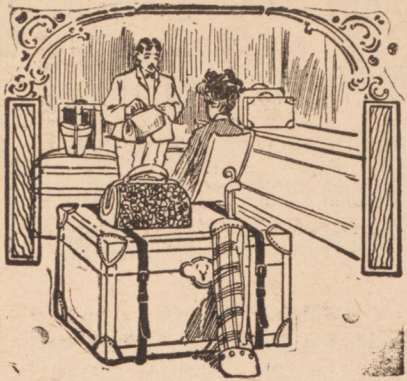

## FIGHTING THE BIG MAIL ORDER HOUSES

### Bathurst Merchants Get in Line--What They Have Done and What They Sug- gest--One Man's Opinions.

Bathurst is taking the lead in united action on the part of the business men with respect to the departmental stores of the upper provinces making a slaughter house of the province of New Brunswick, says The North Shore Leader. A meeting of the Bathurst merchants took place recently and was attended by a splendid representation of the business men of the place.

Resolutions were passed inviting the co-operations of the other northern counties of the province having in view organization all over New Brunswick with the object of stamping out, or greatly lessening, the evil resulting from this outside departmental store business.

Another resolution expressed the opinion that legislation should be promoted and carried through the legislative assembly authorizing the different municipalities to require outside departmental stores to make a sworn statement of what business they expect to do in the province each year and another sworn statement at the end of the year as to the actual business done within our province by them--each municipality to be further authorized to impose a license on such outside departmental stores.

A gentleman who has made quite a study of this matter over the province discussed various phases of the case with the exchange. Among other things he said:--"A not extravagant estimate of money sent out of the province each year to the departmental stores of Quebec and Ontario would be between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000."

"The question is not so much who is to blame for this condition of things, as how best to find a remedy."

"The action of the Bathurst merchants is an important step in the right direction, but many other steps are necessary. Boards of Trade should be organized in every city, town, village and settlement of the province and the people of the coun-

## BOUNDARY DISPUTE U. S. AND CANADA NOW SETTLED

AND CANADA NOW SETTLED

Ottawa, June 9--Copies have been received here of the treaty recently concluded with the United States, having reference to the boundary between Canada and that country.

The agreement is important in that it marks the end of all boundary questions at issue between the two. At one time it was proposed that the matter be submitted for adjudication to an international tribunal.

By the treaty Pope's Folly Island goes to the States and certain fishing shoals, regarded as valuable, go to Canada.

The uncertainty as to which country owned the island has been causing two municipalities all kinds of bother. There has been a long-standing dispute as to which had the right of collecting taxes and in which country to lone resident of the island had a right to vote.

This, as well as the other issue of fishing rights, is determined by the treaty, as negotiated by Ambassador Bryce and Secretary Knox.

## RUMOUR STILL BUSY WITH CONNAUGHT'S NAME AS GREY'S SUCCESSOR

London, June 9--The Canadian Associated Press has every reason to believe it is intended that the Duke of Connaught shall be governor general of Canada in accordance with King Edward's expressed wish. It is unlikely an official announcement will be made yet for the Duke of Connaught opens the South African parliament at the end of the year. It is improbable that he can go to Canada in midwinter, therefore, it is proposed that Earl Grey should remain in office till the spring of 1911.

Premier Asquith will state the course of business on Monday. The announcement of the government's intention to modify the royal declaration is expected to be then made.

The Chronicle, in regard to the governor general of Canada, says, there are obvious difficulties in the way of the appointment of the Duke of Connaught, but there will be general satisfaction if the King's ministers deem them not insuperable.

The views of the cabinet on the constitutional issue have been embodied in a draft letter from Premier Asquith to Mr. Balfour. It is generally anticipated a conference will occur between the leaders of the two great parties but the scepticism regarding its success is undiminished.

## GOVERNOR GENERAL'S MEDALS.

Principal Bridges then called upon Principal Foster to present the Governor General's medals for general proficiency, the silver medal to Mr. Arthur Kelly, of Hampton, and the bronze medal to Mr. Milton Gregg, of Mountindale, Kings county.

Mr. Foster congratulated the winners of the two medals. These prizes had been given in the most important and difficult subject of the course. He must remind them, however, that they were merely on the threshold of a subject which was of untold vastness. They might perhaps, with good health, teach twenty-five or thirty years. (Laughter.) If, as he thought, they were men who kept their windows open at the top, they would last all right. As a teacher who had grown grey in the profession, he welcomed them to it. There was no nobler profession in the world, and none more poorly paid. (Laughter and applause.)

## REV. DR. SMITH'S ADDRESS.

Rev. Dr. Smith delivered the last address. He congratulated the students on their choice of a profession. Among the brightest recollections of his own life were those associated with the country school house in which he had been taught, and of incidents in his own career as a school teacher. With regard to the future, he expressed the hope all would have the highest ideals and would ever try to display the true spirit of the teacher which Principal Bridges had mentioned.

## SIR WILFRID'S WESTERN TOUR STARTS JULY 6TH

Ottawa, June 9--Plans for the Prime Minister's trip to the west have been completed. Sir Wilfrid will leave Ottawa on July 6 and will be absent until September 8, and during that time he will cover the entire Canadian west, speaking at twenty-two formal meetings to be held in principal centres.

The first meeting will be at Port Arthur July 9. The next at Winnipeg, July 11, and there will follow meetings at Ste. Anne, Morden, Brandon, Yorkton, Melville, Humboldt, Prince Albert, Saskatoon, Regina, Weyburn, Moosejaw, Edmonton, Red Deer, Calgary, Vancouver, Victoria, which will be reached about August 18; Kamloops, Nelson, Lethbridge and the programme will be concluded with a meeting at Medicine Hat September 2.

Sir Wilfrid was never in better health or spirits and there is every reason to believe that he will stand very well the severe strain of traveling and speaking at so many meetings on such an extensive trip.

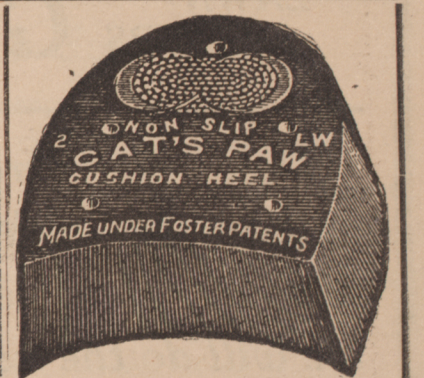
