BISHOP OF LONDON ADDRESSES BROTHERHOOD OF ST. ANDREW

"I Am Not a Roman Catholic Because I Am an English Catholic," Said His Lordship Speaking in Montreal.

Crowd of Four Thousand People Rose From Their Seats and Wildly Cheered When the Bishop Declared His Attitude Towards Religion--At the Same Time, He Asked a Blessing on Other Denominations.

Montreal, Sept. 16.—The Right Reverend Arthur Winnington Ingram, Lord Bishop of London, was the chief speaker at the 17th Dominion Convention of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, which opened at the Arena last evening.

The building was packed to the doors when promptly at 8 o'clock His Lordship Bishop Ingram, accompanied by Bishop Farthing took their places on the platform amid the cheers of the four thousand citizens in the Arena.

His Lordship was in excellent voice and electrified the large audience with a speech which was sharp and to the point, and which wound up in a demonstration, the like of which has rarely been witnessed in Montreal. Bishop Farthing, who acted as chairman, introduced His Lordship and spoke of the pride which Anglicans felt in their church.

Bishop Ingram arose and was given a great ovation. After thanking his hearers for the reception accorded him, he reminded them of his last visit to Montreal, three years ago, which he remembered as the hottest reception he had ever received. On this occasion he had spoken to six different meetings on the formation of a model city and had been told afterwards by a friend that he had invited no less than 6,000 people to stay with him at Fulham Palace.

"Nine years of my life," said His Lordship, "were spent in the middle of Victoria Park arguing as to the logic of religion. In those days almost every class would have its representative in the Park. We used to have the Church Army, the Socialists with the red banner. An old Mormon would take up his stand under a tree, and I remember once as the old gentleman climbed on a stump 'I heard him say: 'I will now tell you a few things about that old humbug General Booth,' but I do not consider him a humbug at all—I love him."

THE GREATEST MONSTROSITY

"After these nine years spent in Victoria Park, I was able to bring four points before the men of East London. The first was that man was born to pray; that he was a praying animal. These men were taught that a man without prayer was like a bird without wings, or a fish without fins. There is no greater monstrosity in the world than the man and woman who did not pray. What is the reason for the cross on the top of St. Paul's? It was not to signify that Christ died, but that he lived. If Christ reigns for ever, then his promises were true, then the man who prays is in direct touch with Christ and the world to come.

"We come to a great audience like this and the first thing we say to you is, Do you pray? If you do not you are losing the greatest privilege man or woman could have and we lovingly invite you to come back to God, come back to your prayers, come back to the source of power.

"Secondly, the Society of St. Andrew's points out that the layman is meant to be as holy as the clergy. You may search the Bible through and you will find nothing to justify the belief that the clergy are meant to be more holy than the laymen. There is a widespread opinion that the standard of religious life of the layman is inferior to that of the clergyman. Sometimes people say to me: 'Oh, excuse me, I did not mean to say that you are a Bishop.' On these occasions I often feel like saying: 'Oh, never mind what you say to me, but be careful what you say before the laymen.' Therefore, the second great thing for which we all stand today is that the laymen are as holy as the clergy. There is only

one priest, Jesus Christ. The Church is a priestly body.

CHURCH OF CANADA

"Thirdly, we believe it is a glorious thing to be a clergyman or a layman in the Church of England, or the Church of England in Canada. I am not quite happy about that Church of England in Canada, which I would prefer to call the Church of Canada.

"I would ask you, men and women who are the lay people in the Church to raise to the level of your sanctity and to ask yourselves: 'Am I living the life that is expected from those who are called to the Saints?'

"We glory in our church because we come down in unbroken succession from the time of the apostles. When three years ago I spoke in Richmond Va. a great many in the audience thought that the Church of England was founded by Henry VIII. Why, I said to them, the very jackdaws in the trees in Fulham Palace, and the frogs in the moat have seen an unbroken line of Bishops of London for 1300 years. Then I told them 'Why, if the Church was founded by Henry VIII. do you find in the Magna Charta the words: 'Church of England shall be free.'"

What a glorious doctrine was that they stood by, the doctrine of the incarnation. No new theology for the Church of England.

NO NEW THEOLOGY

There was no new theology for the Church of England at home, and not in the Church of England in Canada. They prayed that the whole Church would be one time. It was meant to be one, added the bishop, and if we pray for union it will eventually come.

Dwelling on the Catholic faith of the English Church, Bishop Ingram spoke of its history. Then he added the phrase which brought the audience to its feet: "Why am I not a dissenter? Because there is nothing from which I dissent. Why am I not a Roman Catholic? Because thank God, I am an English Catholic."

This declaration brought forth an outburst of applause, the equal of which has seldom been heard, and it was not until the Lord Bishop had waved the gathering to their seats that he was able to continue his address.

"This old church," said His Lordship, "is alive today from one end of London to the other. Magnificent work is being done by men and women in the slums. The Church of England has its foot everywhere. When on Good Friday last I was allowed the use of the largest theatres in East London for a religious meeting I commenced to realize what we were.

BLESSING ON OTHER FAITH

"At the same time, I ask God to bless all other denominations with whom we work hand in hand in London. God bless the Roman Catholics. I am indeed glad they have had such success here, but of course they are a mere handful over the water. I invite them to share with me in my work, and I must acknowledge that their Archbishop Bourne is a person all friend of mine, with whom I work hand in hand in London.

"In London," declared the bishop, "the burden is heavy, 15,000 clergy and 100,000 laymen are fighting for the poverty stricken districts.

"We stand for the religious nature of man, for the sanctity of the layman, for the glory of the Church and lastly of the call to service.

"Do you remember in that parable of the prodigal son, that the prodigal was not only given the robe and the feast, but he was also given shoes for service. There is not a man or woman in the church who was not meant to serve. I meant to have told you of the many years of work in London and of the great and various work which was laid out.

"You ask what can you do in this great work. Jesus calls and speaks to us today. Have you these shoes on your feet if you are not working, you are disappointing the best Master in the world. If you are not working, the church cannot work, and He cannot do His work through His church as He would. Why stand we here all the day idle? Because no man has hired us. I come from across the sea in the name of the great head of the church to hire you, every man and woman. Join in His work this evening and you will find Him the best Master in the world."

NEW YORK POLICE IN FOR ANOTHER GRILLING

Graft and Vice-Protection Charges to Be Investigated

New York, Sept. 19.—New York is on the eve of another "Police Graft," exposure if credence is to be given persistent reports in circulation in police circles Saturday. These are to the effect that a police official who had been caught in the coils of the stringent investigation into vice conditions instigated by acting Mayor Mitchell, had indicated his desire to tell the high administrative authorities all that he knew concerning the collection of graft from gamblers, proprietors of disorderly resorts and other panderers to the vices of the community. Receipt of shocking conditions at Coney Island made as a result of the initial crusade on the acting mayor's orders, was simply a starting point for the disclosures likely to follow. It was said in connection with the report, that a sensation was about to be sprung. Twenty-five persons have been indicted by the King's County Grand Jury as a result of the early disclosures, since Inspector Russell, took charge of the investigation. It is now declared that the Manhattan Grand Jury will also take testimony as a result of acting Mayor Mitchell's later charges that the tenderloin is again the scene of open gambling and that disorderly resorts are being run with the connivance of the police.

Reports today were that the police official who had determined to confess had no expectation of retaining his place in the department but had determined upon his course with the view of "standing from under" sufficiently to avoid criminal prosecution.

BANNER HUNTING

SEASON LOOKED FOR

ON THE MIRAMICHI
