## THE RECENT ADVANCE IN CANADIAN PACIFIC

**Stock Crossed 200 Mark in New York on  
Monday, Establishing a New High Re-  
cord--A Dangerous Security for Shorts  
to Trifle with--Will the Dividend be  
Increased During the Coming Year.**

(Toronto Globe)

It is probably only a coincidence that C. P. R. has frequently made its most surprising moves when a holiday was being observed, or was in close proximity, on one or the other of the large markets. Some New York traders have reason to remember an Easter holiday several years ago, when the New York Exchange was open and London closed, and the shorts in C. P. R. were caught in a box from which they extricated themselves by the unpleasant process of settling with Mr. Jefferson Levy the big American operator in C. P. R. after the market closed that day. Tuesday will be a holiday in London--All Saints Day--and New York will be open, and from the fact that C. P. R. crossed 200 today a rather phenomenal performance, local readers of the chart were inclined to predict that history might repeat itself and that the premier Canadian security might be used for pyrotechnic purposes in New York, while British supplies of the stock were shut off. It is doubtful if there is a very extended short interest in C. P. R. on this side. The stock has been labelled "dangerous" for the protection of operators for the decline for so long that New York has refused to play with it. That trading in this one issue amounted to 7,100 shares in Wall St., today seems to indicate that a movement of considerable proportions is under way.

The market evidently expects that something will be coming to C. P. R. shareholders--and that some-

thing is to be not only Canadian investors but the Canadian public generally will be interested to know.

The land surplus at that time was \$14,568,700 and the net interest received on deferred payments \$1,286,200; today the surplus amounts to \$3,762,200 and the interest on payments has increased to \$3,055,300.

With these figures before him Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, at the last annual meeting gave no hint as to the method of disbursement, but he did roughly fix a period during which the shareholders might expect an announcement. He said:

"The principal sum realized on the sale of your land should, in the opinion of your directors, be permitted to accumulate and be invested so as to give you the best interest return consistent with safety until such time as a definite plan can be evolved for its utilization. But the interest on both the cash receipts and deferred payments, which are increasing month by month is available revenue to be dealt with as you may think best."

Probably the best guess is that it will come from the land funds from which holders have been drawing dividends at the rate of 1 per cent per annum. With regard to the disposal of these funds it is remembered that at the annual meeting the President stated:

"Apart from your surplus earnings you have extraneous assets in deferred payments or land mortgages, cash proceeds of land sales and other items of a like character in process of realization that may be roughly

estimated at fifty million dollars, without taking into account your unsold lands, and in the ordinary course this amount should be substantially augmented within the next few years. In the opinion of your directors, the best interests of the company and its shareholders will be subserved by keeping intact considerable portion of these assets instead of resorting to the policy ordinarily characterized as 'melon-cutting,' which has not always proved a boon to the beneficiaries. At the same time there is every reason why the shareholders of the present day should expect such advantage in the way of income from those assets as may be possible without unduly encroaching on the principal, and it is the intention of your directors to determine during the coming year how this can best be brought about."

It may be that Sir Thomas and his directors intend to capitalize the land assets in a separate form and in that way give the shareholders a larger share in them. The sanction of the Government would be necessary to validate the divestment of the land and railway investments of the company and this would necessarily take time. Buyers of C. P. R. are testifying to their faith in Sir Thom-

At the end of October 1900, it sold at 88 and in the intervening period it has dispensed the rights with which all followers of the market are familiar. At the close of 1906 it sold at 201 1/2.
