GREAT BRITISH MILITARY DISPLAY TO BE SEEN IN CANADA

One Thousand Men Will be Engaged
in it—Will Begin Tour in April.

London, Oct. 1.—Hundreds of towns throughout the Empire are to be visited by a naval and military tournament in which over 1,000 officers and men, under Colonel A. G. Burn, of the Indian Army, will take part. The first performance will be given at Birmingham on Easter Monday, Apr. 17 next, and the tour will last three years.

The scheme has the approval of the War Office, who expect by its means greatly to stimulate recruiting. The heavy expenses which will be incurred—£2,500 weekly, it is estimated—have already been guaranteed by four public-spirited men.

Captain Burn, Colonel Burn's brother, who will act as chief marshal during the tour has stated that the profits will be devoted to the erection in London of an institution to be known as the Veterans' Home. It is hoped to raise £200,000 during the three years' tour. The tournament is to be conducted on lines similar to those of the Royal Naval and Military Tournament which is held in London every year. All the men engaged will be ex-soldiers or sailors, who will receive £2 a week, free uniform and kit, rations, and sleeping accommodation.

As far as possible a picture of life in the Services will be presented. In addition there will be musical drives, physical drill, and tent pegging. Airship and aeroplane flights under Service conditions will form a feature of each day's programme. The great spectacle is to be a reproduction of the charge of the Light Brigade at Balaklava. In this absolute fidelity to the thrilling details of the famous episode are promised. Over 500 men will take part in the charge.

In addition to Birmingham the towns to be visited next year will be: Manchester, Liverpool, Dundee, Glasgow, Edinburgh, Aberdeen, Newcastle, York, Doncaster, Cambridge, Brighton, Portsmouth, Southampton, Winchester, Taunton, Salisbury, Exeter, Plymouth, Bristol, Cardiff.

Two further tours of the smaller provincial towns will be made, the British programme ending with a display in London prior to embarkation for the over-seas Dominions, when Canada, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, and the Indian Empire will each in turn be visited.

T. P. O'CONNOR IN TORONTO TALKS ABOUT IRELAND

Toronto, Oct. 3.—Before an audience that well-nigh filled the thousands of seats in Massey Hall last night, Mr. T. P. O'Connor, M. P., the well known Irish Nationalist, set forth the position of the Irish party in its struggle for Home Rule.

He expressed great pleasure that it had fallen to him to come to Canada, because he felt the movement for which he stood before them had reached a phase where it would be of great interest to Canadians, and where Canadian sympathy and Canadian opinion could have a profound influence on their struggle. He referred to the wonderful progress that had taken place in Irish conditions during the thirty years since he had entered into public life.

"Thirty years ago," he said, "Ireland was a land of paupers and slaves, while now it has become a land of prosperous and free men." He cited incidents to show the state of ignorance and appalling subjection to the whims and wills of the landlords in which the Irish tenants had been afraid to vote save as they were told, and always laboring under the fear of eviction whether they had paid their rent or not.

LAND OWNERS BOUGHT OUT

It was pointed out by the speaker that 300,000 Irish farmers today had bought out their landlords, and were owners of every inch of soil they possessed. He expected this process would go on until all the soil of Ireland was owned by those that worked it, and so got rooted into a love for the country by having that greatest interest in it, a home of their own. In the matter of education Ireland was emerging from the shameful condition in which things have been, and he believed the day was not far distant when everybody else could say they had been well educated, or at least, that they could read and write.

Mr. O'Connor then described how members moved out of the House of Commons during debates on Irish questions, only coming back for divisions, and voting as told by the party whip on questions of whose right or wrong most of them knew nothing.

HOME RULE PERHAPS NEXT YEAR

Then he described how the Imperial Parliament presents the strange sight of debating questions of great national and Imperial moment at one

time in the day, and then discussing later some little petty matter that interested most particularly the people of some small English, Scotch, Welsh or Irish village. "All these countries should have local government as they have it in Canada," said the speaker. He referred to the present political situation in Great Britain, stating his opinion it was unfortunate the Liberals had not a stronger following without depending on them for support. However, he thought he was not going far out of the way in saying that it was quite possible that Ireland might have Home Rule by next year.

He also outlined a policy by which the colonies were to have international questions decided for them by the Imperial Parliament, they would be representation there. "The logical and adequate settlement of this question," he concluded, "is not one local Parliament in the British Isles, but four, with a great Imperial Parliament in which all sections are represented to attend to matters of Imperial importance."


He referred to a conference now going on between the leaders of the British Parliament, in both Houses, to come to a settlement on the right of veto of the House of Lords. Of the Liberal ideas were agreed to the cause of Home Rule would certainly triumph.

Mr. D'Arcy Hinds then made an appeal for funds, reading out a list of subscriptions totalling over \$1,100. This was quickly raised to \$1,200, which, with \$1,000 taken in receipts, gave \$2,200 for the cause.

Hon. J. J. Foy, Attorney-General for Ontario, introduced Mr. O'Connor. Earlier in the evening the latter had addressed the member of the Toronto Press Club, after he was banqueted by his brother journalists. Forbes-Robertson and Fiske O'Hara were also guests.
