MR. HENRY M. WHITNEY TALKS ON RECIPROCITY

Boston Capitalist, Who Has Done Much For Industrial Development in Nova Scotia, Says That British Co-Operation is Necessary to the United States—Intends Writing an Article on the Subject.

Boston, Sept. 30.—An article of sensational candor, advocating reciprocity between Canada and the United States, will appear in the October Atlantic Monthly, which will be published in a day or two. The author is Mr. Henry M. Whitney, one of Boston's leading capitalists, a man who has given in his spare time a good deal of thought to trade matters. Mr. Whitney's name is especially familiar to Canadians, as he was the organizer of the Dominion Iron and Steel and the Dominion Coal Companies, Nova Scotia's largest industrial enterprises, though he has not now any Canadian investments. but is President of the Rhode Island Coal Company. Mr. Whitney's arguments are another example of that violent form of wooing on the part of old Uncle Sam toward the bashful Miss Canada to which reference has already been made in this correspondence as existing in New England.

A FREE TRADE EXAMPLE

The argument frequently used, but not yet fully appreciated, by many people, that the United States is, after all, the greatest example anywhere of prosperity and development under free trade, is repeated by Mr. Whitney, for here is an area of 3,500,000 square miles with no trade barriers, contrasted, say, with the countries of Europe, which are divided off into little spaces the size of some of the individual States, with not only tariff but other vexatious boundaries, such as racial hostility between. Mr. Whitney believes that if the United States had been thus separated off the development of the country would not have been nearly so great. He then turns to the future, and, based on past growth, he figures out that by 1920 the population of the United States will be 110,000,000, and by 1960, say, 228,000,000, or even then on 75 persons to the square mile, whereas Germany, France, and England now have 300, and Massachusetts 367. There would therefore seem to be plenty of room for expansion; "But," says Mr. Whitney,

"the chief concern would be how they should be fed and wherewithal they should be clothed."

WHY THEY LOOK TO CANADA

Western expansion in the United States has developed large industrial centres which are becoming for reasons of transportation charges, independent of the eastern factories, for even Illinois has 395,000 wage-earners in manufacturing establishments, compared with 462,000 engaged in agricultural pursuits. The eastern manufacturers must therefore look abroad for a market and what more natural than Canada? The development of Canada now reminds Mr. Whitney of the early history of the United States, and he believes the geographical conditions are such as to foster trade between the two countries to a remarkable degree. He would even like to see the United States eastern ports get the passenger and freight traffic that now goes to St. John and Halifax. Here is the pleasant picture he then holds out for the dazzlement of Canadian eyes:

"The people of the United States would be the very best customers for the varied Canadian products. The people of the United States would be glad to join with the people of Canada in developing this great territory; and, as in the case of the territory of the United States, it could be developed to the mutual advantage of all concerned. That territory in the United States lying west of the Mississippi River, which barely one hundred years ago was a howling wilderness, now contains a contented and prosperous population of more than twenty millions of people, and there almost every day new manufacturing enterprises are being established on an enduring basis. I think would be equally beneficial to the territory of the Dominion if the tariff barrier between the two countries were absolutely removed. Manufacturing enterprises would gradually find their way to the western sections of Canada, just as they have to the western sections of the United States and all along from Ottawa to the Pacific would be found cities like Mil-

waukee, St. Paul, Spokane, Denver, Salt Lake City and Sacramento. And this development would be more rapid if brought about by the united capital and energy of the American people and of the Canadians."

A BOND OF UNION

Mr. Whitney goes beyond this, and is even willing to admit the mother-in-law to Uncle Sam's household. He foresees a bond of union with the British Empire as a whole, and not only Canada. This he believes is not only advisable, but necessary, for his country, and with more frankness than we are used to hearing from this side the boundary he says the co-operation of some power like Britain is necessary or Uncle Sam's imperial position will be the laughing-stock of the world. With this alliance in world-politics and freedom of trade over 6,000,000 square miles or, with the whole Empire, over 14,000,000 or more square miles—why, it just staggers imagination and seems more like a dream than anything possible of realization.

HE IS IN BARNST

Mr. Whitney, however, is eminently in earnest, and his standing as a New England financier gives weight to his utterances. He closes his article by advocating, as Mr. Foss did in his interview the other day, that the United States immediately of its own accord remove the duty from the products of Canada's fisheries, farms, forests and mines.

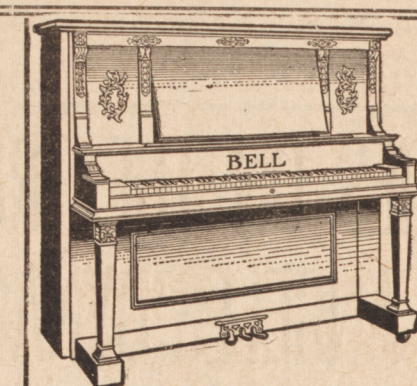
DELICIOUS LAYER CAKE

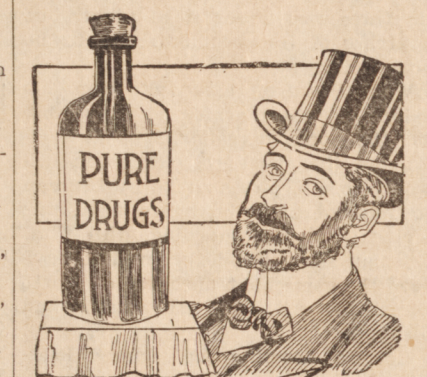

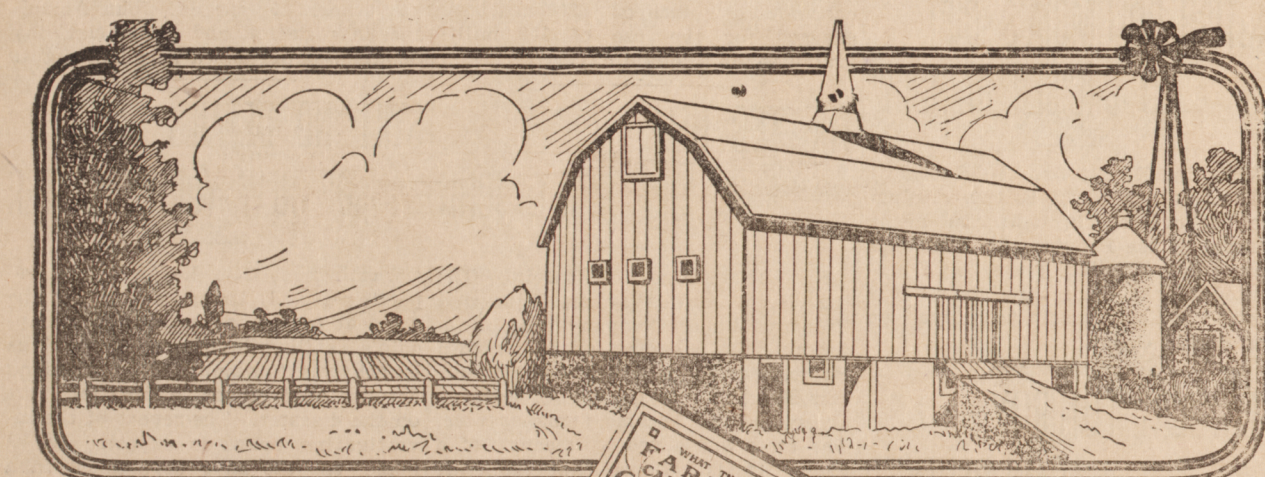
