## A SUCCESSFUL COMPANY.

The Maine and New Brunswick Electrical Power Company is offering for sale \$30,000 second mortgage bonds bearing six per cent. interest. This company with a total capitalization of \$450,000 and plant and equipment that have cost nearly \$500,000, has net earnings sufficient to pay all bond interest and over six per cent. on the \$200,000 stock. The company is now supplying light and power at Fort Fairfield, Presque Isle, Houlton, Maple Grove, Easton, Mars Hill, Blaine, Bridgewater, Monticello, Washburn, Andover and Perth, as well as to the Aroostook Valley Railway and the line is now being extended to Aroostook Junction. It is said that the C. P. R., between Aroostook Junction and Presque Isle will soon be operated by electric power. Altogether this company has a large field for its operations.

MAYOR HATT HAS  
DECIDED TO PERMIT  
BOXING BOUT

Was Thought For Sometime That Match Would Be Stopped—Influence Brought to Bear.

For a time today it looked as if Burke-St. Clair boxing bout booked to take place at Marysville tonight would have to be called off. No license had been procured for the exhibition and the bylaws of the Town of Marysville require that such performances be licensed. On that account it seemed likely that the bout would not be allowed.

Mayor Hatt who has been away from home for some time returned late last week. When he learned that a boxing-match had been advertised, he communicated with the town-clerk Mr. A. D. MacPherson and was told that no license for such a performance had been asked for or issued. The Mayor for a while felt doubtful concerning the advisability of permitting the bout. Today however influences were brought to bear which made it possible for the bout to be held.

To The Mail this afternoon Mayor Hatt said that it had been represented to him that the bout was to take place in the Orange Hall and would be to a certain extent under the patronage of the Orange Lodge and that no opposition would be offered. Some time before local men had taken part in a similar bout.

Billy St. Clair and Coley Burke both well known here are to be the principals in tonight's exhibition.

It is understood that Mayor Hatt would have had the support of a considerable number of people in Marysville had the bout been prevented.

THREE ROBBERIES COMMITTED  
ON SATURDAY AND SUNDAY

Robert MacDonald's Barber-Shop and Emack Brothers' Establishment Broken Into Yesterday Afternoon—Louis Lavine's Warehouse Entered on Saturday.

A daring robbery was committed yesterday afternoon at the premises of Robert MacDonald and Emack Bros., Queen Street. Two hundred cigars, several razors and towels, forty-nine cents in coppers, some shoe laces and a quantity of soft drinks were taken from MacDonald's shoe shining parlor and barber shop. In Emack Brothers' place the cash drawer was forced and about fifteen dollars in bills and silver taken. The exact amount is not known. Some small articles were taken from the place also.

## WENT IN WINDOWS.

In both cases entrance was effected by means of rear windows. It is supposed that the thief or thieves went under or opened the gate between the Lemont and Coy buildings and went through the alleyway to the rear of the Coy building. A pane of glass in the rear of Mr. MacDonald's place of business was broken, the weatherstrips keeping the window in place forced off and the lower window sash removed. The stolen cigars were removed from one of the show-windows and the empty cigar boxes left in the rear of the shop. The soft beer was drunk upon the premises and the bottles left behind. Entrance to the Emack establishment was made by

means of a window which was opened from the outside. It is supposed that some party or parties committed both robberies.

The robbery was discovered at about four o'clock, Sunday afternoon. Mr. MacDonald was communicated with and went to his shop at about six o'clock when he found out what had happened. The removal of the cigars from the window was the first indication that something was wrong. The discovery that Emack Brothers' place had also been robbed was made this morning.

City Marshal Roberts and the police have been notified and steps are being taken to locate the thieves. Suspicion falls upon some young men who were observed in the neighborhood of the two shops Sunday afternoon.

## ANOTHER THEFT.

The warehouses of Louis Lavine, on Campbell Street, was also broken into on Saturday and a quantity of bottles stolen. Mr. John Burnett, of the Grand Hotel, saw a boy taking a sack of bottles from the place. The proprietor was notified and accompanied by City Marshal Roberts, went to the warehouse where more bottles which had evidently been abandoned by the thief, were found. Watch was kept but the thief did not return.

## SCOTT ACT CASES.

A first offense Scott Act acknowledged in the police court this morning by a local hotel keeper and a fine of fifty dollars imposed. Information has been laid against a local druggist for violation of the Scott Act.

## SEWERAGE CASES.

The police magistrate this morning heard two Board of Health cases in which parties were prosecuted for not making connection with the city sewerage system. Mr. Doohan was allowed to go as he had made application for permission to connect. Judgment will be given in the case against Wm. Lemont on Wednesday.

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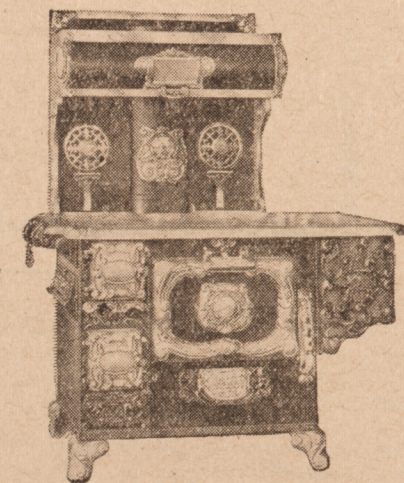
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
