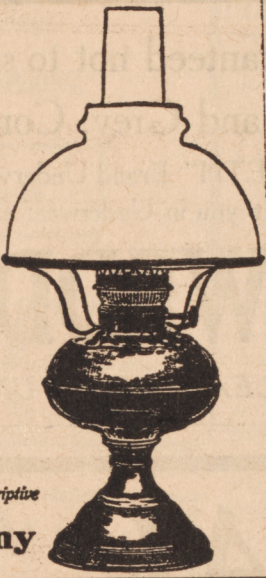

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## BOURASSA, CENTRAL PLANET IN OPPOSITION UNIVERSE

Tory Leaders Relying Upon the Grandson  
of Papineau to Save the Situation for  
Them in Quebec Province—A Bourassa  
Demonstration Talked of.

(Halifax Recorder)

While the Tory papers continue to deny that Mr. Bourassa is in any way connected with the Conservative party, and some of the same organs claim that the only possible relationship between him and Mr. Borden's followers must be that of "daggers" drawn, it is very noticeable that there is a striking lack of criticism of the actions and utterances of the aforesaid press. Besides this "conspicuous absence" of criticism, it is plain to be seen that Toryism all over Canada is looking to Mr. Bourassa, like another Arnold-Winkelreid, to break the hitherto impregnable phalanx of Liberals in the Province of Quebec. The tremendous welcome given to Sir Wilfrid in Montreal a few days ago, following the announcement that Mr. Borden, because of the presence of counter attractions, had given up the idea of making a tour of Ontario—coupled also with the remembrance of his recent trip through Nova Scotia, where his meetings were poorly attended and no enthusiasm was awakened—has brought home to every thinking Tory in the country a realization of the weakness in prestige of both the opposition and its leader. The first reports in the Tory press of the Montreal function attempted to belittle the size and importance of the demonstration, but the Independent press unanimously spoke of it as a remarkable expression of admiration of the great Premier. And now it is Bourassa who is turned to to save the situation somewhat, for Toryism. With ill-concealed joy the opposition journals make the announcement that the grandson of Papineau is to attempt a demonstration which is hoped to counteract the effect of the one held on Monday. It seems strange that even the most rabid Tory has never yet thought of trying to bring Mr. Borden to Montreal and attempting to get up in his honor such a demonstration as would startle the city from its propriety. Hath Mr. Borden no personal magnetism that he should not even be considered? Is there no shadow of a charm in his mental and corporeal presence which might work counter to Sir Wilfrid's sunny smile? Why depend upon Mr. Bourassa to be the central planet in the opposition universe? Why is not the nominal leader efflorescing a little? "Why don't you speak for yourself, John?"

There is not a single reputable Conservative paper but acknowledges that the Laurier demonstration in Montreal was great and enthusiastic beyond precedent. The Independent papers all speak of it as a climax to all such demonstrations hitherto carried out in honour of Canadian public men. The claim of Tory papers which attempt to detract from the importance thereof can hardly be called organs of public opinion, with the exception of the Montreal Gazette, which merely attempts to make some political capital out of the fact that the demonstration was carefully planned by an efficient organization. The truth is, that the organized work was directed towards limiting the admissions to the Monument National rather than towards seeing that it should be filled. Hence, admission was by ticket. Yet, despite this fact, hundreds without tickets forced their way in, so great was the press of the crowd. Organization and canvass had nothing whatever to do with bringing out the shouting myriads which lined the entire route from the Place Viger Station to the great Auditorium along which the mile long procession escorted the Premier. No organization could so bring out a great city en masse, if the people were either indifferent or opposed to the man or his cause. Once more, we repeat, let the Tories with the most elaborate organization attempt to duplicate such a demonstration in honor of Mr. Borden, either in Montreal or even Toronto! When they can do so it will be time for them to talk about organized demonstration.

### LABORITES WIN IN NEW SOUTH WALES

Melbourne, Oct. 17.—Returns are all in the New South Wales state elections. It is admitted the Labor party has carried the state by a majority of two. The Wade government lost nine seats, including the premier and two colleagues.

The Labor caucus at once elected a speaker and chairman of committees. Both officers will have to vote in case of an inevitable one.

MacGown, who will be premier was originally a boilermaker in the government railway workshop. The Liberals still control the legislative council, so the Labor party cannot rush through their Socialist schemes unless they appoint new members to the council from their own party. The Labor party is now a power in the federal government and in the states of New South Wales and South Australia are forming an electoral organization to cope with the Labor machine.

### CONJECTURES ON

C. P. R. DIVIDENDS

Montreal, Oct. 17.—The monthly meetings of the directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway are regularly held on the second Monday of each month.

None was held on that date this month, as President Shaughnessy and a number of influential directors were on a tour of inspection of the western lines of the system.

At the November meeting it is altogether probable that the board will declare the first quarterly dividend on the common stock, which will be paid on January 1 to stockholders of record on same date early in December, yet to be determined.

There has been no intimation that the dividend on the common stock paid out of the earnings of the railway proper, would be further increased at the meeting to be held next month.

It will be recalled that this dividend was advanced from a 6 per cent. to a 7 per cent. annual basis at the August meeting.

While it seems probable that the next increase in the dividends received by the Canadian Pacific common stockholders will be from the revenue derived from the land department, it is doubted in well-informed circles that any change will be made in connection with the January 1 disbursement.

A prominent interest in the Canadian Pacific, in discussing the question of dividends, intimated that the total of 8 per cent. which the common stockholders are now receiving should be regarded as a pretty liberal disbursement for the present. As hinted, however, by President Shaughnessy in his address to the stockholders at the annual meeting this month, it would cause no surprise if some time in 1911 more than 1 per cent. should be declared out of the land revenue. It is learned that the Canadian Pacific management for many years has pursued a far-sighted and conservative policy in providing for its interest and dividend money.

### QUEBEC BYE ELECTION TO BE HOTLY CONTESTED

Montreal, Oct. 18.—The coming bye-election in Drummond and Arthabaska, caused by the elevation of Louis Laverge to the senate, promises to be a red hot one. Today at Drummondville, Arthur Gilbert, of St. Perpetue, was chosen as the Nationalist candidate, and F. D. Monk, after the convention, addressed a large meeting. Mr. Bourassa is to stump the country. The naval policy will be the chief issue. The government candidate is Mr. Perrault, a lawyer, of Drummondville.
