## DETAILS OF WILL

## OF LATE JUDGE

## GEO. F. GREGORY

Two Annuities Provided For—Remainder of Estate Divided Equally Among Five Children.

The will of the late Judge Gregory which was proved in the early part of the week, was dated March 18th, 1901, and witnessed by A. J. Gregory, K. C., brother of the late judge, and Dr. A. B. Atherton, of this city. As stated in The Mail yesterday the executors named are the two sons of the testator, Mr. J. Fraser Gregory of St. John and Hon. Frank B. Gregory of Victoria, Judge of the Supreme Court of British Columbia.

## THE BENEFICIARIES.

The gold watch of the late judge is left to his namesake, George Frederick Gregory, son of Mr. J. Fraser Gregory. This is the only specific bequest made. Annuities are left to the sister of the deceased, Mrs. Mary E. Fraser, and to Miss Edith Marion Gregory, his youngest daughter. The annuities are to come from certain trust funds. One hundred dollars is to be paid to Mrs. Fraser, the balance to Miss Gregory.

The remainder of the estate is to be divided equally between the five children of the deceased, Mrs. Mabel E. Bridges of this city, Mrs. Clara Gertrude MacRae of St. John, Miss Edith M. Gregory of this city, Mr. J. Fraser Gregory of St. John and Mr. Justice Gregory of Victoria.

The result of the conference was a promise on the part of the committee to use its utmost influence to secure the payment by the government of the money which the city claims for the pavement.

## COMMISSIONER EXONERATED.

The Municipal Home Committee met yesterday afternoon to investigate certain charges of wrongful distribution of outdoor relief by the commissioner, Mr. R. H. Boone. As a result of the investigation the commissioner was exonerated from blame. It was decided however to ask the persons to whom the relief had been given to leave the city. If they will not leave they will be placed in the Municipal Home.

## POACHERS AGAIN

## BUSY DRIFTING AT

## HARTT'S ISLAND

People From Places Up River Come Down and Use Nets Late at Night.

Alleged poaching at Hartt's Island pool has caused a considerable stir recently in the circle of local fishermen. It is stated that not longer ago than Wednesday night certain parties from places on the river above Hartt's Island pool swept it with nets. Those who know the pool say that it would be impossible to sweep it clean but there is no doubt that the fishing is being seriously injured by the illegal netting.

## USE SHAD NETS.

It is understood that the poachers who have done the most damage come from Mactaquac, and the country about Mouth of Keswick. Other parts of the river besides Hartt's Island pool have been visited by poachers. Shad nets are used by those who go in for this illegal fishing, as salmon netting with less than five-inch mesh cannot be sold. Recently residents of the locality from which the poachers come have purchased shad nets here.

## FISH ARE PLENTIFUL.

In spite of this illegal drifting by poachers, there are numerous fish in the pool and local anglers obtain good sport there. It is likely that an arrangement will be made whereby fish-wardens will remain at the pool all the time.

Mr. Bayard Simmons landed two fine grills at Hartt's Island pool yesterday. This afternoon a party composed of Ald. Harrison, Ald. Walker, Mr. R. T. Mack and Mr. Harry Walker will go up and try to land some of the fish.

## CITY CLOCK STOPPED.

The clock in the City Hall tower stopped short after nine o'clock this morning. Mr. Harry White was called upon to regulate the erratic time-piece.

## DATE NOT FIXED YET
