DIVORCE EVIL DENOUNCED  
BY TORONTO CLERGYMAN

Toronto, Sept. 28.—What is the cause of the large number of divorces of the present day?  
Immorality, liquor, economics, temper and indifference.  
Such was the answer that Rev. Byron H. Stauffer gave to a great question of modern civilization in one of the most sensational denunciations that has been heard in a Toronto church, before an audience that crowded the auditorium of Bond Street Congregational Church to its greatest capacity Sunday evening.  
The text chosen by Mr. Stauffer was from the tenth chapter of Mark, "What God joined together let no man put asunder," and he declared that in only one case in a thousand was a divorce given when it was not a challenge to the teaching of the Bible.  
The speaker was especially strong in deploring the modern code of morals, and declared that they even compared unfavorably with those of the Mormons. Polygamy was not forbidden by the Bible, but was against the principles of civilization.  
WORSE THAN MORMONS.  
"But I know many people in Toronto who are worse than the Mormons ever have been," the preacher declared, "that this is the most prevalent crime that has ever broken up a home. No community is free from it and every day we read in the papers of fresh victims applying for divorces."  
"Then whiskey has also claimed its toll. I have known innumerable cases where the whiskey bottle has rolled into the home, and knocked off the virtuous from the table. No home in Canada is safe from its ravages, and it is but a short step from the gin mill to the divorce mill."  
WEEKLY INCOME FOR THE WIFE.  
The failure to allow the wife a weekly income to supply the demands of the house and for spending money, was another cause of trouble, as were outbursts of temper, and indifference to the troubles and conditions of the home.  
"No man should ever take his business affairs past the threshold of his home," he said. "They make him quarrelsome and neglectful. He tries to turn his home into a boarding house, and makes it but a place where he only eats and sleeps. His family are forced to seek their own enjoyment elsewhere, and he makes a

severe test for a faithful wife."  
DIVORCE SOUNDS KNELL OF BOTH.  
Speaking in regard to the results of divorce, Rev. Mr. Stauffer drew a pitiful picture. A divorce sounded the knell of the man and woman forever, he said. No divorced person amounted to anything. Their affairs were always discussed, and even after they were dead the stigma descended upon their children, while long after they were forgotten the stain was still indelibly printed upon the family tree, and would remain forever.  
In concluding the speaker said the secret of married life was to be pleased with trivial goodness in each other.  
"Home," he said, "is the best place on earth if you care to make it so, and it rests with you only."
