"A SAILOR'S SWEET-HEART" A BIG HIT

Crowded House Saw City's Dramatic Talent in Excellent Performance Last Night.

Fredericton's amateur actors under the direction of Mr. Theodore H Bird scored another success last night in "A Sailor's Sweetheart." On previous occasions when Mr. Bird has directed amateur performances here, the attendance has been large but the audience at last night's performance never was surpassed in point of numbers.

The work of those taking part in the play was a revelation to many who were unaware that Fredericton could produce talent such as that displayed. Miss Mary M. Fenety as Rose Prescott, the sweetheart, acted in a manner which showed that she possesses marked ability. Her work surpassed that of professional actresses who have been seen here. Mr. Bird acted the part of Tom Manly, the sailor, as he always acts his parts in a way that left nothing to be desired. The support given by the other members of the company was excellent. Mr. W. A. Walsh who is well known to local audiences had a most difficult part as Uncle Davie Morris but acted it well. Miss Myrtle Lottimer as Little Nellie acted a juvenile part in a manner which earned her the applause of the audience. Miss Kathleen Hatt as Ruth Manly also displayed marked ability while Mr. B. Arthur Coyle as James Hammond made a perfect villain.

The specialties between the acts were very pleasing features of the evening. "Ring Around Rosie" seemed to be the one which earned the greatest applause, although "The Hurdy Gurdy Man," was a novelty which was well received. The solos of Mr. Redpath and Master Leo Dolan were also well received. SMALL BOY SHOOTING

CARELESSLY ALMOST STRUCK YOUNG CHILD

Police Are Trying to Locate the Guilty Party—Great Danger From Boys With Rifles.

The careless use of fire-arms in the near vicinity of the city has almost resulted in several serious accidents this autumn. The narrowest escape reported was that of a young child named Clark. On Tuesday last a number of boys were in the woods on the hills south of the city. Some of the number were carrying rifles, which they discharged at random. A bullet from a rifle so discharged crashed through a window of Mr. Samuel Clark's house on College Road and lodged in a wall. The bullet, which was of 22 calibre, passed close to the head of a little girl who was sitting at the window.

The occurrence was reported to the police and today Policeman Hart went to the Charlotte street school to try to find the boy who discharged the rifle. A lad named McCormick had been named as the guilty party, but denied to the policeman that he had been one of the party of boys.

The investigations of the police gave rise to the story that a child had been shot this morning. This story gained wide circulation.

The police are of the opinion that too many boys are allowed to carry rifles at this time of year and it is likely that steus will be taken to put a stop to the dangerous practice.

DEATH AT FOREST HILL

She is survived by her husband one son and three daughters. G. T. P. ENGINEER

INSPECTS Y. & C. RY. AND EXTENSION ROUTE

Was Favorably Impressed With Condition of Branch Line—Inspecting Proposed Extension Today.

The York and Carleton Railway and the route by which it is proposed to extend that feeder of the I. C. R. to connect with the G. T. P. at Napudogan, are being inspected today by Engineer Bellanger of the G. T. P. engineering staff. Yesterday Mr. Bellanger inspected a portion of the railway and expressed himself as well pleased with its condition. He will complete his inspection of the railway and the proposed route extension today.

At present the Y. & C. Railway ends at Ryan's Brook but an extension only nine miles in length would connect it with the G. T. P. at Napudogan and furnish a short and direct route by which freight transported by the G. T. P. could be brought to Fredericton.

Mr. James Malone, Deputy Crown Land Surveyor, accompanied the engineer on his trip of inspection.

The report made on the inspection will have much to do with the decision concerning the extension of the Y. & C. Railway.
