## SUGGESTIONS FOR IMPROVEMENT OF CITY

In response to the request for suggestion for the improvement of Fredericton the boys and girls of the public schools have sent the following to the Board of School Trustees.  
Each boy to keep his yard at home clean.  
That sidewalks be swept clean and sweepings removed.  
That merchants stop sweeping rubbish into gutters.  
That grass along streets be kept cut.  
That receptacles of some kind be placed on streets and playgrounds for waste matter.  
That old buildings be torn down.  
No posters or notices to be pasted on walls or fences, but upon frames placed at certain points.  
Better wharf needed at boat landing.  
Electric lights on bridge.  
A new "Bobby Burns."  
Narrow bicycle paths made.  
Hitching posts provided.  
Old fences to be removed.  
Better roads.  
Public automobile for use of tourists and excursionists.  
Young trees guarded by the boys.  
Children to refrain from throwing papers, etc., upon streets.  
Plant and care for flowers around homes.  
Clean up Queen's square.  
Keep papers, sticks, etc., picked up in front of homes.  
More window gardening.  
Formation of Civic League.  
City offer prizes for best and most tastefully kept home surroundings.  
Improve water front, and place more benches on river bank.  
The old graveyard should be kept in better condition.  
Remove unsightly dump on flats.  
Hens to be confined to yards.  
The city might enforce the Dog Law so that the improvements which are made may not be destroyed.

Citizens are asked to co-operate with the boys and girls on Arbor Day in attempting some real improvements about homes as well as schools.

## WILL TRY WIRELESS ON BRITISH TRAWLERS

London, May 11—The British navy is to have what, it is anticipated, will prove a valuable auxiliary in the fleet of trawlers which fish the North Sea. There are some six hundred of these vessels almost constantly at sea, and they are to be equipped in such a way that they will be available to act as scouts.  
Out of evil comes a certain amount of good sometimes, and it was the attack made about six years ago by the Russian fleet on the trawlers in mistake for Japanese torpedo boats which first gave root to the idea. And so, after consideration of the matter for all these years, the trawlers are to be equipped with wireless telegraph, and it is reported that the first experimental telegram from a North Sea trawler was received in London the other day. This means it is said, that in the event of any dispute between the Powers afloat the North Sea trawlers will be in a position to advise the home defence of the presence of an enemy.

## MARYSVILLE TOPICS.

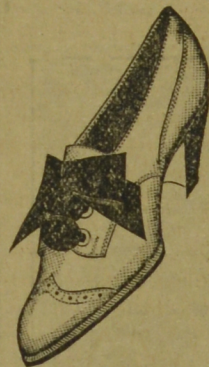
