

At meetings of students' resolutions denouncing the prison authorities were adopted. At Moscow an indignation meeting organized by the students of Moscow University was broken up by the police.

The Duma yesterday discussed the interpellation of the opposition members regarding the wholesale flogging of political prisoners in the Zaratui and Vologda prisons in Siberia, but a motion that an inquiry be made into the situation was rejected.

CANADA A COUNTRY WITHOUT CASTE

(Morning Albertan)

Let us sincerely and devoutly hope and wish and pray that ours will be a country without caste or artificial distinctions, forever and ever.

In the city of Toronto which believes that it is more loyal than the British crown and more Conservative than the very essence of Toryism, there is a social club known as the Empire club. It was created as a sort of protest against the Canadian club, because the Canadian club was Canadian you know instead of being British, and considered matters of interest to Canada instead of having everything go to the honor and glory of the Empire.

A few weeks ago Bishop Du Moulin of Hamilton in an address before the club complained of the trouble which was affecting aristocratic Britain at the present moment. He referred to the Labor members of the British parliament as "a shameless crew" who were not "gentlemen." He referred to the members from Ireland as "the Irish gang" and suggested that the best way to treat the suffragettes was to let loose fifty bags of rats from the sewers of London, and also suggested that the ladies should be soaked with the hose.

A few days later Arthur Hawkes, at one time an editorial writer on The Toronto World, now publicity manager of the Canadian Northern, who is also an Englishman, spoke at a meeting of the Empire club, and in the course of his remarks referred to the address of his predecessor. He said that he was a suffragist, but rejoiced in the fact that his wife was not. He said that there wasn't a man in the room who would turn a rat on a woman convicted of murder, and he went further and said: "It does not lie in the mouth of any man who is a follower of the lowly Nazarene in dealing with a question on which women of culture and intelligence have taken the last stand to deal with them or propose a treatment for them such as he would not propose for a woman convicted of murder or taken in adultery."

In referring to the Labor members for Great Britain, he asked if there was any reason to mourn because the toilers of the nation were represented in the councils of the nation.

"Would it be better to go back to the glorious days of old? What were those days? They were days when parliamentary boroughs were bought and sold as were the cure of souls in the church when corruption was rife when prime ministers controlled bribery funds, and when cabinet ministers thought nothing of entering the chambers of parliament intoxicated."

In regard to what the bishop had said of the British Labor members, Mr. Hawkes quoted a tribute to them by Arthur Balfour, in which that greatest aristocrat in the House of Commons had said that the house might do well to profit by the example they set.

Scarcely had the words been said before the trouble began. In fact there were rumblings before the gentleman had closed his remarks.

The president of the club, who is none other than J. Castell Hopkins, who is more loyal than any of the ancient prerogatives of absolute monarchy, has despatched a letter to the learned bishop regretting the occurrence. To Mr. Hopkins, who still believes in the divine right of Kings, that sort of talk would sound somewhat blasphemous. And, strange to say, throughout all of Ontario, and particularly in Toronto, there is considerable sympathy for the distressing muss that the Empire club has fallen heir to.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER AND BRITISH ELECTIONS

London, Dec. 15.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier cabled Ian Malcolm, the Unionist M. P., who inquired whether it was a separation or federation scheme the Premier thought he had subscribed to when he contributed to the home rule funds, "that in the heat of a campaign such as is now going on in the United Kingdom I would not like to say anything which would seem like interference either for or against the idea. I notice my name being used that way, but I must protest my strong desire that it should be kept out of the contest."

Bonar Law, at Welshpool, said it was incredible that Premier Asquith after having gone out to get increased power, failed to get it. He could dream of him going to the King and asking him to use his prerogative to carry out the greatest revolution in the constitution for two hundred years, with the only force behind it represented by eighty Irish votes.

Lord Lansdowne, at Plymouth, devoted the main part of his speech to pointing out the danger of home rule. If loyal Ulster is to be excluded from the Irish Parliament, then there would be five Parliaments. He thought the result of the elections was not conclusive.



MANY WERE INJURED IN RAILWAY SMASH

Saratoga, N. Y. Dec. 17.—Nearly a dozen passengers were injured on the Hudson Valley Railroad north of Schuylerville early today when two freight cars broke from an electric engine and crashed into a passenger trolley which was following closely. The motorman was unable to warn the passengers and none escaped in although fatalities were numerous. The wreck caught fire from a coal stove in one of the wrecked cars and the three cars were destroyed.

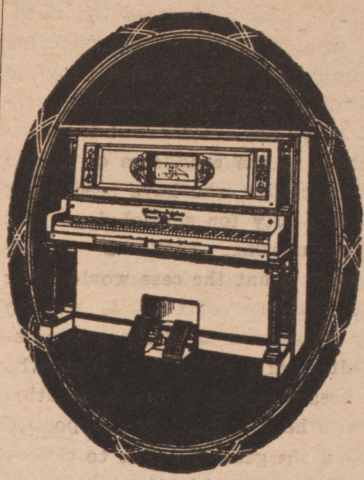
