New York, Oct. 5.—Four envoys delegated by the Irish Nationalist party to seek support for the Home Rule movement among Irish emigrants in the United States and Canada are now in the city. John E. Redmond, T. P. O'Connor, Joseph

Devlin and Daniel Boyle, all members of Parliament, are the delegates and the representatives of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, United Irish League, Board of Erin and other societies greeted the arrivals.

The visitors declared that they were bringing the most optimistic reports

and that it was not unlikely that this would be the last appeal they would ever have to make to their countrymen in America for money to carry on the home rule fight, a fight in the thick of which Messrs. Redmond, O'Connor and Boyle have been for thirty years.

MONAHAN COMMITTED SUICIDE BY HANGING

The verdict in the inquest into the death of the man whose body was found in a decomposed state near McGivney on Sunday, was suicide by hanging, while in a state of despondency. The body was definitely identified as that of Christopher Monahan, former forman for McCoy & Wilford, who disappeared in July last.

The inquest was conducted yesterday at McGivney by Coroner Mullin, of St. Mary's, who went to McGivney by auto with Mr. A. B. Kitchen. The full text of the verdict rendered is as follows:

"We, the jury empanelled to inquire as to the cause of the death of the late Christopher Monahan, find that he came to his death about the latter part of July last by hanging himself, while in a fit of despondency."

It came out in evidence that the deceased had been on a prolonged spree in July last and afterward had suffered from fits of despondency. His home was in Kingston, Ont., or the vicinity of that city.

SUIT AGAINST CITY BEING TRIED TODAY

The case of Beverly Grass vs the Mayor, aldermen and commonality of this city of Fredericton was begun in the York County Court before Judge Wilson this morning. The plaintiff is suing for two hundred dollars damages on account of injuries sustained by him in the summer of 1907 when the horse and carriage in which the plaintiff was driving, collided with the city steam roller on King Street.

FATHER VAUGHAN DEALS WITH MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE

Tells New Yorkers That Church Will Not Countenance Divorce—Repeats His Statement Concerning Decay of Protestantism.

New York, October 4.—One of the most forceful priests of England, Father Vaughan, whose family dates back to Norman kings, whose brother was the late Archbishop of Westminster, whose castigation of "society" for its special sins brought even King Edward to his sermons, preached on Sunday to a congregation which crowded St. Patrick's Cathedral.

It impressed him, he acknowledged later, for he had declared to the Eucharistic Congress in Canada that in the present day of scramble, fever and fume for earthen toys, "there is no place to move but in the churches."

Out of the pulpit he is human, companionable, magnetic, but simple. In the pulpit he was temperamental, dynamic, charged with energy, speaking with fixed assurance and security, reaching by method and allusion the poorest, most ignorant, as well as the richest and best schooled. His voice, solemn and ringing, carried to the farthest limits of the place.

Some of his striking sentences were as follows:

"Too many rich women fill their kitchens with servants and let their nurseries stay empty."
"Marriage has become so debased and defiled that not even the pledged troth can make it endurable without change of partners."

"Divorce—the stipulation at marriage is that 'whom God hath joined no man shall put asunder.' Until He snaps the cord no law shall do so with the sanction of the Church."

"Always the Church will stand between the law and the child. It carries not a toss of the wind what man has to say, providing she is carrying out the charge delivered to her."

"We are living in a day when it matters not what you believe, nor what you do, and when you may do what you like if you do not get found out. But the real thing, at the end, will be what you are—nothing else is so certain."

TELLS OF VISIT TO THE SLUMS
He told of a trip made Saturday night through New York slums. They had no police with them, "for," said the preacher, "in London I go where many policemen would hesitate to follow. I saw Jews, Italians, Japanese, Chinese, German—many mixtures of races. And I must say that they are living, because of church influences, in a sunny paradise compared with conditions in the dark, noisome, pernicious alleys of the East End of London."

"If St. Paul," he went on, optimistically, "were to come to New York I believe the tide of his eloquence

would sweep this entire city into the Catholic Church."

"With a daring born of conviction St. Paul threw upon the screen a masterly piece of word-painting about the character of the Church of Christ which left an unprejudiced man without excuse for not being able to distinguish her from rival claimants. What becomes of the three-branch theory—Roman, Greek, Anglican—when, as St. Paul said, the Church has to be taken as the one mystical body of Christ? What," exclaimed Father Vaughan, "becomes of an amputated limb?"

"I have read this very morning the verdict upon the branch theory, passed by Bishop Sellew, of Jamestown, N. Y., who said: 'The spirit of Protestantism in the United States is in decay. Protestantism is dying out and will soon be a thing of the past.'"

"LEFT ARGUMENT UNTOUCHED"
"I venture with some hesitation to say what has now, so boldly and bluntly, been uttered by a Protestant bishop. In Canada when I made a similar statement, the Canadian Protestant churches rose up to tear to pieces, not only myself, but my argument, saying I did not know the truth and was abusing Canadian hospitality. Instead of tearing me to pieces it would have been more to the point to have pulled my argument to tatters. The Canadian Dominion left that untouched, and now one of their own bishops has endorsed and confirmed it by deliberately spoken statements."

"The Catholic Church is a living, growing organism, progressive in its physical, mental and moral life."

"Take the physical life of the church in New York City. I have seen where two hundred years ago the church started life here. Then there were two hundred Catholics, all told, and one priest, with one chapel and one little school. Today within the original limits of this see there is an archbishop, with eight suffragans, and two auxiliary bishops. There are more than 2,700 priests and more than 2,000 churches and chapels. There are 600 schools and a Catholic population of 3,162,339 souls."

"Surely it would be easier to toss back a great forest fire, to hold up Niagara Falls, or to arrest the down sweep of some mountain avalanche, as to hope to stay or even check the growth and progress of the Catholic Church. It is a source of vitalizing force in this glorious land of freedom. If she was to go, the light of this new world would be quenched. She is the sun star on your Star Spangled Banner."
