SOMETHING WENT WRONG



Mr. Gould, who was loudly cheered, made an appropriate reply. He declared that electric railways were better than steam roads and could be operated much more cheaply. He believed that a road of this class would be just the thing for the St. John Valley, and he hoped the people would insist on that kind of a railway, no matter whether his (Gould's) or some other company was given the chance to build it.

Mr. Gould's praise of the electric railway seemed to greatly please these gathered about him, particularly Solicitor General McLeod, who nodded his approval.

At the suggestion of Mayor Thomas three hearty cheers were given for Supt. C. K. Howard, and that official made a fitting response.

Hon. J. K. Flemming, Hon. Robert Maxwell and Messrs. Slipp, Pinder, Young, Robinson, Tweeddale, Munro, Glasier, Woods and Upham, M. P. P.'s, and Mr. C. Fred Chestnut, president of the Valley Railway Company, were in the crowd at the depot but did not figure in the speech making.

The best of order prevailed on the train and everybody was in good humor. Mr. C. K. Howard, energetic superintendent of the Aroostook Valley Railway, made the trip up river with the excursionists and did all in his power to make it pleasant for them.

Beautiful half-tones prints of the power plant and electric railway were distributed among the passengers as souvenirs. It was a tired but well pleased crowd of excursionists who reached Fredericton at the unseemly hour of three o'clock this morning.

WHITE MEN'S VISIT TO INDIAN RESERVE CAUSED TROUBLE

Members of Crew of Victoria Removed From Reserve by Police—Jim Paul Threatens Legal Action.

There was trouble at the St. Mary's Indian reserve last night and the end is not yet as Jim Paul, the noted guide and Sportsman's Show performer says he will engage a lawyer and have the matter settled one way or the other. He is the injured party, he claims, and wants justice from the constable and Chief of the reserve.

Last evening two or three members of the crew of the Steamer Victoria went to Jim Paul's house at his invitation to spend a social evening.

The Indian Law states that no white man shall be on an Indian reserve later than 9 p. m. and the Chief and the constable enforced that regulation last night. Jim Paul and two of his daughters objected to this interference on the part of the authorities. Mrs. Tom Canadian landed a few blows on the Indian constable while her younger sister devoted her attention to the Chief. The white men had to go however. The assistance of the Fredericton police was secured and the intruders brought to the City police station. Magistrate Marsh was informed of the trouble and said that the men could not be held. They were then let go.

This morning Jim Paul and his daughters appeared in the Police Court to lay a complaint. The women said they had been roughly handled and all were positive that the Chief and the constable had ordered the visitors off the reserve before nine o'clock. Jim stated that there was no disturbance before the policemen appeared and also that the fact that he owns the land his house stands on makes some difference in the interpretation of the law.

The magistrate held out little hope to Jim and declined to act in the matter. Jim at once said he would see his lawyer.

BARNEY DEVINE LIABLE TO TWO YEAR'S SENTENCE

Captured Here Last Evening and Will be Sent Back to St. John as Escaped Prisoner.

Barney Devine who made a successful dash for freedom from the "chain gang" at St. John a few days ago was arrested last evening by Police Sergeant Foss and lodged in the cells. He will be taken to St. John tonight it is expected and will have to stand trial for escaping. He is liable to two years sentence.

The St. John police were communicated with by telephone last night but as it was impossible to get a warrant for Devine before this morning nothing was done.

Devine was driven out of Fredericton a short time ago and was liable to arrest even if he had escaped at St. John in that city he was serving an eight months' sentence. Barney informed the local police that he had walked from St. John via the C. P. R. track. His provision for the journey was a pound of soda biscuit and a bottle of gin.
