MONEY LEFT BY DYING PATIENT TO BE GIVEN TO NEICE

Capacity of Hospital Taxed to the Utmost—Dr. Weaver Leaves Trustee Board.

The Trustees of Victoria Hospital held their monthly meeting at the Hospital yesterday afternoon and disposed of considerable business. Those present were President Tennant, Mayor Thomas, Coun. Rogers, Dr. Weaver, Mr. Sterling, Mr. McMurray and Secretary Sampson.

OVER-EXPENDITURE.

From the report of the Secretary Treasurer, it was shown that the expenditure for the month was much larger than the receipts, but this was naturally the result of a full house and strenuous work. It was shown by the matron's report that fifty-two patients received treatment during the month, and of these, fourteen were surgical cases. The Asa Dow wing has been closed for a few weeks but it again is in commission with a case of scarlet fever. Miss Ella Mae Wiggins has been added to the probation list. The matron reports the receipt of flowers and fruit from friends during the month. The Secretary read a letter from Judge F. B. Gregory, addressed to the matron, respecting a gift to the hospital of several valuable articles belonging to the late Judge G. F. Gregory. The Secretary was instructed to convey the Board's thanks to Judge Gregory.

CURIOUS INCIDENT

Some time ago a patient gave his pocket-book containing considerable money, to the matron, and expressed the wish that in the event of his death the money should be given to his neice. This request he intended to put in writing next day, but before the day dawned he was dead. Other relatives applied for the money which, in the meantime, was placed in the bank by the Secretary Treasurer. This occurred about two years ago and nothing has since been done with the matter. The Trustees advised that the claimants take steps to have the estate administered, but nothing has been done. The neice has again applied for the effects and it is said the other claimants will withdraw in view of the statement of Miss McCallum and Miss L. Young that the deceased wished his money to be handed to his neice. The Secretary was directed to confer with Judge Barry and act upon his advice.

Carpenters, plumbers and masons are at work in the basement of the hospital. While private families have difficulty in procuring help, the matron probably finds it more difficult to retain domestics in the hospital, even at big wages.

DR. WEAVER RETIRES.

Dr. Weaver, who for two years has represented the medical staff on the Trustee Board, intimated that his term of office has expired. He spoke of the pleasures he experienced in his association with the other members, and wished for his successor like courteous treatment. The President and each member present spoke of Dr. Weaver's warm interest in the hospital and of the most valuable assistance he has rendered the Board. As one of many acts it was mentioned that it was through the personal efforts of the doctor that the funds were obtained for painting the entire hospital premises.

RESIDENTS OF WOODSTOCK ROAD WANT WATER SERVICE

Mr. Donald Fraser, Sr., Presents Case to City Council—City's Concessions Satisfy Palmer Co.

Last evening Mr. Donald Fraser, Sr., appeared before the City Council in committee and requested that the water-service be extended westward on the Woodstock Road as far as Bailey's Bridge. Mr. Fraser pointed out that there was a considerable number of residences which would be served by the extension and that it was quite possible that other residences would be erected in that section of the city if they could be supplied with water.

It was suggested to Mr. Fraser that a petition from the residents of the Woodstock Road be presented to the Council in order that their wishes with regard to the extension be known. It is expected that the petition will be presented to the Council at the regular meeting.

A delegation of city grocers, accompanied by their legal representative, Mr. A. R. Slipp, also appeared before the Council last evening, and requested that the market by-laws be amended so as to prevent the peddling of county produce on the streets at any time.
