The Red Sox are getting their 10 or more hits every day.

The Red Sox-Highlanders tie game will not be played off until Boston goes to New York on the second trip. Schaefer started in well for Jimmy McAleer's reconstructed Senators. A single and two doubles in good enough.

Last Thursday the two Boston teams played 25 innings in the field without an error. The Doves had 33 putouts and 19 assists, and the Red Sox had 42 putouts and 19 assists.

It perhaps will be noticed that Honus Wagner's triple Thursday brought in the Pirates' first two runs against the Cardinals and these were enough to win the game.

Hugh Duffy got his White Sox away nicely. To hold the Browns down to one hit was a great opening day stunt for Frank Smith—one that probably seldom has been equaled, or at least never bettered. And Johnson did the same thing for Washington against Philadelphia.

Big Ed. Spencer, the catcher, is in fine shape this spring. He is in St. Paul where he has gone into business and where he will continue to play ball, although still at the disposal of the Boston management. Few catchers have anything on Spencer when he's right, and the Boston fans will be glad to see him when he's at his best.

One of director Harris' guests at the Boston opening was Tunis F. Dean, business manager of the Toronto Eastern league baseball club, of which Joe Kelly is manager. He has been associated with Mr. Harris in the theatrical business for several years.

ALF LYNCH MAKES GOOD

Alf. Lynch who has been living in St. John lately, made a decided hit when he appeared for the first time in the ring in Boston.

Describing the four bouts at the American A. C. on Thursday last the Boston Globe says:

"Alf. Lynch, bantam-weight champion of Canada, made his debut in Boston in the next bout. His opponent was Kid Francis of the West End and he was so frightened from the time he went into the ring till he quit in the second round that he made but few attempts to hit out. Lynch showed himself to be a clever boxer.

TEMPERANCE PEOPLE ACTIVE IN QUEBEC

Montreal, April 15.—The temperance workers of Quebec are about to acquire traffic of the province by still another step.

On Tuesday of next week Quebec will see a delegation from Montreal, Quebec, Three Rivers, Hull and many other points throughout the province waiting upon Sir Lomer Gouin and his cabinet. The purpose of the proposed meeting with the government is that evidence may be given of the strength of the temperance workers of this province and that the resolutions recently drafted by the Dominion Alliance and the Anti-Alcoholic League may be presented to the legislature and these resolutions deal with the administration of the license law of the province and the general conduct of the liquor interests.

It is expected that about 100 delegates will go from Montreal aboard one of the R. and O. steamers which will be chartered for the occasion. The boat will leave Montreal at seven o'clock on Wednesday.

On Sunday evening in the Monumental National the temperance workers will meet, and be presided over by Archbishop Bruchesi, while Bishop Roy of Quebec, and Mr. Justice Lemieux will address the meeting.

In St. James Methodist Church another meeting will be held at which Mr. Justice Lemieux, Dr. D. L. Dube and Bishop Farthing are expected to speak.

CANADIAN ENTRIES

FAVORED IN MARATHON

Fred Cameron Expected to Finish well up if not First—Patterson also Good One.

Boston, April 17.—Although the long-distance running craze, born of the sensational finish to the Olympic Marathon at London two years ago, has diminished, the Boston A. A. on Tuesday will hold the Fourteenth revival of its classic race from Ashland to Boston, with an entry list of nearly 800 athletes. These runners come from all parts of the United States and from Canada. Never before was the entry list from the dominion so great as this year. Thirteen provincial athletes have signified their intention to start. From New York nearly a score have entered and Portland (Me.) also appears on the list.

With many entries of foreign blood, Greek, French, Italian, Swedish, English, Canadian and Irish, this year's event will have a truly international aspect.

The arrangements of past years will again obtain. The distance is somewhat less than twenty-five miles—the true Marathon distance. The starting point is one mile beyond the town of Ashland and the roads leading to the finish at the Boston A. A. clubhouse are uniformly even of surface, although climbing several hills on the way. Among those favored for leading places at the finish are several Canadian entries including Charles A. Patterson, Dartmouth, N. S.; Fred L. Cameron, Amherst, N. S.; A. Robillard, Montreal, the Quebec snow shoe champion; G. W. Wolfe, Dartmouth, N. S.; James J. Corkery, Toronto; Chas. Cook, Hamilton, Ont.

YANKEE SENATORS SAW

FIRST BALL GAME

Washington, April 16.—The great American game of baseball caused the Administration Railroad Bill to be side-tracked again Thursday afternoon, giving the Senators an hour and forty minutes in which to hike out to the grounds and see the ball tossed into the diamond.

Senator Aldrich and all the other big bosses were looking for a chance to get away and see the first set-to of the season and jumped at the first excuse to drop the railroad bill. Nearly everybody says it was a frame-up, but that is denied by Messrs. Aldrich and Elkins. Anyhow, Senator Crawford offered an amendment with more angles than the Missouri River and somebody suggested that it ought to be printed so Senators could examine it. Senator Elkins said that he had hoped to complete Section 7 this afternoon, but that in view of the request for the printing of Mr. Crawford's amendment nothing further could be done. He asked that the Railroad bill be laid aside and no objection was raised. Then there was an exodus for the baseball grounds.

READVILLE RACES

Readville, Mass., April 17.—The management of the Readville race track announced tonight that although the eastern end of the grand circuit had been abandoned, the \$10,000 Massachusetts purse for 2.14 trotters would be given during the week of Aug. 29-Sept. 3. If material enough is found, there will also be a stallion race for a purse of \$5,000.

LOCKOUT BEGAN IN GERMANY YESTERDAY

Two Hundred Thousand Operatives out of Employment—Building Trades Affected—No Disorder.

Berlin, April 15.—A lockout in the building trades of Germany began at 6 o'clock this evening. Between 150,000 and 200,000 workers already are known to be affected, but full reports have not yet arrived at headquarters.

Although the employers of Berlin, Hamburg and Bremen have not yet participated in the movement and negotiations for a peaceful settlement are continuing in Munich, the lockout is a most widespread one. Bitter feeling divides the employers and employees. Most of the contractors are determined to work for the defeat of the trades unions, but it is estimated that ten per cent of the employers have declined to join the lockout, being in sympathy with the men's demands.

The building material manufacturers have joined forces with the employers in several cities in resolving not to deliver materials to those employers not obeying the lockout mandate.

Up to the present, no disorders have been reported.

The lockout was caused by the action of delegates representing the Socialist Federation of Trades Unions, comprising some 300,000 bricklayers, carpenters, masons and laborers, who recently rejected by an unanimous vote, a proposed wage tariff of the Master Builders' Union.

THIEF ABANDONED SILVER

Cobalt, April 16.—While cutting timber on the property of the Princess mine, a miner uncovered two bars of silver bullion, weighing about fifty pounds and worth about \$400. Cashed with them he found some moulds in which the bars had been made. It is supposed the man who had the silver stole it from one of the mines and was afraid to dispose of it until vigilance subsequent on the discovery of the theft had abated.

Calla, Peru, April 16.—The town council of this city today started a subscription list for the purpose of a torpedo boat destroyer at a cost of \$270,000.
