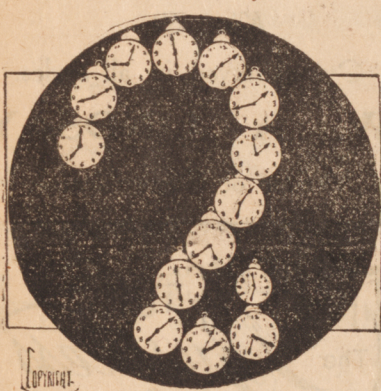

## RECIPROCITY EXPERT PASSES AWAY AT WASHINGTON

Washington, Nov. 20.—Henry Martyn Hoyt, counsellor for the department of state, died at his home here this morning from peritonitis.

Mr. Hoyt was taken ill in Canada while there relative to the reciprocity negotiations between the United States and that country. Since his return to Washington last Monday he has been confined to his home, and physicians called in consultation with the family physician, considered the case extremely serious from the beginning. The condition of the sick man was such last night that the attending physician, Dr. Robert M. Baker, of this city, and Mr. Hoyt's family physician, deemed it advisable to remain at his bedside during the night. Shortly after midnight a perceptible weakening of the heart became noticeable, and from then on Mr. Hoyt sank rapidly until his death.

His last illness was a perforating ulcer of the stomach, resulting in peritonitis. In the death chamber, when he died, besides his physician, were Mrs. Henry Hoyt, Henry Hoyt, Jr., and Mrs. Philip Hichborn, respectively wife, son and daughter of the deceased.

The body of Mr. Hoyt will be taken to his home city of Wilkesbarre, Pa., for interment, which will be private. A short funeral service will be held at the residence here tomorrow.

### HIS CAREER.

Henry Martyn Hoyt was the strong right arm of Philander C. Knox when the latter was attorney general. In fact, he made himself so indispensable as the chief of staff when Mr. Knox became secretary of state, he lost no time in obtaining the transfer of Mr. Hoyt from the department of justice to his department. Mr. Hoyt was assigned Aug. 17, 1909, to a new office, that of counsellor of the department. In that field, though the fact was not widely known, Mr. Hoyt rendered invaluable service to the government.

Mr. Hoyt had a thoroughly trained legal mind. Because of the brief term of his service in the state department, compared with his work in the department of justice, his reputation must rest principally upon what he accomplished in his professional pursuit before entering the realm of diplomacy. His record of service in the department of justice is a bright one. He was closely associated with the attorney general in the prosecution of many of the cases involving attack upon the great corporate violators of the anti-trust law.

While he was solicitor general, Mr. Hoyt prepared and argued several noted cases with success. Many of them were of a constitutional character. One case in particular which

## LUMBERING SEASON ON THE MIRAMICHI

Chatham, N. B., Nov. 19.—The sawing season on the Miramichi is practically at an end. The season has been slightly below the average so far as total quantity of output is concerned, although the quantity is greater than was estimated would be the case earlier in the year.

Geo. Burchill & Sons' plant, at Nelson, ceased sawing on October 19th. John O'Brien's plant, which is located at the same place, was closed down on the 16th. The Miramichi Lumber Company closed their Douglastown mill on November 10th. A. R. Loggie's mill at Loggieville, ceased sawing about four weeks ago, and the box mill owned by the same firm will cease for the winter on November 20th. The two mills owned by the J. D. Snowball Company are also closed, the larger or "lower" mill having finished on October 9th.

In answer to inquiries as to the probable date of resuming saw operations in the spring, all the manufacturers mentioned above stated that their plans were no different from those of other years, and that they would begin sawing as soon as the ice was out of the river, and it was possible to get logs to the mills. In some cases local firms have logs in their mill-booms while others will be obliged to wait until the first of the new logs arrive from up-river. The quantities of old logs being held over are somewhat lighter than usual, one million feet being the largest quantity in this connection.

The quantities of manufactured lumber to be wintered by local people is also on the light side. Shipments from New Brunswick ports were frequent and large during the early autumn, the result being a corresponding lightness of stocks.

