GOOD HUNTING SEASON ON THE TOBIQUE

With the end of last week all the game taken in New Brunswick during the season just passed had been shipped to the many destinations. Practically every guide from the many camps on the Tobique expressed satisfaction over the successful season.

While moose proved very plentiful the average taken possessed spreads of from 45 to 55 inches.

What is believed to be the largest taken was that of F. E. Kahn, a member of the Stock Exchange of New York City. Mr. Kahn's moose was taken near the close of the season on the watershed of the right hand branch of the Tobique. It had a spread of 58 inches. David Ogilvy, of Gulguc was guide.

According to a caavus among some of the principle guides, the honors for second place falls to Collier W. Baird, the 17-year-old son of William T. Baird, a rubber dealer of New York City. The youth, guided by David Ogilvy, obtained at Gulguc a magnificent specimen of moose, the carcass dressing 1200 pounds and the head carrying a spread of 57 inches with 26 points. This moose was obtained about the middle of October.

Adam Moore, of Nictau guided the sportsman who is believed to have secured the third largest moose with a spread of 56 inches which was taken on the watershed near Nictau Lake.

A spread of 55 inches, the prize of H. D. Cheever, of New York, is said to be the next best prize.

Honors in deer hunting is divided between F. E. Kahn, who secured the prize moose, and Maurice F. Jaggs of Perth. Mr. Kahn obtained two handsome bucks, one with 13 points and the other with 13 points an. the other with 10 points. In spread, however it is said that the buck secured by Mr. Jaggs has the advantage. The antlers measured strong 25 1/2 inches, and with 11 points and was said by many hunters to have been the finest specimen of the small buck ever taken in this section. A peculiarity of the prize was that Mr. Jaggs, after hunting day after day for weeks, persevered and finally shot the deer late in the afternoon of the last day of the season, and within a half mile of Andover and a mile and a quarter from the hotels of Perth.

Despite the number of hunters who visited the Tobique, including many non-residents who had never before been in the woods, not an accident, even of the most trivial nature, marred the sport as against 113 lives lost in the United States, and 81 suffering injury.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, the applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land for each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
