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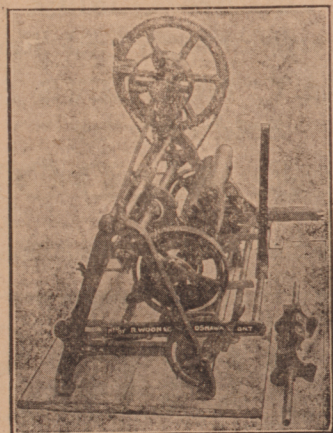
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### BROKEN JAW ENDED KELLER-THOMAS BOUT

### COUNTRY JAY WON FASTEST THREE-HEAT RACE EVER TROTTED

Defeated Sonoma Girl in Great Contests  
at Kalamazoo—Four-Year-Old  
Marvel.

Kalamazoo, Mich., July 30.—The 14-year-old marvel Country Jay for the second time this week electrified a crowd of 10,000 by defeating Sonoma Girl in a thrilling duel, and when the great contest was over the game chestnut warrior that has reversed all horse laws of age and physical soundness had to his credit the honor of winning the fastest three-heat trotting race in turf history.

On Monday the game son of Jay Hawker and Paronella flashed to a brilliant victory, clipping his record to 2:06½, and yesterday after a head-and-head battle with the Boston-owned mare Sonoma Girl in the first heat, in which he was beaten only by inches in 2:04½, he outgained the California flyer and won the next two heats in 2:05½, 2:05½.

Country Jay led to the half, with Oro a length back and Sonoma Girl trailing McCarthy's gelding. Here McMahan set sail, and Sonoma Girl with a terrific brush flew to a head-and-head struggle with Country Jay.

Racing like a pair, the two trotters swept around far turn to the three-quarters in 1:31½, and then swinging into the long straight home stretch, both clever reinsmen began a strenuous whip-tapping finish, which brought the crowd to its feet and a mighty roar went up from the stand when they flashed past the wire with Sonoma Girl's nose ahead of the gelding's by the narrowest of margins.

Sonoma Girl led to the half in the second heat, but there Country Jay challenged her, and racing her the next quarter in 30½ seconds, he had her beaten at the drawgate and won by a length.

Margin showed the way to the half in the final heat, but here the two rivals raced by her like a pair, and, opening up two lengths of daylight, squared away for another stretch duel. But Sonoma Girl had had enough, and Oro and Margin beat her through the stretch, while away off, four lengths in front, Macy was chirruping to Country Jay, and he drove him to the wire, the gallant old horse responding to every call in the fight for a world's record.

The best previous three-heat trotting race was that which was won by the late Hamburg Belle at Hartford two years ago in 2:05, 2:06, 2:04½.

Giftline was an even-money favorite over his field in the two-minute pace, but he went to a break at the three-quarters in the first heat after chasing The Elt in 1:30½, and finished behind the flag, Darkey Hal carrying the gray wonder to the wire in 2:02½.

After that the battle for first money was between the Canadian side-wheelers, and Darkey Hal in two hard finish drives outlasted the handsome gray pony. Aileen Wilson showed lots of speed in spots, but broke at critical times and was not much of a factor.

Knap McCarthy's tall black mare Nancy Boyce easily out-trotted Demerest and Aquin in the 2:09 trot, and incidentally that long, sweeping stride of the daughter of Allerton carried her to a new mark of 2:06½, which gives her the honor of being the fastest trotter by that sire.

Darkness was fast falling when Walter Cox pulled off a hard five-heat battle in the 2:11 pace with Earl Jr. Earl Jr. was a 2-to-1 favorite over the field. The summary:

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Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter-section available Dominion land in Manitoba Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry of land may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.