The quantities of different lines of long and short lumber which will be thus held over by manufacturers of this section amounts to about 11,500,000 sup. feet spruce deals (Eng-

lish) 7,000,000 spruce lath and 2,250,000 cedar shingles.

The season thus far has been quite favorable for the getting out of logs. The weather has been dry and good work is being accomplished.

The coming winter promises to be a quiet one so far as the manufacture of long and short lumber at portable plants is concerned. When the lath market is productive of sufficiently high prices, it is possible to manufacture lath from the round wood and sell the product at a profit. During the winters when lath were worth as much in New Brunswick as they are this season in New York City, the product of round-wood lath at portable mills in this province totalled to many millions. Under present market conditions, such undertakings are impracticable. While the existing conditions in the spruce deal market do not bear so heavily upon the operator of the portable deal-mill, there seems little prospect of such a plant being run at a profit, and every indication points to the conclusion that the output of such plants, usually a factor in the winter trade will cease to be so this year.

Local lumber circles are exceedingly quiet. The season's shipping from Miramichi ports is practically at an end, and local manufacturers and dealers are consequently displaying less interest than usual in trade developments. For available local stocks of spruce lath an enquirer would be asked from \$2.10 to \$2.20 per thousand, f.o.b. Chatham.

In regard to values in "English" spruce deals, information is rather diversified and different opinions in regard to values in this line seem to be prevalent. \$15 per thousand superficial feet would meet the views of some active participants in the trade, while 50c. per thousand less would be nearer to the views of others, who figure largely in the local trade in spruce deals.

### BLOOMFIELD RIDGE NOTES

Thrilling Fight with a Bear—Generous Act of a Teamster—Coun. Hinchey Enjoying Good Health.

Nov. 17.—We are glad to report that times are good here at the present time.

Mr. C. E. Boies has gone to the woods and has hired every man he could get at from \$35 to \$38 per month. John G. Shaw takes charge of one camp and is the right man in the right place.

Mr. A. L. Boies performed an act of charity a few days ago. He was on his way to the woods with a loaded team and heard that Mrs. Robinson, whose husband deserted her several years ago, was in pretty hard sledding and poor health. He stopped the team and rolled off a barrel of flour at her door. "The Lord loveth a cheerful giver and those who give to the poor lendeth to the Lord." We hope that others will follow Mr. Boies' worthy example.

Mr. Jesse Parker, of this place, had a thrilling experience with a bear while on his way to the woods a short time ago. He came on to Bruin while making a short cut to Garden Vale and the animal attacked him. Mr. Parker did not dispute the right of way with His Bearship, but scrambled up a tree. The bear immediately did the same thing, and was close on Mr. Parker's heels. Mr. Parker crawled out on a limb and the bear crawled out on another close by. Parker, seeing the limb bending beneath the bear's weight, took out his jack knife and hacked the limb on the upper side, with the result that the limb broke, letting the bear down with a heavy thud. Before His Bearship could regain his feet Mr. Parker with great presence of mind, dropped on him like a thousand of brick and cut the animal's throat. It was the brave act of a brave man and he is being heartily congratulated.

The friends of Ex-Warden John Hinchey, and they are legion throughout York County, are glad to hear that he continues hale and hearty and takes as keen an interest in public affairs as he ever did. The Parish of Stanley never had a more worthy representative at the County Council than Mr. Hinchey, and many of his friends would like to see him take another whack at it just for the fun of the thing.

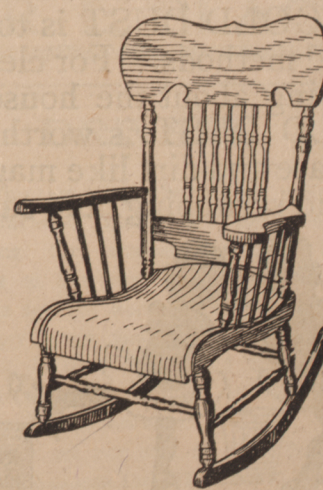
